Witness identifies Maj Mamun's killers

Prosecution witness Sepoy Keramot Ali identified Nayek Subedar Islam Uddin and Lance Nayek Mozammel Hossain as the killers of Maj Mamun. While giving his deposition before a makeshift court in

the capital, Keramot also identified five soldiers and a civilian who beat up Mamun before he was killed. They took Maj Mamun to the northwest corner of sol-

diers' mess of 24 Rifles Battalion where Islam Uddin and Mozammel Hossain were waiting with firearms.

"Then they killed Mamun sir," said Keramot, who was a member of 24 rifles battalion of the then Bangladesh

Keramot got frightened following the incident and hid

himself in a garden, the witness said before the court trying the accused of Pilkhana carnage case. Later, the defence counsel cross-examined Keramot.

The 20th witness Maj Kamrul was testifying before the court at 2:15pm when the report was filed. Earlier on Monday, another prosecution witness Nayek Motaleb Mia of 24 Rifles Battalion, while giving deposi-

tion, mentioned the names of four soldiers who beat and dragged Major Mamun a few moments before killing him. A total 74 people, including 57 army officers, were

killed during the two-day carnage at Pilkhana headquarters in 2009.

Five arrested for cheating in city

Detective Branch (DB) of police on Tuesday arrested five persons from Mipur of the city on allegation of deceiving and mugging people in the guise of detective police.

The arrestees used to run a marriage media and cheat clients, said DB officials.

The arrestees are Tanvir Hossain Khan alias Kiron, 34, Abul Kalm, 30, Moahammad Abdul Kader, 27, Mohammad Ripon, 20, and Jebin Sultana Kanta, 38.

They were busted from a potential bride's house at Kalyanpur where Tanvir impersonated a bridegroom and introduced himself as an assistant commissioner of DB.

The family members doubted Tanvir's identity and informed the DB police. The police arrested them around 12:10am, said Kazi Moniruzzaman, senior assistant commissioner of DB.

He also said the gang had gone there in a bid to commit robbery.

The arrestees told the police that the house owner, from whose house they were arrested, contacted their marriage media to find a bridegroom for his daughter.

Leaders of different political parties linked Sunday's "secret attacks and destructions" to the nationwide serial blasts on August 17 in 2005, saying that Jamaat carried out such "nefarious acts" under the umbrella of BNP to protect the perpetrators of crimes against humanity and thwart the ongoing trial of war criminals.

Talking to the news agency, they said although the militant group carried out the serial blasts in around 500 spots across the country on August 17, 2005 with differentill attempts, the Sunday's attacks in the city and other parts of the country were launched with an attempt to create a chaotic situation in the country.
