Australia trailed India by 75 runs after a remarkable opening day of the second Test in Sydney on Tuesday, with 13 wickets falling to raise the prospect of another four-day match.

India were skittled out for 191 off 59.3 overs and the hosts lost three early wickets before recovering to 116 for three at the close.

At stumps, skipper Michael Clarke (47) and former captain Ricky Ponting (44) had restored the Australian innings with an unbroken 79-run stand.

Young Australian paceman James Pattinson ripped the heart out of the tourists' decorated batting line-up with four wickets after India won the toss.

Skipper Mahendra Singh Dhoni top-scored with an unbeaten 57 as the tourists fell apart again after being routed for 169 in the second innings of last week's first Test in Melbourne, which they lost by 122 runs inside four days.

Amid the carnage, Sachin Tendulkar, Test cricket's greatest run-scorer, again failed in his pursuit of his hundredth international hundred as he was bowled off an inside edge for 41, giving Pattinson his fourth wicket.

Pattinson, 21, playing in only his fourth Test match, was the chief destroyer and had figures of four for 43 off 14 overs, with wicketkeeper Brad Haddin and short-leg fielder Ed Cowan taking three catches each.

But Australia's innings lurched quickly into trouble with the loss of three wickets in nine overs as Zaheer Khan cushioned the blow of his team's dismal innings.

David Warner was out for eight to Zaheer's sixth ball, snapped up by Tendulkar in the slips after a fumble by

Clarke and Ponting were finding the going easy in the final hour, showing ominous signs of building a big firstinnings lead on the second day.

Pattinson earlier triggered the tourists' slide when had Gautam Gambhir out off the third ball of the match, nudging an outswinger to Clarke at first slip for a duck to continue his poor series.

India have now gone 10 Test innings without a halfcentury opening stand. Rahul Dravid fell to a bat-

pad catch to Cowan in Peter Siddle's second over for five off 33 balls. Danger man Virender

Sehwag had a "life" on 23 when he was dropped by Ponting at second slip off Ben Hilfenhaus, but the big-

a first-ball duck on the first hitter fell to another splendid Pattinson delivery, nicking to Haddin for 30 off 51 balls in the 19th over.

> Pattinson, bowling with beautiful shape, tempted VVS Laxman to edge a drive to Marsh at third slip for a disappointing two after scores of two and one in Melbourne.

> It was a rare batting failure for Laxman at the SCG, which statistically is his most productive scoring venue outside of India -- his five previous Test knocks in Sydney have produced three hundreds and an average of 96.20.

His cheap dismissal left India struggling at 59 for four and while Virat Kohli showed some promise, he too fell to a catch behind, off Siddle for 23.

Ravi Ashwin (20) and Zaheer (0) fell in consecutive balls in Hilfenhaus's last over before tea and were followed by Ishant Sharma

(0) and Umesh Yadav (0) to mop up India's innings.

Tendulkar, 38, has been stranded on 99 Test and oneday international centuries since scoring 111 against South Africa in the World Cup in March.

The Sydney Cricket Ground has been one of the "Little Master's" favourite Test grounds, where he averaged an incredible 221.33 and scored three of his 51 Test hundreds coming into this week's Test.

But he again failed to capitalise on a solid start, following his fluent 73 in Melbourne.

This is the centenary Test match at the SCG, which is only the third ground in Test cricket behind Lord's (123) in London and the Melbourne Cricket Ground (104) to stage 100 Tests. SCOREBOARD

Navy upend Kallis, Petersen put SA on top

Jacques Kallis and Alviro Petersen hit centuries as South Africa dominated the first day of the third and final Test against Sri Lanka at Newlands on Tuesday.

South Africa were 347 for three at the close after being sent in to bat. Kallis, playing in his 150th

Test match, was on 159 not out. He and Petersen (109) put on 205 for the third wicket, a record for South Africa against Sri Lanka. It was a triumphant

return to his home town for Kallis after making the first 'pair' of his career during South Africa's defeat in the second Test in Durban. He was in imperious form as he reached his half-century off 37 balls and his century off 114 deliveries with 17 fours.

His scoring rate slowed later in the day and by the close he had faced 215 balls and hit 21 fours and a six. It was Kallis' 41st Test

century, his ninth at Newlands - and his first against Sri Lanka. He joined Gary Kirsten, the current coach, as the only South Africans to hit centuries against all nine possible Test opponents. Petersen scored a century

on his debut against India in Kolkata in 2009/10 but made only three half-centuries in eight subsequent appearances and was replaced as captain Graeme Smith's opening partner by Jacques Rudolph at the start of this Rudolph was shifted to

number six in the batting order to make way for Petersen, who was rewarded for strong domestic form. Petersen took full advan-

tage of his recall with an authoritative innings which included 13 fours and a six. He saw two partners leave

early, with both Smith and Hashim Amla falling to fast bowler Dhammika Prasad, who replaced the injured

Dilhara Fernando.

There was an anxious wait for Petersen, who was stuck on 99 during the tea break. But he went to his century in the first over after the resumption, off 165 balls, before playing a loose drive to be caught by Sri Lankan captain Tillekeratne Dilshan at cover off the leftarm opening bowler ChanakaWelegedara.

With the series tied at 1-1, Dilshan gambled by sending South Africa in. Hopes that a green-tinged pitch would help his fast bowlers were soon shown to be mistaken, while early morning cloud soon cleared on what became an ideal day for batting.

After their early successes, the Sri Lankans seldom looked likely to take a wicket and they squandered their allocation of reviews when umpire Richard Kettleborough twice gave Kallis not out when Chanaka Welegedera appealed for leg before wicket decisions.

On both occasions the umpire was shown to be right.

Prasad struck with his first delivery of the match when Smith attempted a forcing shot off the back foot and edged the ball into his stumps.

He had a second success

when Amla played across the line and was leg before wicket. But Prasad proved expensive and finished the day with figures of two for 85 from 14 overs. Both teams made two changes. For Sri Lanka,

Prasad replaced Fernando, while Lahiru Thirimanne was selected as an opening batsman ahead of Tharanga Paranavitana. Rudolph's move to num-

ber six was at the expense of Ashwell Prince, while opening bowler Vernon Philander replaced Marchant de Lange after recovering from the knee injury which kept him out of the second Test.

The venerable Sydney Cricket Ground is to get a major 191 million US dollars makeover with the demoli-

tion of three spectator stands in favour of one huge state-of-the-art grandstand, officials said Tuesday. Known as the city's

"grand lady", the SCG began life as a military cricket ground in the 1850s and hosted its first Test, against England, in 1882. The ground celebrated

its 100th Test on Tuesday with Australia's second Test against India, and Prime Minister Julia Gillard announced a sweeping upgrade of the "iconic sporting arena" to mark the occasion.

"This is an exciting project, not only for Sydneysiders but for all Australians, who have grown up watching the New Year's Test and relishing in the history and tradition of the ground," Gillard said in a statement.

"Today marks the beginning of the next stage of SCG's development to ensure it maintains its rightful place as a world-class sporting facility."

Work is expected to begin shortly after Australia's oneday international against India in February and the upgrade is scheduled for completion in time for the Ashes series against England in early 2014.

Australia pace sensation James Pattinson has surprised even himself by how quickly he has taken to Test cricket.

The 21-year-old took 4-43, including the wicket of Sachin Tendulkar, as Australia bowled India out for 191 in the second Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground on Tuesday. That came in his fourth Test after his first

two featured five-wicket hauls and the third last week earned him the man-of-the-match award as Australia beat India by 122 runs. The Victorian, a genuine quick who bowls over the 140 kilometre per hour mark, could

barely contain his excitement as he bounded into meet the media at the end of the first day of play. "I'm loving it," he told reporters. "I'm just

loving playing Test cricket and playing for Australia. "I'm honoured to be out there playing against some of the best batsmen in the world and getting Sachin out is something I'll remember for the rest of my life, it's an

amazing feeling." Pattinson made his international debut in a one-dayer on Australia's tour of Bangla-

desh earlier this year and was awarded a central contract in June.

Well down the pecking order before the start of the domestic summer, a string of injuries laid the path to his debut against New Zealand in Brisbane last month.

"My expectation was just to perform well for the Australian cricket team, take wickets, and try and get a regular spot in the team," he added.

"I don't think anyone would have thought [it would have gone so well]. You hope for it. Having said that, if you do all the right things, you bowl well, you never know what might come to you.

Pattinson paid credit to the work of bowling coach Craig McDermott and said he had also received some sage advice from an Australian bowling great.

"Pace is something that comes pretty naturally to me, I don't run in a try and bowl really fast, I just run in and try and bowl a nice line and length," he said.

"One of the greatest fast bowlers of all time, Glenn McGrath, he had a chat with me the other day and said that's all you have to worry about, the pace will take care of itself."

With Pattinson working as a unit with Peter Siddle and Ben Hilfenhaus, Australia have put the shackles on India's world class batting line-up in the five days of action so far in the series.
