

# Random tree felling goes on in Sundarbans

Random extraction of trees and other forest resources from the Sundarbans is causing depletion to the world's largest mangrove forest.

The unscrupulous act threatens human habitations in the nearby areas as the forest acts as a shield to protect the country's south-western region from the onslaught of natural disasters, in addition to serving as source of livelihood for thousands of people.

Besides, the government is deprived of huge revenue as the trees are felled illegally in connivance with a section of dishonest forest officials.

Super cyclone Sidr that hit the country's southern region on November 15

in 2007 caused large scale damage to the Sundarbans.

The next year, the government imposed ban on extraction of forest resources from the Sundarbans to prevent its further depletion and also to help natural recovery of the mangrove forest.

Ignoring the ban, wood cutters and timber traders continued extracting different species of trees including sundari, garan, hetal, bain and others from the forest.

During recent visits to different areas of the Sundarbans, this correspondent found open sale of the extracted trees at Shyamnagar Sadar, Noabek Bazar, Bhetkhali Bazar and other places in the upazila.

The act continues throughout the year, locals said.

"I bought trees extracted from the Sundarbans from Harej Ali and Aminur Rahman of Bhetkhali village and Abdus Samad and Shahar Ali Mollah of Tengrakhali village in Shyamnagar upazila at dead of night," said Rouf Gazi, a log seller of Bhetkhali village.

Tree plundering continues in the Sundarbans due to lack of adequate action by law enforcers, said several locals.

Contacted, Assistant Conservator of Forest Toufiqul Islam said, "We will intensify action against the plunderers who are extracting trees from the Sundarbans ignoring the government ban."

## Robbers kill boy in Pirojpur, mob beat 'robber' dead in Tangail

Robbers killed a teenage boy in Pirojpur while an alleged robber was beaten to death by mob in Tangail yesterday.

In Pirojpur, a teenage boy was shot dead by robbers and 12 people were injured during a clash between villagers and robbers at Dakhin Matibanga village in Bhandaria upazila early yesterday, reports UNB.

The deceased was identified as Yusuf Mollah, 16.

Police and witnesses said a gang of 10/12 robbers entered the house of Idris Mollah at the village by breaking open the door at around 2:00am.

As the family members cried for help, locals rushed there and surrounded the house. At one stage, the robbers opened fire, leaving Yusuf, a neighbour of Idris Mollah, dead on the spot.

Later, the robbers attacked the villagers in a bid to flee, triggering a clash that left 12 people, including a robber, injured.

Among the injured, Majid Hawlader and Russell Hawlader

were admitted to Bhandaria Upazila Health Complex.

The villagers caught one of the robbers, Kashem, along with a gun and nine bullets and beat him up. Seriously injured robber was admitted to Barisal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College and Hospital.

Our Tangail correspondent reported that an alleged robber was beaten to death and another seriously injured by a mob in Basail upazila.

The deceased was identified as Fores Ali, 45, of Tangailpara village in Kurigram Sadar. The injured is Abdus Salam, 35, of Makhoner Char village under Dewanganj upazila of Jamalpur.

Habibullah Sarkar, officer-in-charge of Basail police station said a gang of 8-9 robbers entered the house of Mojibar Rahman at Guilla village around 2:30am.

Hearing screams of the family members, locals rushed to the spot and caught two of the gang. They beat Fores dead on the spot and injured Salam.

Later, police rushed to the village,

rescued the injured robber and admitted him to Tangail General Hospital.

Two separate cases were filed with Basail police station in this connection.

In Pabna, Rab arrested three robbers and recovered 10 sharp weapons, including nine swords and a machete from their possession at Banglabazar village in Sadar upazila on Saturday, reports our correspondent.

Acting on a tip-off that a gang of robbers are holding a secret meeting in Banglabazar Chotopara area, an operation team of Rab-12 raided the area at about 8:00 pm and arrested three gang members while the rest managed to flee.

The arrestees are Md Shamim Sheikh, Md Rana and Md Mofizul Haque. They hail from Banglabazar and Jorirpur villages in Sadar upazila.

According to their statements, Rab recovered 10 sharp weapons including nine swords and a machete from their possession. The arrestees were sent to jail yesterday.

## BCL activist stabbed to death in Magura

An activist of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) was stabbed to death by one of his rivals in the party in Niznandu area of the district town yesterday afternoon.

The deceased was identified as Al Amin, 18, son of Hashmat Ali Mollah of Mollapara in the town, said Sheikh Alamgir Hossain, officer in-charge of Magura Sadar Police Station.

Witnesses said BCL activist Tushar of the area stabbed Al Amin at around 1:30pm following an altercation over food distribution at a programme held at Nomani Maidan in the town, marking the death anniversary of former AL lawmaker advocate Asaduzzaman.

The victim succumbed to his injuries at Magura Sadar Hospital at around 2:15pm. Later, locals caught Tushar and handed him over to police.

## BSF returns body

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) yesterday returned the body of a Bangladeshi cattle trader, said BGB Benapole check post camp Commander Joynal Hossain.

BSF handed over the body of Tarikul Islam, 32, son of Hamjer Ali of Pachvulote village of the district, to the members of Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) at around 5:30pm.

BSF of Bornobaria camp caught Tarikul with cattle recently and beat him dead. They took away the body from the spot, police said.

## A bridge in dire need of repair

The iron bridge over Moukar canal flowing between Lebukhali and Lawkathi unions under Dumki upazila in the district has remained in an awfully dilapidated condition for two years.

Built in 1990 by Local Government Engineering Department (LGED), the 240-metre-long bridge has hardly undergone any repair or renovation.

The bridge virtually collapsed two years ago when it was hit by a sand-laden cargo, said Md Kalu Mollah, Ansar-VDP commander of Lebukhali union, also a resident of Lebukhali village.

"A portion of the bridge broke down and most of its slippers also got displaced. We are using the bridge by setting up bamboo on the collapsed part," he said.

Now schoolchildren have to cross the canal by boat as they cannot use the risky bridge, said Rafiq Mia, another resident of the village.

Several thousand people from different unions of Dumki and Patuakhali

Sadar upazilas still use the bridge as they have to cross the canal to come to Moukar Bazar, a large market situated to the east of the bridge.

Besides, there are two primary schools, three colleges, two high schools, a technical college, a community clinic and a madrasa at nearby places.

Hasan Mahmud Dulal, chairman for Lebukhali union parishad, said they submitted proposal to LGED on several occasions demanding renovation of the bridge but in vain.

When contacted, Md Fuad Hossen, upazila engineer of LGED in Dumki, said, "Now LGED does not repair or rebuild iron bridges and so, we cannot take any step in this regard. The upazila parishad can repair the bridge by taking a project under their annual development programme."

Dumki Upazila Nirbahi Officer Md Asaduzzaman said, "We hope to renovate the bridge soon if we can get the project approved in the upazila parishad meeting."

### Child drowns

Police recovered the body of a young man from Madarganj village of Sadar upazila on Saturday afternoon. The victim was identified as Sohel Rana, 22, son of Tosimuddin of Jamalpur Barapugi village in the upazila. Md Jahidul Islam, sub-inspector of Thakurgaon Police Station, said on information, they recovered Sohel's body from a sugarcane field at the village at about 4:00pm. The body was sent to Thakurgaon Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy. Criminals might have strangled Sohel, the SI added.

Nineteen shops were gutted in a fire at ferry ghat (terminal) area of Kalapara upazila town early yesterday.


Locals and shop owners said the fire originated from an electric short at a plastic shop at around 4:00 am and soon engulfed 18 other shops in the area.
