

# Boro cultivation may be delayed in 8 N districts

**Cold wave, fog damage seedbeds**

Boro cultivation in eight northern districts under Rangpur division is likely to be delayed in the current season as persistent cold wave coupled with dense fog during the last couple of weeks damaged a large portion of seedbeds prepared for the purpose.

The seedlings meant for transplantation are turning yellowish due to the adverse weather, said farmers of different areas in the region.

Spraying pesticides did not come of much help to save the seedbeds and boro production may be hampered due to scarcity of seedlings if the situation continues further, they said.

"I raised boro seedlings on a 10-decimal land but half of the tender plants have already been damaged. If the remaining seedlings are spoilt I will not be able to cultivate boro this season," said Foroz Ali, 60, a farmer of Ikorchari village in Taraganj upazila under Rangpur district.

"I procured quality boro seeds for high prices to prepare seedbeds on 25 decimals of land with the hope to get a good yield. But now I am frustrated due to the damage caused by weather," Helal Miah, a farmer of Talimganj village under Mithapukur upazila in Rangpur, said.

Boro cultivation as a whole will be delayed as many farmers will have to prepare fresh seedbeds and at least one month will be

required for the seedlings to mature, farmers said.

According to the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE), 38,706 hectares of land have been used for preparing boro seedbeds in eight districts of Rangpur division in the current season but about 25 to 30 per cent seedbeds have been affected by intense cold wave and dense fog.

The DAE has set a target to bring 7,74,130 hectares of land under boro cultivation

in Rangpur division during the current season but the target may not be achieved due to the adverse weather condition, officials said.

"Cold wave usually hits Rangpur division in mid January when the boro plants become mature. But this year it hit earlier, causing damage to immature boro plants," said Md Golam Subhani, deputy director of the DAE.

"BRRI dhan-28 and 29 are most popular varieties in the

area for boro cultivation but they do not have cold tolerant characteristics. And so, the seedbeds are getting damaged," he said.

DAE officials are suggesting the farmers to irrigate the boro seedbeds properly and mix cow dung with the irrigated water so that the soil temperature remains high. They also suggested covering the seedbeds with polythene to save them from cold and fog.

## PRIMARY TERMINAL EXAM RESULTS

Comilla Modern School top in Ctg divn

## Outlaw held, six bombs found in Pabna

Police yesterday arrested a regional leader of the outlawed Purbo Banglar Communist Party (PBCP) in Pabna Sadar upazila and recovered a firearm from his possession.

The arrestee, Kamal Hossain, 28, son of Abdul Hamid of Sonapur village, is the regional leader of the outfit and also an accused in several cases.

Acting on a tip-off, detectives raided his house at around 3:00pm and arrested him with a two barrel gun and four bullets.

The deceased was identified as Reza Mandol, 35, son of Muja Mandol of Barakandi area.

Reza's wife Shahnaz said he left home on Sunday morning and did not return at night. His mobile phone remained switched off, she added.

Locals found his body floating on the pond on Monday afternoon and informed police who recovered the body that bore injury marks.

Police said criminals killed Reza and took away his vehicle. No one was arrested as of 5:00pm yesterday.

JP leader murdered in Joypurhat

A union Jatiya Party leader was murdered at Atapur union of Pachbibi upazila in Joypurhat district at midnight on Monday, police said.

Fazlur Rahman 52, president of Atapur union Jatiya Party, was hacked to death by unidentified criminals, they said.

Fazlur, son of late Abbas Ali of Netapara-Niranjan village in the upazila, was an elected member of Atapur Union Parishad. He was returning home riding his motorcycle after attending a marriage party at midnight, police quoting family members said.

When he reached Bazitpur village on Pachbibi-Joypurhat road, a gang of unidentified criminals waylaid him and hacked him to death with a sharp weapon. Later, the criminals dumped the body on a nearby paddy field and left the scene with the motorcycle belonging to Fazlur.

Locals found the body at around 10:00am yesterday and informed the police who recovered the body and sent it to Joypurhat Adhunik Hospital for autopsy.

Pachbibi police station officer in-charge Abul Kalam Azad said Fazlur might have been killed by his rivals.

A S M Tita S Mostafa, district convener of Jatiya Party (Ershad), demanded a fair investigation into the killing and punishment to the killers.

### 48 bullets found in Sherpur

Police recovered 48 bullets of Chinese rifle from bordering Balijuri village in Shreebordi upazila yesterday morning.

Acting on a tip-off, the law enforcers went to the area and found the bullets in a polythene bag on a mustard field behind Bulijuri High School.

### Trucker killed in wall collapse

## Vehicles go off Jessore, Narail roads as strike continues

**Seven buses, trucks vandalised, passengers' sufferings mount**

Transport owners and workers of Jessore and Narail districts continued their strike for the second day yesterday.

President of Jessore Bus Owners' Association Md Ali Akbar said it is not at all be possible to resume transport services until roads of the two districts are repaired.

At least seven vehicles were vandalised on the road in front of Jessore Government City College yesterday and the day before.

Jessore and Narail District Bus Owners' Association and Bangladesh Paribahan Sangstha Sramik Samity jointly enforced an indefinite transport on Jessore-Narail route on Monday demanding immediate repair of the damaged roads in the two districts, reports UNB.

Our correspondents from Benapole and Narail reported that transport owners and workers staged demonstrations in Jessore

and Narail towns and in other parts of the districts yesterday and on Monday to press for their demand.

President of Jessore Bus Owners' Association Md Ali Akbar said it is not at all be possible to resume transport services until roads of the two districts are repaired.

We have been compelled to call the strike for an indefinite period getting response neither from the Road & Highway Department (RHD) nor from the deputy commissioner of Jessore despite several reminders in writing, he said.

President of Jessore Transport Workers' Association Azizul Alam Mintu said the strike will continue until the demand is met. "We called off strike several times earlier on request from RHD officials and the deputy commis-

sioner who had assured us of meeting our demand for renovation of the damaged road, but they failed to act upon their commitment."

Transport owners associations of Jessore and Narail had earlier staged demonstration in support of the demand and submitted a memo to the

ministry concerned, but to no effect, Mintu added.

Transport workers alleged roads and highways in the two districts have become dilapidated and the department concerned is not taking any step to repair the damaged roads despite repeated reminders.

The strike has mounted sufferings to the commuters, especially the long route bus passengers of southeastern districts who use the route to travel to and from the capital.
