'Make teachers, students aware of sexual abuse'

Speakers yesterday opined for creating awareness among students and teachers to resist sexual harassment in educational institutions.

They said this at a viewexchange meeting on "Forming anti-sexual code of conducts in educational institutions managed by Chittagong City Corporation (CCC)" organised by Adolescent Development Foundation (ADF), Bangladesh at a restaurant in the port city.


Presenting the keynote paper, ADF Consultant Syeda Sajida Khanam Snigdha said sexual harassment in educational institutions is a burning issue at current. Adolescent girls are being

harassed in educational institutions by their classmates, senior students and, also, by their teachers, she said. Giving examples, she said

there are incidents where the teacher, accused of harassing students, remained unpunished. A teacher, dismissed for

sexual harassment, manages a job in another school very shortly, she said. Thus ultimately, this teacher remained out of punishment, she added. ADF General Secretary

Saroj Kanti Das said there are 85 educational institutions managed by CCC, and ADF is trying to formulate some common code of conducts for these institutions to resist sexual harassment of the female students.

5 brick kilns fined

Five illegal brick kilns were fined Tk 1.30 lakh in a drive at the port city's Chandanaish upazila yesterday.

A joint team comprising officials of the Department of Environment (DoE), Chittagong and the local administration gave the drive led by DoE senior chemist Jashim Uddin.

The kilns were fined on charge of attempting to burn bricks using a banned technology, says a press release.

They also did not have discharge certificate and license of burning bricks. The team fined M/s Syed

Ali Fakir Bricks Tk 10,000, M/s Shaheen Bricks Tk 50,000, M/s Ayas Bricks Manufacturer Tk 10,000, M/s Ali Shah Bricks Manufacturer Tk 50,000 and M/s Ali-Riad BricksTk10,000.

The team also directed the authorities to stop activities in the kilns and to show cause by appearing in the DoE, Chittagong office today.

Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) is preparing a plan for the development of private sector of Bangladesh, said a visiting Jica delegation yesterday.



EIU Democracy Index 2011

Bangladesh's position unchanged

The process of democratisation is "stagnating" in Bangladesh, according to a new report by the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU).

The EIU is a think-tank affiliated with The Economist, a London-based news and international affairs publication.

The latest edition of the EIU's Democracy Index that measures the state of democracy in 167 countries sees that Bangladesh hold on to its ranking at number 83, with only a minimal improvement in its index score from the previous edition.

The index is based on a set of 60 indicators grouped into five different categories that combine to give a score out of 10 for each country.

Based on the score attained in the compares favourably its neighbours;

index, countries are put into one of four categories: full democracies (those scoring between 8 and 10), flawed democracies (6-7.9), hybrid regimes (4-5.9), and authoritarian regimes (below 4).

Last year's report saw Bangladesh jump up eight places from its previous edition, which had come out in 2008, with a score of 5.86. Somewhat disappointingly, the country's score has moved just a tick in the 2011 edition, to 5.87.

That means Bangladesh has failed to move out of the bracket for "hybrid regimes", as classified by the EIU.


The ranking at number 83 puts Bangladesh ahead of a clutch of countries like Bolivia, Turkey and Lebanon, and just behind a pack containing Singapore, Ukraine, and Ghana.

Regionally, Bangladesh's position

only India and Sri Lanka, at 39 and 57, are ranked higher. The likes of Pakistan, Bhutan and Nepal languish outside the top 100 list, with Bhutan highest at 104 with a score of 4.57.

The white paper accompanying this year's index is titled "Democracy under stress" to capture a year in which some Arab nations abandoned authoritarian regimes, yet the average democracy score in the index declined, including in North America and Western Europe, usually considered to bethe bastions of democracy.

Possibly the most perceptive observation in the report is that economic crisis is "subtly eroding democracy" in even advanced nations, as evidenced by the resignations of the elected Italian and Greek prime ministers in the aftermath of the crisis engulfing the eurozone.
