## Monitor NGO activities strictly in CHT: JS body

The parliamentary standing committee on Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) ministry yesterday stressed the need for strict monitoring the activities of the non-government organisations (NGOs) working in CHT areas.

This was decided in its 19th meeting of the standing committee with its Chairman Md Shah Alam in the chair. State Minister for CHT Affairs Dipangkar Talukder, ABM Fazle Karim Chowdhury, Gias Uddin Ahmed and Md Abu Zahir attended the meeting.

# I recognised three soldiers

Prosecution witness tells court

A prosecution witness yesterday said before a session judge's court that he identified three soldiers who were torching vehicles and carrying looted goods during the BDR carnage on February 25-26 in 2009. In his deposition, witness Havildar Brozo Gopal also

said he recognised nine other soldiers who opened blank fire and shouted angrily at the soldier line of 24 Rifle Battalion of erstwhile Bangladesh Rifles (BDR), now Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB). The defence counsel later cross-examined the witness.

Gopal hid himself at the guard room at central mosque in Pilkhana to save his life as soon as the mutiny erupted. From where he saw the soldiers swooped on the officers' quarters with firearms and looted valuables. They also vandalised and torched officers' cars, Gopal

said to the court, set up temporarily at the Alia Madrasa playground at the city's Bakshibazar. Gopal, however, could not mention the type of firearms, names of cars and looted valuables while defence

counsel Shameem Sardar, on behalf of sepoy Zafur Ali, cross-examined him.

The court has been adjourned till today.

A total 74 people, including 57 army officers, were killed during the two-day carnage at Pilkhana headquarters in 2009.

# 52 per cent men assault female partners

Reveals study

About 52 per cent of men in both urban and rural areas in the country physically assault their intimate female partners, while 10 per cent of urban and 14 per cent of rural men commit sexual violence against women (partner and non-partner), said a study.

Over 60 per cent of men think that woman deserves to be beaten, while many think women should tolerate violence to maintain family bonding, according to the study revealed at a city hotel yesterday.

International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR,B) with the help of United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) and Partners for Prevention, an international NGO, conducted the survey from January to June in 2011.

The survey was conducted on 1,254 men in urban and 1,146 men in rural areas.

While addressing the occasion, State Minister for Women and Children Affairs Dr Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury stressed that a topic on gender equality should be in textbooks at school level.

She put emphasis on coordinated efforts to end violence against women.

The study shows 29 to 35 per cent of men sexually abuse women out of their anger or for punishing them, while 57 to 67 per cent just for 'fun'.

After committing violence, about 43 to 51 per cent of perpetrators do not have any reaction, while 37 to 39 per cent feel guilty and 15 to 25 per cent face legal consequence.

The study also placed some recommendations to end violence against women including changing men and boy's gender attitude, comprehensive media awareness campaign, empowerment of women and implementation of more gender equitable policies.

UNFPA Bangladesh representative Arthur Erken and ICDDR, B acting Executive Director Dr MA Salam, also spoke.

## 'Bangabandhu Tower' to be built at DU

Dhaka University (DU) authorities will build a 20storey building named 'Bangabandhu Tower' at Shibbari on the campus to accommodate the class four employees of the university.

The decision of building the tower was taken in a recent syndicate meeting.

The building will be named after the name of the father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman to recall his contribution in the movement of class four employees of the university, said Vice-Chancellor Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique.

"The authorities are working to make the design of the tower and the construction work will begin soon", the VC added.

DU authorities expelled Bangabandhu from DU on charge of spearheading a movement of fourth-class employees on April 17, 1949.

DU withdrew the expulsion order last year at an emergency meeting.

# Govt tolerates for democracy: PM

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the government had tolerated Sunday's "destructive activities of the opposition party" for the sake of continuation of democracy.

The "pre-planned" incidents on that day were designed to foil the trial of war criminals who had perpetrated in killing, rape, looting and arson, she said. Hasina made the remarks while address-

ing the inaugural session of the SME Fair 2011 at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the capital. The premier said that judiciary in the coun-

try is free and independent. "If the accused persons can prove they are

innocent, they will come out from the custody. What is the problem here?" she observed. The present government believes in

healthy competition in democracy where people will freely exercise their right of franchise. For that reason, the government did not act harshly although two people were killed during Sunday's incidents, she said.

Indicating opposition BNP, Hasina said that in the 2008 general elections, the people of the country had rejected this party. "Now they are taking revenge on the people."

She said what is wrong if the government takes action against people who were engaged in money laundering, looting, embezzling ucts of the country.

funds of an orphanage and other evil deeds.

"Even an FBI agent gave her testimony against money laundering during the BNP regime. It was a shame for the whole nation,' she said. The premier said if the government does

not take action against such misdeeds, how the country will advance? Referring to Sunday's incidents, Hasina

said, "What was the reason behind such activ-

ities? Election is the best way to change any government through democratic process." In this connection, she mentioned that the last couple of elections under the present

government were held in a free and fair manner, and in many places, the ruling party backed candidates were defeated. "We show that election can be held freely

and neutrally under a political government, Hasina said. She blamed the opposition party for

putting people under unnecessary pressure by creating anarchy in the country. "We all have seen the non-democratic

system in the name of caretaker government or army backed caretaker government system. We are exercising restraint for the wellbeing of democracy," she said.

## Forged money factory busted in city

## DoE fines 4 brickfields

Department of Environment (DoE) fined four illegal brickfield Tk14.5 lakh in four districts for destroying agricultural land and topsoil during a weeklong eviction drive that ended yesterday.

The brickfields were set up without DoE's clearance certificate destroying agricultural land, said DoE Director Mohammad Munir Chowdhury.

The brickfields are Abdus Sobhan Bricks in Manikganj, Allahar Daan Bricks in Narayanganj, PBC Bricks in Narsingdi and AN Bricks in Nilphamari.

These brickfields destroyed local ecology, caused hazard to public health and shrunk agricultural land, Munir said.

The DoE team also asked the owners to remove all brickfield settings within three weeks.
