Moudud gets bail in tax evasion case

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail for two months to BNP standing committee member Moudud Ahmed in a tax evasion case.

An HC bench of Justice Salma Masud Chowdhury and Justice Shahidul Karim passed the order after hearing a bail petition filed by Moudud a day after a Dhaka court summoned him to appear before it on February 7 in the case.

National Board of Revenue lodged the case against the former law minister for dodging Tk 6.85 crore in income tax from 1997-98 to 2006-07 fiscal years.

The court took the charges into cognisance on Sunday and summoned Moudud.

The case statement says Moudud concealed information about his wealth worth Tk 27,68,81,078 and gave false information to the income tax department about his authentic income and expenditure.

Amal Sen's ninth death anniversary today

Today is the ninth death anniversary of Amal Sen, former president of Bangladesh Workers Party and a veteran of Tebhaga Andolon, the revolt where peasants demanded two-thirds of the produce from the land owners instead of the pittance they had been used to getting.

Leaders and activists of Bangladesh Workers Party yesterday paid tribute by placing wreaths at Amal's portrait at Shaheed Russell Mancha in the city's Topkhana road, says a press release.

Amal Sen, born in 1912 in Afra village of Narail, was the lead organiser of the Narail episode of Tebhaga Andolon which spread in East Bengal and West Bengal in 1946.

He was also elected president of Bangladesh Workers Party in 1992 and 1995.

Workers Party Bangladesh organised a two-day programme at his village home starting from today marking the death anniversary.

4 JU students die in 3 weeks

A student of Jahangirnagar University died of brain haemorrhage in a city hospital yesterday.

The deceased, Hamd Mohammad Adnan, hailing from Laxmipur, was a first year honours student of the Institution of Information Technology (IIT) at the university.

With him, a total of four students of JU have died since December 29.

Adnan was admitted to Green Life Hospital on Sunday evening. He died there yesterday noon.

Shocked at the four deaths in quick succession, JU Registrar Abu Bakr Siddique said we are very much frus-

trated, as we have lost many of our loving students within a few days. We cannot express our unbearable pain in words, and we


just pray to the almighty that we no more lose any of our children, he added. On December 29, Vannei Liyan Bom, a first year honours

student of archaeology department, died of a cardiac arrest in his room in Moulana Bhashani Hall. The boy hailed from Ruma upazila, Bandarban.

Just with a day's succession, a master's student of English department died in a fall from the rooftop of four-storey Shaheed Salam Barkat Hall. Muradur Rahman hailed from

Tangail. The latest shock came on January 9 as Zubair Ahmed, an honours final year student, succumbed to his stab injuries inflicted by a group of Bangladesh Chhatra League activists a

PRESIDENT'S DIALOGUE

EU envoy asks political parties to resolve issues

Appreciating the president's dialogue on forming a new election commission (EC), EU Ambassador to Bangladesh William Hanna yesterday asked all political parties to continue the dialogue to resolve issues regarding the EC and general elections.

"I am encouraged to see the dialogue initiated by the president on formation of a new election commission. We welcome it and it should be continued," he said.

Addressing a press briefing, "EU-Bangladesh Relations", at Jatiya Press Club in the city, the ambassador said a strong and independent EC is crucial in ensuring a free and fair election. The EU will provide support to that end, he added.

Hanna expressed satisfaction over the big turnout in the by-elections in Bangladesh and acceptability of the results. "These elections were free and fair."

On corruption, he said it is a problem the world over. The EU supports the Anti-Corruption Commission's activities in curbing graft in the country, he added.

Hanna also observed that Bangladesh needs foreign investment and an investment-friendly environment free from corruption to woo overseas investors.

Over Bangladesh's human rights condition, he said there is lot to be done to improve the situation.

Democracy and human rights are the centre elements of EU's development cooperation with Bangladesh. "We will support efforts to strengthen human rights through both diplomatic advocacy and development assistance projects," said Hanna.

He said EU is operating over 100 projects focused on education, health and food security in the country.

On extra-judicial killings and incidents of disappearance, Hanna said, "We strongly condemn it and it should not happen. We look at it very closely. Justice should be done through court."

On the process of holding the war crimes trial, he said EU wants the international standard of justice to be ensured in the trial.

City road collapses as building site caves in

Rajuk official points finger at faulty design

A portion of Circuit House road in the city collapsed into a 33-foot foundation ditch yesterday morning when underground piling work on the site of an under-construction nearby building caved in.

Several cracks developed on the road opposite the office of the deputy commissioner (traffic south) at around 8:00am while an excavator was digging out mud for the foundation work of the 10-storey building on plot no 5.

Two hours after the digging began, the concrete pillars of the road protection piling collapsed on the excavator, burying it under mud and debris from the collapsed four-foot of the 24-footwide road.

The operator of the excavator, however, managed to save himself.

No casualty has been reported. But local people living in nearby high-rises buildings went into a state of panic.

Sheikh Abdul Mannan, member planning of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), said a total of 33-foot of earth was dug up for the foundation work while pillars were set under 51-foot of piling which was not adequate for such a high-rise structure.

The owner of the under-construction building, Monzurur Rahman, obtained approval from Rajuk on July 25 last year, said another official of Rajuk. But he did not inform Rajuk about site inspection before starting construction work, mandatory even after such approval is granted.

Though there is a rule about informing Rajuk of construction work 15 days before it commences, in this case the owner did not inform the building authorities, said Khalekuzzaman Chowdhury, authorised officer-4 of Rajuk.

"We could not reach the owner till 6:00pm as his mobile set was switched off," he said.

All the workers fled the site immediately

after the accident. Neither the owner nor his family members were to be seen when this correspondent visited the site at noon. A visit to the area in the afternoon revealed

that more cracks had developed in the middle of the remaining portion of the road, which construction experts say could make other big structures nearby vulnerable. "The buildings around the accident site

could be at risk if proper measures are not taken," said a former chief engineer of Rajuk seeking anonymity. The decades old two-storey building is just

middle of Circuit House road and remains at mostrisk, he said. Police blocked off the road just after the incident and had to wait for six hours for the crisis management team of Rajuk to arrive on

the scene. As there was no crisis management unit of Rajuk, they had to depend and wait for the help of the army to take measures to stop a further

collapse, said a Rajuk official. Later, a team of army engineering corps reached the spot at around 2:45pm and started working to protect it from further collapse by

dumping sand bags at the site. When asked, member planning of Rajuk Sheikh Abdul Mannan said the collapse of foreshore piling and a portion of the road might have occurred due to faulty design or construction failure or both.

Member, development, of Rajuk, Mahbubul Alam, said Rajuk was taking safety measures to avoid any further collapse.

A team of Wasa went to the spot and switched off the water supply lines, which had leaked during the collapse.

While visiting the site, DMP commissioner Benazir Ahmed blamed the construction workers for their negligence and said the police would take legal action against them.

Militancy is being encouraged at home with the use of internet and the madrasa education system, he said.

US Ambassador to Bangladesh Dan W Mozena said, "Terrorism is not simply somebody else's problem. It is a threat to each of our countries individually and to all of us collectively as a community of states."

Those involved in combating militancy must collectively detect and stop the means through which militant ideologies spread, said the speakers.
