# 'Nothing frightening' seen in Syria protest hotbed

Say Arab Monitors

Arab League monitors checking if Syria is ending a military crackdown on popular unrest said they saw "nothing frightening" in an initial visit to the protest hotbed of Homs, although a longer investigation would be needed.

Given the brief and limited nature of the monitors' tour on Tuesday, the comment by their chief may alarm opposition activists who fear the mission could end up cloaking Damascus in respectability, whitewashing President Bashar al-Assad's record.

The British-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said security forces killed 15 people across the country Tuesday, six of them in Homs. It said 34 were killed the day before.

"Some places looked a bit of a mess but there was nothing frightening," Sudanese General Mustafa Dabi, chief of the monitoring contingent, told Reuters by telephone from Damascus. "The situation seemed reassuring so far," he said yester-

day after his team's foray into the city of one million people, the epicenter of anti-Assad upheaval inspired by the fall of several other Arab autocrats in uprisings this year.

Syria's Addounia television quoted Dabi as saying "Yes...we saw gunmen in the city of Homs." It gave no further details.

Monitors were scheduled to pay a second visit to Homs yesterday and also go for the first time to the city of Hama, another hotspot of unrest, the Idlib region on the northwest border with Turkey where anti-Assad insurgents have battled security forces, and Deraa in the south, the cradle of the nine-month-old revolt.

Activists say about a third of the estimated 5,000 people killed in unrest in Syria since March died in Homs. Dozens have been killed in the past week alone and thousands arrested in the months before the 22-state Arab League was invited in.

Assad says he is fighting an insurgency by armed terrorists who have killed 2,000 soldiers and police.

State television Wednesday flashed news that Syria has freed 755 people detained in the unrest "whose hands were not stained with Syrian blood." Releasing detainees is part of Assad's pact with the Arab League to defuse the crisis.

But there are still 15,000 Syrians in detention, according to Amnesty International.

Dabi led the first group of monitors to Homs escorted by Syrian authorities. They were shown destruction in the district of Baba Amr, where tanks fired into residential areas the day before, according to amateur video recorded by activists.

Video reports, which cannot be independently verified, have shown parts of Homs looking like a war zone. Constant machinegun and sniper fire is audible and corpses are mangled by blasts.

The monitors represent the first international intervention on the ground in Syria since the revolt began. Protesters hope what they report will nudge the world into action

The State Department condemned an escalation of violence in Homs before the monitors' deployment.

#### Iran threatens to cut key oil route over sanctions

No oil will be permitted to pass through the key oil transit Strait of Hormuz if the West applies sanctions on Iran's oil exports, IranianVice President Mohammad Reza Rahimi warned on Tuesday.

The threat was reported by the state news agency IRNA as Iran conducted navy war games near the Strait of Hormuz, at the entrance of the oil-rich Gulf.

"If sanctions are adopted against Iranian oil, not a drop of oil will pass through the Strait of Hormuz," Rahimi

was quoted as saying. "We have no desire for hostilities or violence... but the West doesn't want to go back on its plan" to impose sanctions, he said.

The threat underlined Iran's readiness to target the narrow stretch of water along its Gulf coast if it is attacked or economically strangled by Western sanctions over its nuclear program.

## N Korea bids farewell to Kim

Wailing North Koreans Wednesday bade a final farewell to longtime leader Kim Jong-Il as his young son and successor walked bareheaded beside his father's coffin through a snowbound Pyongyang.

Tens of thousands of troops bowed their heads as the cortege left the Kumsusan Memorial Palace, where the late strongman's body had lain in state in a glass coffin.

Preceded by a car bearing a huge portrait of a smiling Kim and other vehicles, a limousine carried Kim's coffin -- draped with a red flag and surrounded by white flowers -- on its roof.

His son and "great successor" Jong-Un, dressed in black and gloveless despite the cold, held the side of his father's hearse.

He was accompanied by his influential uncle Jang Song-Thaek; senior ruling party officials Kim Ki-Nam and Choe Thae-Bok; military chief Ri Yong-Ho; armed forces minister Kim Yong-Chun; and Kim Jong-Gak, who is in charge of military administration and organisation. Analysts said the line-up gave some initial clues about

who would influence the young and untested leader as he takes charge of the impoverished and hungry but nucleararmed nation. But hundreds of thousands of shivering soldiers and civil-

ians, many weeping bitterly or beating the frozen ground, were seen on state television lining the 40-kilometre route. "The people bid farewell to father General in great sor-

row," read the main headline in ruling party newspaper Rodong Sinmun. Kim gave North Korea dignity as a country "that manufac-

tured and launched artificial satellites and accessed nukes" the paper's editorial said.

## War crimes charges sent back again

to fix the flaws and submit the charges again next month.

The properly arranged charges against Jamaat Assistant Secretary General Kamaruzzaman have to be placed again by January 12, the three-member tribunal said in its order yesterday.

It said the charges against Jamaat Secretary General Mojaheed be re-submitted by January 16 after rearranging those properly.

Earlier on Monday, the tribunal sent the crimes against humanity charges against former Jamaat-e-Islami Ameer Ghulam Azam back to the prosecution due to flaws in the classification of the charges, and ordered the prosecution to resubmit the properly classified charge sheet by January

Also yesterday, the tribunal headed by its Chairman Justice Nizamul Huq took the charges against another Assistant Secretary General of the party Abdul Quader Molla into cognisance, saying that it found primary elements of offences against him.

It fixed January 29 for further hearing before formal charges are framed against Molla.

Jamaat's Nayeb-e-Ameer Delawar Hossain Sayedee is already undergoing trial on crimes against humanity charges. BNP leader Salauddin Quader Chowdhury, also in prison, is facing similar charges, while his party colleague Abdul Alim, another war crimes suspect, was set on bail for ill health.

The Jamaat and BNP leaders have been accused of collaborating with the Pakistani occupation military in the genocide, rapes, arson and torture of civilian population during Bangladesh's 1971 Liberation War against Pakistan.

The Pakistani troops, in collaboration with their local supporters, killed 30 lakh civilians, raped 2 lakh women and forced more than a crore to flee to neightook time for examining the said Tipoo.

Advocate Tajul Islam, a counsel for accused Jamaat leaders, told reporters that the prosecution brought the charges only to harass his clients politically.

Tajul said the accused Jamaat-e Islami leaders played a role in 1971 to keep Pakistan undivided, but that does not mean that they committed crimes against humanity.

Earlier in the morning, the four detained leaders were brought to the tribunal from prison.

The prosecution submitted formal charges against Nizami, Mojaheed, and Kamaruzzaman before the tribunal on December 11 while the charges against Quader Molla were submitted on December 18.

At least 15 charges of crimes against humanity were brought against each of Nizami and Mojaheed, while around 10 charges were placed against Kamaruzzaman, and seven charges were brought against Quader Molla, prosecutors told The Daily Star.

### Saudi beheads man for murder

A Saudi man was beheaded by the sword in Riyadh for a murder yesterday, the interior ministry said.

Salman al-Ghamedi was found guilty of stabbing to death another Saudi, Ahmed al-Qahtani, following a dispute, the ministry said in a statement carried by SPA state news agency.

#### Sexual assaults rise in US military

The number of sexual assaults reported at the country's prestigious military academies rose sharply for the second year in a row, according to a Pentagon report issued Tuesday.

A total of 65 sexual assault cases were reported at the three academies in 2010-11 compared to 41 reports in the previous academic year, the report said.

The 41 reported sexual assaults reported at the academies in 2009-2010 marked a 64 percent increase from the previous academic period, according to Pentagon documents.

#### Cuba frees five political prisoners

Cuba has freed five political prisoners as part of plans to release some 3,000 detainees -- the largest mass pardon in the regime's history -- dissident leaders said Tuesday.

After the latest release, "at least" 50 political prisoners remain behind bars, according to the Cuban Committee for Human Rights and National Reconciliation (CCDHRN), a watchdog that is technically illegal but tolerated by the Americas' only oneparty Communist regime.

Around 66 Cubans are currently being held as political prisoners by the regime, including 16 held under

"You have enjoyed the benefits of the government's Ekti Bari Ekti Khamar project; and with the assurance of being listed as a freedom fighter along with other government benefits, you have filed a false case with a Pirojpur court against Delawar Hossain Sayedee and made a false statement before the tribunal against him," Sayedee's counsel Manjur Ahmed Ansari told witness Manik Poshari.

Sayedee, Nayeb-e-Ameer of Jamaat, is facing trial in the International Crimes Tribunal on charges of committing crimes testimonies. against humanity during the Liberation War in 1971.

In his statement made before the tribunal on Tuesday, Poshari said ity. Sayedee and his fellow collaborators of the Pakistan army went to his house in Chithalia village of Parerhaat in Pirojpur on May 8, 1971 and captured Ibrahim -- a domestic help at his house.

Later they took him to an army camp in Parerhaat. After consulting with Sayedee, Pakistani soldiers shot Ibrahim dead.

Another counsel Mizanul Islam told the witness that he had filed a false case and made false statements against Sayedee to put the blame of Ibrahim's murder on the Jamaat leader.

The lawyer also argued that Ibrahim was killed at a later date than what Poshari

mentioned in his statement. According to a case filed by Ibrahim's wife on July 16, 1972, the murder was committed on October 1, 1971, he added.

The defence counsels also insisted that the witness made his statement on instructions of his local lawmaker. Poshari, however, denied

the allegations saying, "I didn't testify based on anyone's advice or by receiving any government benefits." During cross-

examinations of the previous five prosecution witnesses, Sayedee's counsels followed a similar approach to discredit them for their
