Risking life to save money

Trucks unload vegetables in Karwan Bazar, hit roads to North loaded with passengers

Flouting laws, a section of truck drivers carry passengers to northern districts from the capital's Karwan Bazar every night to earn extra bucks.

The passengers, most of whom are day labourers and rickshaw pullers, choose to travel by truck risking their lives as it costs them five to eight times less than that by bus.

According to the Motor Vehicle Ordinance 1983, carrying passenger in goods-carrying vehicle is a punishable offence. Because of their structural design, trucks are riskier than buses as a means of public transport, says Prof Hasib Mohammed Ahsan, director of Accident Research Institute at Buet.

In the first six months of this year, 1,309 vehicles were involved in road accidents across the country. Of them, 406 were trucks, a police report says.

The exact number of the trucks involved in carrying passengers could not be known, but traders at Karwan Bazar said the number could be in dozens.

These trucks enter Karwan Bazar, one of the biggest wholesale markets in the city, with goods from the northern districts at night. On their way back, they carry 500 to 800 passengers every night, the traders added.

Criminal database underway

Rab hopes for quick crime-busting

The government is working on a highly-sophisticated criminal database, the first of its kind, to facilitate law enforcers in detecting criminal elements quickly by cross-checking the bank of biometrics and other records.

The Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) began implementing the Tk 2.5 crore-project in June last year in cooperation with Tiger IT Bangladesh Ltd, a local software firm, who conducted the national

identity card project. Installation of the software for the particulars of around one lakh

"As many as 150 particulars of a criminal including photograph, prints of 10 fingers, images of retinas, blood group and available previous criminal records are being stored in the database," Lt Col Ziaul Ahsan, chief of Rab intelligence wing, said.

He said the database would be available on website, "but its access will be restricted". It would be shared with other law enforcing agencies too.

Three bridges in danger of collapse

Three major bridges --Kanchpur, Meghna and Gumti -- on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway may collapse anytime, said Communications Minister Obaidul Quader yesterday.

"The soil around the bases of the bridges have almost been washed away due to overloading, sand extraction and movement of overloaded cargo vessels on the water, he told The Daily Star after an inter-ministerial meeting at the conference room of his ministry.

Quader said he already talked to the authorities concerned about taking measures against overloaded cargoes that pass by the bridges on the respective rivers.

Unemployment world's fastest rising fear

Unemployment is the world's fastestrising worry, a BBC World Service survey covering 11,000 people in 23 countries suggests.

The annual poll, called The World Speaks, gave people a list of concerns and asked which they had discussed with friends or family in the past month. Corruption and poverty still ranked the

highest, but unemployment was mentioned by 18% - six times the rate citing it in the first survey in 2009. The poll was carried out by Globescan.

The growth in concern was found

across all countries surveyed, although

discussed that topic in some form over the past four weeks.

YOUNGJOBLESS Next came extreme poverty. One in five had talked about that subject recently.

Issues associated with inflation, such as higher food and energy prices, were on level pegging with unemployment in third place - with both topics mentioned by 18% of those surveyed.

Concern about joblessness seemed to vary by country.
