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Speed up war trial

Nation celebrates V-Day with the call

The nation yesterday celebrated the 40th anniversary of independence with utmost honour to the valiant sons of the soil who made the supreme sacrifice to liberate Bangladesh from the Pakistani occupation forces in 1971.

Amid enthusiasm and gaiety, thousands of people, who thronged the National Memorial to salute the martyred heroes, called for expediting the trial of war criminals and formation of political unity to protect national interest through the banners and posters they were carrying.

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Thousands, young and old and dressed in red and green, thronged the National Memorial in Savar yesterday to pay homage to the Liberation War martyrs and to celebrate the country's 40th anniversary of independence.

The report that changed history

"How many did you get?" Major Rathore asked Major Iftikhar of the 12th Frontier Force Rifles of Pakistan army.

It was April 17, 1971. Rathore of the 9th Division was approaching Chandpur and met his friend Iftikhar.

Iftikhar smiled bashfully listening to the question and said, "Only twelve. And by God we were lucky to get them. We would have lost those, too, if I hadn't sent my men from the back."

The conversation was reported by Anthony Mascarenhas, former assistant editor of Morning News, Karachi, in his article "Genocide," published on June 13, 1971 in The Sunday Times.

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5 abducted, missing for 10 days

The five youths, who were abducted from Maligram Bazar of Bhanga upazila in the district on December 6, remain traceless.

A group of six, claiming themselves as personnel of Detective Branch of Police, picked them up in a white microbus around 2:30pm that day, witnesses said.

The abducted youths are Rubel Kha, 18, Belayet Kha, 23, Kiyum Munshi, 32, Sobhan Kha, 19, and Fayeze Hawlader, 23 -- all from Atra Bhasra village of Kala Mridah union. Rubel was a madrasa student while the four others were unemployed, their family members said.

Two days after the abduction, Sobhan's father Anwar Kha filed a case with Bhanga Police Station. Ten days on, police have yet to catch the kidnappers. They, however, arrested two local youths -- Kamal and Faruk -- for interrogation.

Incidents of disappearance, abduction and subsequent killing across the country have risen sharply of late.

Waterbus service sinks after start

Lack of right planning, mismanagement blamed

Sixteen months after its launching, the waterbus service in the rivers Buriganga and Turag is on the verge of collapse due to mismanagement and lack of proper planning.

Moreover, introduction of wrong types of vessels for the existing landing facilities along their route also caused a decline in the number of passengers. The vessels can only have three stoppages instead of six as the existing pontoons or landing facilities are too high for those.

Only two vessels now operate twice a day on the route -- Sadarghat to Gabtoli -- causing a loss of more than Tk 20,000 a day

to Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation which operates the service. The vessels were built at a cost of Tk 1.11 crore with their engines imported from the UK, BIWTC sources said.

On the Sadarghat-Gabtoli road, 105 buses operate daily, carrying thousands of passengers. The journey by bus takes up to three hours at peak time. Water bus covers its route -- about 10 kilometres -- in one hour and 30 minutes, and in a much more comfortable manner.

Moreover, the waterbus service has failed to attract passengers on a route dotted with suburban localities inhabited by Lakhs. People of nearby Basila and

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
