The prime minister said both the countries have agreed to sign a MoU for bilateral cooperation in the areas of agriculture and fisheries and livestock.

She said Bangladesh is keen to develop poultry, fisheries and other agro-based industries following the Thai successes and experience in these sectors.





BANGABANDHU'S STRUGGLE

BNP-led govt destroyed BTV footages, says DG

The previous BNP-Jamaat alliance government had destroyed Bangladesh Television's (BTV) rare video footages on Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's long democratic struggle against the Pakistani dictatorial rulers.

"The footages contained some rare visual documentations of the 23-year struggle of Bangalees led by Bangabandhu that culminated in the war of liberation in 1971," Director General of BTV Quazi Abu Zafar Siddiqui told the news agency in an interview.

He said after coming to power in 2001, the then government destroyed the documentaries.

The then BTV had recorded new footages on those tapes that preserves invaluable video footages of Bangabandhu, showing lame excuses of scarcity of tapes.

The video documentaries included the rare footage of sixpoint demand movement, upsurge of 1969, noncooperation movement, Bangabandhu's 19-mininute 7th March historic speech, live footage of Bangabandhu's home coming event, election of 1970 and Bangabandhu's interview taken by journalist KG Mustafa in 1972.

The BTV chief, however, said the BNP-Jamaat alliance was not able to destroy 67 cassettes on Bangabandhu as those were preserved in a safer place.

New Canadian envoy keen to strengthen ties

The newly appointed Canadian High Commissioner in Dhaka Heather Cruden yesterday said that she would work for deepening and strengthening ties with Bangladesh focusing on development, trade and mutual interests.

"Media acts as an important bridge between our two countries in strengthening the relationship," she made this remarks at a lunch with editors and senior journalists at her official residence.

The new Canadian envoy said the year 2012 coincides with the 40th anniversary of Canada's diplomatic relations with Bangladesh. "There will be series of events throughout the year to celebrate our shared values of democracy, good governance, rule of law and cooperation," she said.

Nation shocked at death of Kabir Chy

Different political, social and cultural organisations and individuals expressed deep shock at the death of eminent intellectual, writer and national professor Kabir Chowdhury.

Kabir Chowdhury, a former director of Bangla Academy, died of cardiac arrest in the city early yesterday at the age of 89.

In a condolence message, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said the nation has lost a great citizen, who will be alive forever being a forerunner of freethinking.

She said, "I myself have lost a guardian and a well-wisher."

She added the role of Kabir Chowdhury as an educationist, litterateur and social activist was in favour of the liberation, democracy, and the mass people specially he was out spoken in the demand of the trial of the killers of the father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and war criminals.

She prayed for salvation of the departed soul and conveyed sympathy to the bereaved family members.

In another message, President Zillur Rahman expressed his profound shock and sorrow at the death of the eminent educationist. The president said Kabir Chowdhury

made immense contribution in expansion of education as well as development of quality education throughout his long professional life. Opposition Leader and BNP Chairperson

Khaleda Zia also expressed deep shock at the death of the national professor.

Khaleda said the nation will remember Kabir Chowdhury with respect forever for his outstanding contribution in research works on language and literature.

Speaker Abdul Hamid in a message said expressed deep shock at his death.

Kabir Chowdhury was an extra-ordinary teacher and cultural personality. "Through his freethinking, farsighted

ness, non-communal outlook he contributed to build a modern, and progressive society," said the Speaker. Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid in

another message said Kabir Chowdhury was a living legend in the democratic spirit of teaching, freethinking, liberation war and non-communalism. "The nation will recall him as the chair-

man of the national education policy formulation committee for his contribution and directives to bring changes in the education policy for modernisation and qualitative change" he said. Nobel laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus in a message said Kabir Chowdhury made


Today is the fourth death anniversary of Pramathesh Barua, former
