Ghulam faces 52 charges

War crimes prosecution seeks order for his arrest

The prosecution yesterday pressed 52 war crimes charges against former Jamaat-e-Islami chief Ghulam Azam.

The charges include leading the mass murder of intellectuals on December 14, 1971 and the killing of 38 prisoners of Brahmanbaria

Ghulam Azam, considered by many a symbol of war crimes, was also held responsible by the prosecutors for all atrocities committed across the country from March 25 to December 16, 1971.

Chief Prosecutor Ghulam Arieff Tipoo placed the charges before the told The Daily Star Yesterday they found International Crimes Tribunal and sought

arrest warrant for the ex-Jamaat ameer.

The prosecution prayer reflects the will of the people, Arieff said at a press briefing at his office yester-

The tribunal received the charges through its registrar's office and is scheduled to pass an order today on the prosecution's plea.

Earlier on Sunday, the prosecutors submitted formal charges of war crimes against top Jamaat leaders Motiur Rahman Nizami, Ali Ahsan Mohammad Mojaheed and Muhammad Kamaruzzaman.

EC skirts split-DCC polls

Says Feb deadline not suitable for it

The Election Commission (EC) yesterday decided not to hold polls to the split Dhaka City Corporation by February next year due to time constraint.

According to the recent changes brought to the Local Government (City Corporation) Act 2009, polls to two city corporations -- DCC North and DCC South -- must be held within 90 days, a deadline that ends on February 29.

But the present EC is not getting the stipulated 90 days because the

tenure of Chief Election Commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda and Election Commissioner Sohul Hussein expires on February 4. Brig Gen (retd) M Sakhawat Hossain, the other election commissioner, will retire on February 14.

"Under this situation, we are not going to announce schedule for the DCC polls," the CEC told reporters after a meeting that made the deci-

He added the commission would send a letter to the Local Government Division (LGD) today, explaining why the EC cannot hold

the elections.

On December 4, the LGD in a letter requested the Election Commission to make necessary preparations for holding polls to the bifurcated DCC within the 90-day deadline.

"The electoral reforms we brought about for holding free and fair elections will suffer a blow if we go for holding the DCC polls hurriedly. So, we are not in favour of holding the polls in such a short time," the CEC

Govt trying to hide something

Says probe body chief at a dialogue; blasts regulators over failure

The prime minister had to intervene in the troubled share market for the failure of the Securities and Exchange Commission and the finance ministry to play their due role, the chief of a probe body said

"They involved the prime minister in stockmarket issues to avoid responsibility for their failure. It's a shame," said Khandker Ibrahim Khaled, chief of a committee formed to probe a stockmarket scam.

Khaled, also chairman of Bangladesh Krishi (agriculture) Bank, said the government is trying to hide something about the stockmarket like it did in 1996 when the bubble burst in the share market.

He was speaking at a dialogue "State of the Capital Market and Recent Policy Initiatives" organised by The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), a civil society think tank, in

the capital.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on November 16 held an emergency meeting at Gono Bhaban with the SEC, finance ministry and other stakeholders over the stockmarket debacle, and instructed the regulator to take steps to stabilise the market.

Khaled, also former deputy governor of Bangladesh Bank, said the government and the market regulators are only concentrating on the **SEE PAGE 19 COL 5**

Aman offers big smile

Harvesting halfway through; food hopes no rice import to be required

With over 60 percent of Aman paddy already harvested, there are signs of a bumper rice production this season, said officials of both food and agriculture ministries.

Buoyed by the prospect of an increased output in the first rice season of the current fiscal year (2011-12), the government has decided to stop rice import.

"No more rice import will be required this fiscal year. We will import only wheat as we are not able to meet the demand for it from

domestic production." Food Minister Abdur Razzaque told this correspondent on Sunday,

The output of Aman is projected to well surpass the previous season's production, Additional Agriculture Secretary Anwar

Faruque said when contacted. Rain-fed Aman harvested in November-December, the first rice season out of three in a fiscal year, contributes 38 percent of the country's over 30 million tonnes of rice output. Irrigated Boro contributes 56 percent and

Aus six percent. Reached over the phone, some farmers in

Dinajpur said rice growers in the northern region reaped a very good Aman harvest this season. "We have got up to 54 maunds of rice per acre in certain areas while the average output surpassed 40 maunds per acre," said Gopal Mohanto, one of the farmers. Meanwhile, the signs of a better harvest

and last week's government decision of launching an Aman procurement drive have halted the freefall of wholesale and retail prices of rice in the market. Low prices of rice persisted from mid-October mainly due to SEE PAGE 19 COL 2
