Dynamic opening batsman David Warner thwarted Shane Warne's comeback to Twenty20 cricket with a pulsating century in Australia's Big Bash League at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Saturday.

The powerful left-hander smashed an unbeaten 102 off 51 balls to steer Sydney Thunder to a six-wicket win over Warne's Melbourne Stars.

Legspin legend Warne, playing for the first time since his final game in the Indian Premier League last May, only bowled two overs but was clouted for two sixes by Warner.

Warner, who last Monday scored his maiden Test century with an unbeaten 123 in the Hobart Test loss to New Zealand, belted a total of six sixes and six fours in his explosive century.

His big-hitting enabled Sydney Thunder to easily chase down the Stars' 153 for seven with 154 for four off 19

Warne, 42, played despite burning his right bowling hand while frying bacon at home on Monday and his two overs cost 19 runs.

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni has said the chances of him being available to defend India's World Cup title in 2015 aren't guaranteed, and that he will take a call two years prior to the tournament in Australia-New Zealand. Dhoni, who has been around since 2005, has been captaining India in all three formats, in addition to his role as wicketkeeper-batsman.

"If you see 2015, three and a half years to go, I don't really know where I will stand. Everything needs to go off well and then close to 2013, I will have to take a call whether I can be 100 per cent available for the 2015 World Cup," Dhoni told the news channel CNN-IBN.

"Because at the end of the day you don't want a wicketkeeper part of the side who has not played at least 100-odd games -- at least close to 80-100 games going into the World Cup. So that's a call that needs to be taken. But if everything goes off well, 2013 end will be the time where we will have to carefully study the body and see what can be done." Dhoni was speaking to CNN-IBN after receiving the news channel's Indian of the Year -- Sports award for 2011.

India's packed schedule in recent years, with the IPL thrown in, has compelled Dhoni to prioritise and take adequate rest before important tours. This year, he skipped the one-dayers in the West Indies after an exhausting World Cup and the IPL, as well as West Indies' return series (ODIs) in India which concluded recently. Parthiv Patel took over the gloves in both.

Dhoni's trophy cabinet in limited-overs cricket includes the World Cup, the 2007 World

The normally phlegmatic Dhoni didn't hide his emotions, as television cameras managed to capture scenes of several of his teammates openly crying with joy. Reliving the moment, Dhoni admitted that he too cried, though away from the camera.

"Yes I did [cry] you don't really have footage of that," Dhoni said. "It's very difficult to control an emotion like that. I was controlling it, quickly. I wanted to go up to the dressing room and I see two of my players crying and running onto me. Fortunately, all of a sudden, I started crying and I looked up and there was a huddle around me.

"It was one of the biggest things for us as Indian cricketers. The last time we won the proper 50-over version was 28 years back. So most of the people part of the side wanted to win the World Cup and as soon as we got into a position where we saw the World Cup coming into our dressing room, that was the time when emotions started to flow. If you see before the post-match presentation, almost each and every player cried."

Dhoni's unconventional batting style, full of improvised strokes, has won him plenty of attention over the years. One of his patented strokes is the 'helicopter shot', which he sometimes employs to dig out yorker length deliveries, in which he twirls the bat above his head in the follow-through.

He said it originated from his tennis-ball cricket days in Jharkhand.

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PCB hopeful of India series

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has not given up hope of playing India in a Test series next year, revealed chairman Zaka Ashraf.

Ashraf, who is in Dhaka to meet the Bangladesh Cricket Board officials to discuss prospects of the country's team touring Pakistan next year, said he had not given up hope on the Indo-Pak series.

"The Indian board chief, N Srinivasan, didn't come to attend the Asian Cricket Council meeting in Singapore, so the issue of next year's series could not be discussed," Ashraf said. "But I will meet him next month on the sidelines of the ICC

meeting in Dubai and hopefully some solution can be found to having the series with India," he added. PCB officials suffered a setback during the ACC meeting in

Singapore recently as the Asian Council confirmed the Asia Cup would be held on schedule in March in Bangladesh, effectively ruling out prospects of Pakistan touring India around the same time for the FTP Test series. The series has fallen into doldrums since the fifth edition of

the IPL is scheduled to commence around April 12th.

Ashraf, however, said he was not disappointed with what had happened in Singapore.

"I think the Asia Cup had to be held on schedule. But when I meet with Srinivasan next month I see some ray of hope for the bilateral series," he insisted. Ashraf also made it clear that Pakistan had no grievances

against the Bangladesh board and instead he was in Dhaka to give their officials a detailed presentation on the security arrangements for their team if they decided to tour Pakistan next year as per the FTP. "If we can't play India than we have to look at playing other

teams and my main objective is to try to convince the Bangladesh board officials that we can host their team in Pakistan and provide them the best security," he said.

Bangladesh has made it clear that it would only tour Pakistan if it gets security clearance from its government and the ICC since no foreign team has toured Pakistan after March, 2009 attack on the Sri Lankan team in Lahore.

Resigned to the fact that his Test career was as good as over, Katich rang Inverarity yesterday in response to suggestions he was being considered for a shock recall to open the batting at the MCG against India.

Katich is in Western Australia preparing for his first match with Big Bash League team Perth Scorchers.

"Simon has placed a call in to the chairman of selectors to see what's going on but they've been playing phone tag," Katich's manager, Robert Joske, said.

According to a report, Australian skipper Michael Clarke is pressing for the inclusion of Katich in the squad to strengthen the batting order after his team lost the Hobart Test against New Zealand.

Katich has made 395 runs at an average of 39.5 and hit two centuries this summer. Katich had earlier criti-

cised Cricket Australia's selection panel headed by Andrew Hilditch for cancelling his contract in June 2011.

Though Clarke and Katich have had tense relations since the 2009 Sydney Test, both have insisted that their differences would not affect the team's selection issue. Counting against Katich is

the fact that, as of last night, he had not been given an official invite to coach Mickey Arthur's batting camp in Melbourne next week.

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
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
