Favourite fish now becoming a matter of fear in Rangpur

Fish is no longer a favourite item for many families in Rangpur district, as sale of formalin-treated fish has become an out of control practice in the local markets, endangering public health.

Not a single fly is seen near the fresh looking fishes, as they are treated with deadly chemical formalin but there is no monitoring system at Rangpur Municipal Market and other places to check the matter, said several consumers.

"I used to take fish everyday, but now fish is not a favourite item for my family members, even the kids. It is now well-known that most of the fresh looking fishes are treated with formalin," said Mamun-ur-Rashid, lecturer of Rangpur Government

"There is no acceptable limit for formalin as it is a poison. If applied in fishes, its consumption will cause slow reaction in the human body, eventually damaging kidney, lunge and other organs. It can also cause cancer," said Dr Rezaul Karim, civil surgeon of Rangpur district. "Children and elderly

people are more affected by formalin-treated fish. High doses of it may even cause death," he added.

Mahbubur Rahman, sanitary inspector of Rangpur district, said, "I heard the matter. But we

have no equipment to test the formalin-treated fishes. We will conduct a drive soon."

Authorities are trying to set up permanent enforcement units in all fish markets of Rangpur town to take action against those who indulge in such illegal activities, he added.

Rangpur Deputy Commissioner BM Enamul Haque said, "I have received allegations of the sale of formalin-treated fish. But

we cannot conduct drives to take action in this regard for want of equipment to test it. We have asked the higher authorities to supply formalin testing kits as soon as possible."

Asked about the use of formalin in fishes, Muslim Uddin, president of fish wholesalers association at Rangpur Municipal Market, said, "None of us are involved with such a nasty work. If anyone is found guilty, he must be sus-

pended from our association. But we have no right to punish the formalin-treated fish sellers without proper investigation."

Talking to this correspondent, a number of fish dealers preferring anonymity admitted that formalin is used in both local and hybrid varieties of fishes.

As it takes one or two days to bring fish from different places, traders use formalin for preservation of the perishable item, they said.

Violence in dists following mayhem in capital

A man was killed in Sylhet and several others were injured when opposition activists clashed with police in different districts apparently in reaction to violence centring a freedom fighters' reception organised by BNP

in the capital yesterday. Agitators also vandalised 23 vehicles and torched a few others as clashes erupted in Sylhet, Sirajganj, Barisal, Faridpur and Munshiganj districts, report our district correspondents.

Activists of BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami fought pitched battles with police at different places in the city and police detained more than 250 opposition activists. A man was killed and another injured as a handmade bomb went off at Motijheel in the morning.

SYLHET

An unidentified man was burnt alive as some unruly young men torched a passenger bus at Chandipul suburban South Surma upazila Sunday morning.

Ten others were inured in the incident.

"Some young men riding about 10 motorcycles

stopped the bus in Bodikona area. They threw stones and then set the vehicle afire,' said injured Aifar Ali, 35, of Moulvibazar.

The protesters blocked the road for about an hour till 12:15pm.

At least 15 buses and pickups were also vandalised at Subhanighat, said Rezaul Karim, deputy commissioner of Sylhet Metropolitan Police.

Around 11:15am, a private car was set ablaze at Kumarpara point in the city. None was reported injured.

Police contingents have been deployed in those areas, the deputy commissioner said.

Sources in a law enforcement agency, requesting anonymity, said 20 to 30 activists of Jatiyatabadi Swechchhasebak Dal and Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal were involved with the incidents that followed the violence in the capital.

MUNSHIGANI

BNP leaders and activists yesterday formed a fourkilometre-long human chain on Dhaka-Mawa highway in Sirajdikhan upazila of the district, defying police resistance.

BSF returns body of three Bangladeshis

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) yesterday returned the bodies of two Bangladeshi cattle traders and a farmer who were killed by them the day before in Dinajpur and Meherpur borders.

In Dinajpur, two cattle traders were shot dead by BSF early Saturday on Daudpur border in Birampur upazila, reports our correspondent.

The BGB officials of Phulbari 40 Battalion said, BSF handed over the bodies to them at around 6.45pm yesterday at Lichee Gobindrapur border point of the upazila following a flag meeting between the two border forces.

Earlier, on Saturday evening, a meeting was also held at same place where Bangladesh Border Guard (BGB) protested of unprovoked firing by the BSF.

Sub inspector Belal of Birampur police station received the bodies of Motiar Rahman, 20, Tajul Islam, 26, and later handed those over to their family members in presence of UP chairman Md Shamsul Alam, OC ATM Aminul Islam

Our Kushtia correspondent adds: BSF yesterday returned the body of a Bangladeshi farmer in Meherpur.

The farmer was killed by the Indian border force along the Tetulbaria border point in Gangni upazila of the district.

BGB received the body of Naharul Islam, 40, son of Bisharat Ali of Shewratala village around 3:00pm.

Lt Col Hamidunnabi, battalion commander of BGB-32 rifle under Mirpur Sector in Kushtia quoting the autopsy report said, Naharul was strangled.

BSF at Bazrapur camp in Nadia district, however, claimed that they found Naharul's body on the noman's land.

Gangni police said Naharul was accused in two cases one for firearms and another for abduction.

Trader's body recovered
