Jamilur Reza, Abdul Malik receive Quazi Azher Ali memorial medal

Former adviser to a caretaker government Dr Jamilur Reza Chowdhury and National Heart Foundation founder National Prof Brig (retd) Abdul Malik were awarded Quazi Azher Ali Memorial Gold Medal 2011 yesterday.

Bangladesh University and Quazi Azher Ali Foundation organised the awarding programme at the university campus marking the university's 10th founding anniversary and to award the medal for the second time.

Gold medals and certificates were also presented to the awardees, Dr Jamilur, for his contribution in education, and Malik, for his contribution in health.

Dr Kamal escapes unhurt from accident

Eminent jurist Dr Kamal Hossain yesterday escaped a possible accident on Dhaka-Aricha highway as a police van from the motorcade of Communications Minister Obaidul Quader drove recklessly and came face to face with his microbus.

The microbus carrying Dr Kamal was returning

to Dhaka from Aricha in Manikganj. The police van from the rear of the minister's caravan suddenly tried to advance by overtaking other vehicles ahead, while the microbus from the opposite direction was crossing the place the same time, witnesses said. This brought the van and the microbus face-to-

face as there was no space for crossing on the twolane road. At this stage, Dr Kamal sharply asked his microbus driver to stop and signaled and asked the protocol van to stop too. Everything happened in a few seconds.

Learning about Dr Kamal and the incident, Quader got down from his car, came forward and ordered stand release of the van's driver then and there.

During his visit, the communications minister ordered the roads and highways department (RHD) to put dividers at all the 22 risky turning points on Dhaka-Aricha highway to check road accidents, according to sources.

Two 'commit suicide' in city

A garment worker and a housewife allegedly committed suicide in two separate incidents in the city's Ramna and Gulshan area yesterday.

The deceased were garment worker Shilpi Begum, 22, of Mirbagh in Ramna, and Shahinur Akhter Anju of Kalachandpur in Gulshan.

Sub-inspector (SI) Jamal Hossain of Ramna Police Station said police recovered the body of Shilpi from her residence at around 4:30pm.

The neighbours said Shilpi had a quarrel with her husband Shamsul, a sweeper. Following the quarrel, Shamsul went out of home around 3:30pm. After returning home, he brought down the body, which was hanging from ceiling fan with a scarf,

and fled the scene. SI Siddiqur Rahman of Gulshan Police Station said police recovered the body of Shahinur from her

residence early yesterday. Shahinur's husband Mostafiz and local people said Shahinur had been suffering from mental disorder.

Fire breaks out at RMG factory

Several workers were injured in a fire incident at a ready-made garment factory in the city's Hazaribagh yesterday.

Fire Service and Civil Defence officials said four units of fire-fighters aided by the employees of the seven-storey Common Sense Garments Ltd doused the fire that had started at 3:20pm.

The workers were injured during their bid to put out the fire, the officials added.

Hazaribagh police told The Daily Star that the fire had originated from a generator on the ground floor and caught the Jhut (garment byproducts) dumped there.

The dead was identified as Sohrab Ali, 22, son of Akbar Ali of Satkhira.



BDR MUTINY

Mutineers were alerted to possible army attack: PW

Mutineers at Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) headquarters on Feb 25, 2009 took up arms and returned to their positions soon after the home minister left Pilkhana quarters after talks with them.

They were asked by their leaders to remain alert against a probable attack on the BDR headquarters by the army.

Major Abdullah Al Mamun yesterday revealed these crucial moments during his deposition before a session judge's court set up at the Alia Madrassa ground in the city. He was the 22nd prosecution witness of the BDR carnage case.

"All lights were switched off and gates locked. We were asked not to make any noise", he said.

Confined inside a prison cell of the quarter guard, Mamun watched the events unfold through a hole in his cell door. Earlier he saw jawans surrendering their weapons to the home minister.

"But after she left, the jawans took up weapons again," he said.

Maj Mamun hid behind a steel wardrobe at a clerk's office inside Pilkhana when the mutiny broke out on February 25. He heard Deputy Assistant Director (DAD) Nasir giving orders over a loudspeaker asking soldiers to take up arms from a pick-up van and prepare for a fight.

Mamun managed to contact army officers over his cell phone and alert them about the situation inside Pilkhana. He also suggested suitable strategies to tackle the armed jawans.

However, he was soon found out. Mamun said he heard someone announce over loudspeakers: "Major Mamun is in hiding inside Pilkhana and informing the cantonment about us. He suggested the army attack us with tanks.

Find him and kill him." The mutineers dragged him out and beat

him with the butt of rifles. "When they prepared to shoot me, begged for my life for the sake of my children," he recalls.

Mamun was then confined in the prison cell from where he was rescued on February 26.

Following his deposition, defence lawyers cross-examined him.

Counsel Aminul Islam told him that an

officer like a DAD did not have the authority to make announcements under BDR laws. They asked him how he could be sure that he heard DAD Nasir make these announcements. Mamun said that DAD Nasir did indeed

make the announcements and that he (Major Mamun) recognised the man because of his familiarity with Nasir's voice.

The court will resume today with further

cross-examination of the witness. 74 people, including 57 army officers, were killed during the two-day mutiny.

AL govt must reply for secret killing: Khaleda

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia last night said the Awami League (AL) government will have to reply to the international court for carrying out secret killings.

Accusing the government for secret killings, she said people will not spare them (AL) time and again. Postindependence Awami League government had killed 40,000 people, including freedom fighters, she added. They (AL) will have to answer to people for the killing, said

Khaleda.

She told a function marking exchange of greetings with the Christian Community at her Gulshan office at 9:00pm on the occasion of Christmas Day and New Year 2012.

Col Qadir's son visits his grave first time

"My father's memory was like a dream. But now, sitting beside his grave, I can feel his presence," said Naweed Qadir, son of the War of Liberation martyr Lt Col Mohammad Abdul Qadir yesterday. Col Qadir's wife Hasna Hena Qadir was pregnant with her

third child, Naweed, when the Pakistani army "arrested" the martyr from his Chittagong residence on April 17, 1971 and killed him for his role in the War of Liberation.

Since then the body and the grave were traceless. But the eldest son, Nadeem Qadir, in his relentless search since 1990, discovered the site in Panchlaish of Chittagong in 2007 where the Pakistani army had killed and buried Col Qadir.

This was for the first time that Naweed, an IT expert working in New Zealand, visited his father's grave, accompanied by Nadeem, his sister Rubina Qadir Hussain and the army garrison Chief Brig Gen Shams Khan.



Prof Razia Khan passes away

Dr Razia Khan Amin, an eminent litterateur and English professor at Dhaka University, passed away in a city hospital last night at the age of 75.

She had been ill for quite some time.

Prof Razia Khan Amin, daughter of distinguished politician and social activist Moulvi Tamizuddin Khan, is survived by her husband, a son, and a daughter.

Born in 1936, Razia Khan started writing short stories and novels at the age of 8. Her first novel was Bot Tolar Upannyash (1958). She authored a number of novels, poems, and plays in both Bangla and English.

Her literary works include the novels Chitrokabbya, Bot Tolar Upannyash, Anukalpa, Padobik, and Draupadi, the last one being translated into English. Argus Under Anaesthesia (1976) and Cruel April (1977) are two of her collections of poems. For her contribution in

Bangla literature, Dr Razia Khan won the Bangla Academy award, the most prestigious literary award in the country, in 1975. She also won the Ekushey Padak (1997), Ananya Award (1998), and Shilpakala Academy Award for her contribution to theatre in Bangladesh.

The namaz-e-janaza of Dr Razia Khan will be held at DU Central Mosque after Zohr prayers today. She will be buried in Banani Graveyard afterwards.

Aasha Mehreen Amin, magazine editor of The Star, a weekly publication of The Daily Star, is the daughter of Prof Razia Khan Amin.

SHOPKEEPER MURDER

Bangshal traders keep shutters down

Traders in the capital's Bangshal and its adjacent areas kept their shutters down till 2:00pm yesterday, protesting the killing of a shopkeeper by muggers.

They also expressed frustration over police reluctance to arrest the killer and recover the looted money worth Tk 10 lakh.

A band of muggers looted the amount after shooting Rubel Chowkider, 25, dead and injuring his co-worker Nasir Gazi, 33, Tuesday afternoon.

Rubel and Nasir, employees of Iqbal Enterprise at Nazira Bazar, were returning to their business establishment after drawing the amount from a bank at Bangshal, locals said. All the shops and business establishments at Bangshal

and its adjacent areas including English Road, Nazira Bazar and North South Road remained closed from morning to 2:00pm yesterday, witnesses said. Iqbal Hossain, owner of Iqbal Enterprise, told The Daily

Star that the traders could not bring out processions in protest at the killing due to interference by law enforcers. He also alleged that police are yet to take any step to nab the culprits. Zamir Uddin, officer-in-charge of Bangshal Police

Station, however, denied the allegation, saying that they are trying their best to arrest the killers and recover the money.
