Crafting Metal

at Dhamrai

Broken lock, a rickshaw bell, a water tap, a key - in the jumble of metallic junk, these catch my eye. A worker is carefully sifting through the pieces, mixing them in correct proportion into containers before weighing them. They will be melted and used to make intricate metal sculptures and art objects treasured by collectors worldwide.

I am visiting Sukanta Banik of Dhamrai Metal Crafts, about 25km from Dhaka, on this cool Saturday morning.

When a friend introduced us six years ago, I was impressed by the fine craftsmanship of Sukanta's artistic pieces: statues, animals, boats and everyday objects. With the confidence of a mature artist, he had showed me all aspects of his craft.

Today, Sukanta is just as welcoming. "Feel free to look and take pictures," he says. At 8am several craftsmen are already at work.

His process for making sculptures is called Lost Wax Casting. It takes several steps.

First, a wax model of the sculpture is made with fine details. This is the most time-consuming step.

Once the wax model is ready, it is covered with several layers of a *doashla-etel* clay found in the riverbanks of Dhamrai.

After the clay dries, the model is baked in an oven. The wax melts away, leaving behind a clay mould. Molten metal is poured into this mould, and, when it cools, the mould is broken to retrieve the sculpture. Finishing touches are now applied.

Each piece is unique: one mould yields one sculpture.

"Dhamrai has a rich history of craftsmanship, going back 500 years"

says Sukanta. His family is one of a handful that maintains this tradition. His ancestors have been involved with metal craft through five generations, 200 years. Starting out as traders in art objects, they eventually became artists and manufacturers.

I ask Sukanta how long it takes to make a piece.

"A smaller item takes two months, but a large, intricate piece such as a big statue can take up to a year," he says.

Each piece is unique, he says, and can be sold in the international market.

Bronze and brass everyday items, such as glasses, plates, *kolshis*, *bodnas*, were once used heavily. Nowadays, these items are mass-manufactured from plastic and melamine, so the market for handmade metallic utility items has shrunk. The craftsmen now focus mostly on art objects.

"Who are your customers?" I ask Sukanta.

"Mostly overseas collectors of religious and folk icons," he says. "I also sell to temples in Bangladesh."

Sukanta says a large export market awaits the products because, unlike mass-produced metal-craft from India, every item is unique. Yet there are hurdles. He recommends the following actions: speeding up (export) customs inspections for verifying metal crafts are not antiques; government support for metal craftsmen to attend trade fairs and exhibitions; and easing the prices of metal by increasing supply and clamping down on smuggling.

Before leaving, I take a last look at his sculptures. Indeed, they could be a tasteful addition to many collections worldwide.

Razzak's death condoled

Harmful 'Parthenium' plants grow in Rajshahi

Australian weed specialist suggests wiping out as it is threat to human health, environment

Parthenium, a harmful plant for human beings, livestock and cash crop fields, has appeared in the district creating massive apprehension among the agriculture researchers and others concerned.

Besides the roadsides the plant is spreading rapidly in the crop fields as weed which is still beyond knowledge of the public in general.

Dr Israil Hossain, Principal Scientific Officer of Regional Wheat Research Station, apprehended that the plant has apparently appeared in the country from India with wheels of the goods-laden trucks running from the Sonamasjid and Benapole Land Ports.

Referring various research findings, he said the plant causes allergy, asthma and skin diseases in human body even from 10km far away which is a matter of grave concern relating to the overall public health.

He underscored the need for awareness on ill effects of parthenium as it's destructive leading to disappearance of many shrubs and herbs in the roadside area and posed threat to survival of chlorophyll tuberosum used in health tonics.

Weed Specialist Prof Dr Steve Adkinov of Queensland University of Australia had witnessed the plant along the roadside and crop fields on his three-day research tour in the area.

He also addressed a seminar organised by Shah Agriculture Information Library at Manda in Naogaon on Wednesday.

He deliberated on various issues of biodiversity and environment and felt that there is a need for committed social movements to create public awareness on the ill effects of parthenium on human health and environment.

Revealing various bad impacts, he said adverse effects of Parthenium not only on human beings but also on animal health have been well documented.

It is known to cause asthma, bronchitis, dermatitis and hay fever in human beings and livestock. The chemical analysis has indicated that all the plant parts, including trichomes and pollen contain toxins called sesquiterpene lactones.

Dr Steve said the major components of toxic being 'parthenin' and other phenolic acids such as caffeic acid, vanillic acid, anisic acid, p- anisic acid, chlorogenic acid and parahydroxy benzoic acid are lethal to human beings and animals.

He, however, said the problem can be solved by educating the common people about the harms of this weed immediately.

Taking part in the discussion other researchers underscored the need for combating the menace through collaborative efforts involving government agencies, NGOs and others stakeholders.

Execute JS body suggestions

Student leaders urge govt

A section of former and current student leaders yesterday urged the government to execute the recommendations made in parliamentary standing committee on the education ministry's report regarding the student unrest in August 2007.

On August 20 that year, Dhaka University students resorted to demonstration after some army personnel beat up a student during a football match on DU central playground. The demonstrations continued for three days, triggering nationwide protests.

Hundreds of Dhaka University students and several teachers were tortured by the law-enforcers during and after the unrest.

The standing committee's report has proved that leaders of the then caretaker government and the army were responsible for the torture and repression against the students during the unrest.

Welcoming the report, the student leaders, in a joint statement, said the student community took to the streets back then protesting injustice and repression.

Manabendra Dev, Aparna Pal, Sheikh Sohel Rana Tipu, Sazzad Sakib Badsha, Siddique Nazmul Alam, Hasan Mamun, Saiful Islam Feroz, Rafiqul Islam Sujon Samsul Alam Sazzan, were among the signatories in the statement.
