Sri Lanka increase speed

Sri Lanka have called up fast bowlers Nuwan Kulasekara and Dhammika Prasad to their Test squad for the remaining two matches against South Africa. Captain Tillakaratne Dilshan on Sunday confirmed that the pair would fly in to South Africa in "a couple of days" after competing in the knockout stages of the domestic tournament at home.

After being beaten by an

innings and 81 runs in Centurion, Sri Lanka are searching for ways to come back into the series and beefing up the bowling department is one of them. Before the tour of South Africa, four seamers, including Prasad and Kulasekara were ruled out with injury and Sri Lanka lost another quick when Nuwan Pradeep broke down during the tour match against the South African Invitation XI. At the time, the selectors did not name a replacement because they were hopeful that some of the injured lot would recover in time for the series.

Prasad was injured last month in a Test match against Pakistan in Sharjah. He pulled a quad muscle after bowling four overs in the first innings and was ruled out of the one-day series which followed. He made his comeback in Sri Lanka's domestic Premier Limited Over tournament on Wednesday, where he took 3 for 30 for Sinhalese Cricket Club. He also played in Saturday's final, although he had little success and finished with figures of 10-1-59-0.

Kulasekara had no played any cricket since October but returned to action this week. He played in the semifinal of the fiftyover domestic tournament and made an impressive return with 2 for 37 in seven overs for Colts Cricket Club against Nondescripts. Colts were knocked out of the competition, meaning Kulasekara did not have any

other match practice. Meanwhile, Angelo Mathews is expected to recover from a groin strain which kept him off the field during the Test match. Matthews left the field midway through the second day and went for an MRI scan, which revealed that the injury was not serious. He returned to field and batted on the third day and will have eight days to recover before the second Test, which starts on December 26, in Durban.

Pace could be decider

The forthcoming Australia-India Test series could be decided by how the visiting batsmen fare against the young and enthusiastic host pacers, feels domestic opener Ed Cowan who is in the shortlist to make the team for the opening Test in Melbourne from December 26.

"I don't think the Indians have had a good look at the Aussie quicks. That's where the series would probably be decided on -- Indian batsmen vs Aussie quicks," said the Tasmanian, who is in the short mix of openers Australian selectors could be asking to open the innings with David Warner.

As opener Phil Hughes has regularly failed in Tests this summer, Australian selectors are looking for his replacement.

Shane Watson is a front-runner but if somehow the Australian vice-captain refuses to open the innings, then Cowan stands a chance to make his debut for Australia. Cowan has been the highest scorer in domestic competition this year.

"It would be a great Test series. India has some fantastic cricketers. But so does the Australian team. Ricky Ponting, Michael Clarke and Michael Hussey have all been world class performers for a number of years, forgetting the last month about which a lot of people to rely heavily upon.

"People are forgetting they have been world class performers for a number of years. They would be pretty pumped up, come Boxing Day. There is no occasion bigger than a boxing day Test."

However, Cowan feels that the Zaheer Khan-led Indian attack would be a far sterner test for the Australian batsmen than New Zealand -- a daunting remark given the Black Cap bowlers were quite a handful against the home batters in a recent series.

Even though Cowan is being spoken to as prospective opener for Australia, the Tasmanian has no doubt it would be Watson who would get the nod.

"It wouldn't come down to what I've done [recently]. It's more a question of how Shane Watson is and whether he wants to open the innings. If he is fit, he sends someone out. If he doesn't want to open, they have to call out for someone else. "I'm in the form of my life but whether I'm

In Sri Lanka 2010, Zaheer was ruled out before the start, and Sreesanth was injured during training on the first day of the tour. Later that year, in South Africa, Zaheer missed the first Test.
