Power tariff hike

Electricity price has again been raised at the consumer level by 21.2% in two phases. The energy regulatory commission has increased the price to Tk 5.02 from Tk 4.16 per unit. The retail price in the first phase is being raised by Tk 0.55 per unit with retrospective effect from December 1. Another hike of Tk 0.31 will take place on February 1 next year.
