The observations were made by Taramon Bibi Bir Protik, Safina Lohani of Sirajgonj, Shirin Banu Mitil of Kushtia, lawmaker Rawshan Jahan Sathi, journalist Nasimun Nahar Minu and Rokeya Kabir, who took part in the War of Liberation.

The valiant freedom fighters made the comments two days after the central working committee member of Jamaat-e-Islami Mian Golam Parwar made a plea to 'forgive' what they did in 1971.

Taramon, who was a guerilla fighter, said no Bangalee will forgive the collaborators of Pakistani occupation forces, who abused two lakh women during the war.

She fought against Pakistanis in the war in Kurigram under sector 11 led by Col Abu Taher, Bir Uttam.

Rawshan, who was arrested on March 27 in 1971 and later released, said the people will not forgive us if the trial of the perpetrators of the crimes against humanity is not held.

Rokeya, who was a student of Dhaka University in 1971 and joined the liberation war as a commander of a women's contingent, condemned BNP leader Barrister Moudud Ahmed for his urge to stop trial of the war criminals.

Safina and Nasimun also echoed the same about the trial of the war criminals but they demanded state recognition to women freedom fighters who bravely fought against the Pakistani occupation forces.

transformation begins practices, say docs

Leading specialists in obstetrics and paediatrics in the country have urged the government to update the medical and nursing curriculum to ensure best practices in Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF).

Terming adequate child nutrition a basic building block for a healthy generation, the experts stressed the need of incorporating practical sessions on IYCF in the medical and nursing college academic calendar.

Quite often doctors are unaware of the practical details of IYCF, including breastfeeding and complementary feeding tech-

niques, the specialists said at a workshop in the city yesterday. The workshop was organised by the Obstetrics and Gynaecology Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) with cooperation

from the Institute of Public Health and Nutrition (IPHN), and the Alive and Thrive initiative. National Professor Dr Shahla Khatun;

Prof Fatema Parveen Chowdhury, director, Institute of Public Health and Nutrition; Prof cent.

Khandakar Mohammed Sifayetullah, director of Health Services; Prof Abu Shafi Ahmed Amin, president of Bangladesh Medical and Dental Council; and Prof Sameena Chowdhury of OGSB spoke at the workshop.

Addressing the workshop, Dr Shahla said without wholehearted involvement and cooperation of physicians, it would be impossible to achieve the national nutrition

Dr Sameena said there were gaps in the medical and dental council curriculum, which needed to be addressed.

"A medical student often lacks practical knowledge of exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding, and is unaware of the harmful effects of formula baby foods," she said.

According to Bangladesh Demographic and Health Survey (BDHS) statistics, less than half of Bangladeshi mothers practice exclusive breastfeeding for the first six months. The initiation of breastfeeding within the first hour after birth, strongly recommended by WHO, is less than 25 per-
