Textbooks to reach students on time

Early start of work makes the process easy

With eight days left for free distribution to get underway, almost all the textbooks for primary and secondary students have already reached the upazilas.

Around 97 percent of more than 10.35 crore primary and 98 percent of some 11.78 crore secondary levels textbooks have been printed and sent to the upazilas till yesterday, National Curriculum and Textbook Board statistics show.

Last year, the government sent only 83 percent primary and 95 percent secondary books to upazilas at this point of time.

"This is the third time we are doing the job and we are confident that we

ACC quizzes Abul over Padma graft

Anti-Corruption Commission officials said investigation into the alleged corruption in Padma bridge project would continue even though former communications minister Syed Abul Hossain denied irregularities in the project's bidding process.

Two separate teams of the ACC--one investigating the project's main bridge construction component and the other the appointment of a supervising firm to oversee the construction--quizzed Abul at his Gulshan home for about an hour on Tuesday.

Suicide bombers kill 40 in Syria

Security service bases attacked

AFP, Damascus

Suicide bombers hit two security service bases in Damascus yesterday, killing 40 people and casting a pall over the first day of work of an Arab observer mission intended to oversee an end to nine months of bloodshed.

The bombings, which officials blamed on Al-Qaeda, were the first attacks against Syria's powerful security services in the heart of the capital since the uprising began and overshadowed new protests against President Bashar al-Assad's regime.

"The new toll for the two attacks today is established at 40 dead and 150 injured", foreign ministry spokesman Jihad Makdissi told AFP.

One bomber tried to ram a vehicle packed with explosives into the compound of the General Security Directorate, Syria's most important plain-clothes security service, in the Kfar Suseh neighbourhood of Damascus, witnesses said.

A second blew up a vehicle outside a nearby military intelligence building.

State television showed pictures of a huge crater at one of the bomb sites and pools of blood on surrounding

Abdur Razzak passes away

Veteran Awami League leader Abdur Razzak, one of the key organisers of Bangladesh's Liberation War in 1971, breathed his last at a London hospital yesterday, thus bringing a 50-year illustrious career in politics to a close. He was 69.

Razzak, who was considered a "living history" of the birth of Bangladesh, was suffering from kidney and liver ailments and had been undergoing treatment at King's College Hospital in London since September.

He had been kept on life support for three days before the end came. Doctors withdrew his life support yesterday when it became clear that there

Does president have power to appoint CEC, EC members?

While commencing a dialogue with political parties on Thursday at Bangabhaban, President Zillur Rahman in his written speech stated: "You are perhaps also aware that the constitution of the People's Republic of Bangladesh in article 118 dealing with formation of the Election Commission, empowers the president to appoint the chief election commissioner and other election commissioners." AL'S PICK FOR COMILLA CITY POLLS

Intra-party conflict major challenge

Long-lasting internal conflicts within the local Awami League and its dissidents have posed a serious challenge to party favourite Afzal Khan's prospects of winning the mayoral race in the maiden Comilla City Corporation polls on January 5.

Also, confusion reigns over the role of a few local AL lawmakers in Afzal's polls campaign. Many AL activists and voters believe that his fate will largely depend on the lawmakers' stance.

However, Afzal's main contender

Monirul Hoque Sakku is enjoying widespread support from the leaders of the main opposition BNP, though he quit the party on December 7.

Several local BNP leaders insisted that Sakku, former joint secretary general of Comilla (south) BNP, had resigned from the party in consultation with the party high-ups.

Earlier, BNP decided not to back any candidate in the polls as the Election Commission declared to introduce electronic voting machines in all polling centres.

25 hurt in Khulna BCL-JCD clash

At least 25 people including five policemen were injured in a fierce clash between the activists of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) and Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) at Azam Khan Govt Commerce College here yesterday over receiving the admission seekers on the campus.

Of the injured, four JCD leaders -- Rakibul, Saiful, Prince and Lubin -- were admitted to Khulna Sadar Hospital and Khulna Medical College Hospital with bullet wounds.

Witnesses said the brawl broke out around 11:00am when some members of the two rival student organisations were receiving the admission seekers on the college campus.

The newcomers yesterday took a test for admission in the first year honours class under National University.

Later the supporters of both the organisations resorted to vandalism from Commerce College Road to PTI Road damaging at least 20 cars and three-wheeler

Cold wave to continue

People in northern region worst sufferers

The mild cold wave that is sweeping over Rajshahi and Rangpur divisions and the regions of Jessore and Kushtia may continue for a few more days, Met Office said.

The bone-chilling cold spell with dense fog and biting wind has paralysed normal life mainly in the northern part of the country. Meanwhile, the distribution of warm clothes so far is seen to be inadequate.

Country's lowest temperature of 6.5 degrees Celsius was recorded in Rajshahi yesterday and the highest 25.2 degrees in Sylhet.

Day and night temperatures may rise slightly in Khulna, Barisal and Chittagong divisions and may remain nearly unchanged elsewhere over the country, UNB said quoting the Met Office.

Our district correspondents reported that with the increase of cold-related afflictions in people especially the children and elderly, the number of deaths is rising.

In Rajshahi's Baghmara, two elderly women died early yesterday. Family sources said Bilkis Bewa, 80, and Noor Jahan, 70, died fighting cold.

Abdul Hannan, deputy commissioner of Rajshahi, said they have got an allocation of 1,400 blankets and warm clothes from the prime minister's disaster and relief store on Thursday. Those would be brought to Rajshahi after the weekly holidays and distributed after taking requisition from local MPs.

He said 15 percent of the 24 lakh people in the district are extremely poor. The allocation is inadequate and they have
