

Suarez banned for 8 matches

Liverpool striker Luis Suarez has been banned for eight matches and fined 40,000 pounds (\$62,800) for racially abusing Manchester United defender Patrice Evra, the FA said on Tuesday. Suarez was found guilty of misconduct and warned about his future conduct after using "insulting words" towards Evra during Liverpool's Premier league match against United at Anfield on Oct. 15, including a reference to the France defender's colour.

From safety to defeat

Pakistan win Test series 2-0

An unlikely resistance came from Mushfigur Rahim and Nasir Hossain on the fifth and final day but their efforts were not good enough for Bangladesh to save the second Test against Pakistan and sign off the year on a bright note yesterday.

Pakistan made a clean sweep by winning all matches on tour when they posted a seven-wicket victory over the Tigers at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, where the home team showed some character through man-of-the-match Shakib Al Hasan's splendid all-round performance after a noshow in the first Test in Chittagong. Bangladesh looked competitive for the first time in the series during the second Test after surrendering meekly in the lone T20, three ODIs and first Test match. The most encouraging part in the second Test was that there had been three sessions in which the Tigers did not lose any wickets, which showed that this Bangladesh line-up were

capable of batting with resolve, but the missed catches and poor umpiring undermined what could have been a better performance.

The Tigers' welldocumented tendency to collapse was on everybody's minds when they resumed their second innings on 114 for five under foggy condition but the 117-run sixth wicket stand between Mushfigur and Nasir kept Pakistan waiting for victory till the last session. 

Niloka Ilievski's rocky seven-month stint with Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) came to a premature end yesterday, after the football governing body confirmed that he had resigned from the post for personal reasons.

The announcement came a few hours before the Macedonian was scheduled to depart for home last night and brings an end to his seven-month tenure which still had another five months to run.

"The NTMC [National Team Management Committee] tried to give its highest assistance to the coach, who worked independently without any interference," said NTMC chairman Badal Roy yesterday.

"In six to seven month under his guidance, the performance of the national football team has improved although the result of the SAFF Championship was not good. We

were hesitating to take a decision regarding the coach but at the same time [on Tuesday] he himself tendered his resignation. It was accepted by the NTMC after consent from Kazi Salahuddin," added Badal Roy during a press conference at the BFF House, in which Ilievski was also present.

Ilievski becomes the fourth national coach to depart in four years under the National Team Management Committee (NTMC). Not one completed their tenure with Bangladesh.


"You all know that the situation after the tournament (SAFF Championship) was difficult for me, but really I have personal problems and thus resigned from the post," said Ilievski.

"I'll have to undergo a ligament operation. I need two to three months to recover it and it is not possible for me to continue with Bangladesh football after the operation. However, I want to thank the Bangladesh Football Federation and the journalists for


