Election Commissioner Prof Syed Shamsul Alam announced the results yesterday.


Among 11 posts, including six members, the pro-AL panel won in eight posts while pro-BNP panel got victory in three posts.



Exhume body of Meghna

HC asks Gazipur DC

The High Court yesterday directed the deputy commissioner of Gazipur to exhume the body of Nusrat Jahan Meghna, a student of Uttara University, for further post-mortem at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH). Responding to a writ petition, the court directed the DMCH

director to form a three-member committee to conduct the post-mortem on Meghna and to submit the report to it as early as possible. Phulbanu, Meghna's mother, on January 17 filed the writ

petition claiming that her daughter was tortured and murdered ather husband's house on January 5. There were injury marks on her body but her in-laws said

that she committed suicide, Phulbanu said. The doctors also gave a false post-mortem report of Meghna,

she said seeking directives from the HC to exhume Meghna's body for further examination.

After hearing the petition, the HC bench of Justice AHM Shamsuddin Choudhury Manik and Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim directed Phulbanu to give Tk 20,000 to the District Commission for exhuming her daughter's body.

The court also fixed January 30 for further hearing on the writ petition, said Manzill Murshid, counsel for the petitioner.

Md Habibullah, civil surgeon of Gazipur and Dr Md Liakat Ali of Gazipur Hospital appeared before the HC yesterday as per its Tuesday's summons.

The doctors told the court that they conducted the postmortem properly and found that Meghna committed suicide.

Climate fund run with transparency

Hasan Mahmud tells seminar

Bangladesh Climate Change Trust Fund (BCCTF) maintains better transparency and vibrancy than any other trust funds of the country in the past, claimed Environment Minister Hasan Mahmud.

It is a Tk 21 billion fund (BCCTF) created by the government to face the growing challenges of climate change and is used by both the government and non-government entities.

"The ministries concerned oversee implementation of the projects financed by the fund [BCCTF]. The climate change unit of the environment ministry also supervises them. So, there is a double-checking [system]," said Hasan Mahmud.

The minister was addressing as chief guest a seminar titled "Climate change, food security and health: proactive role of Bangladesh in

climate negotiations." Eminence, Health Foundation and Development Studies department of Dhaka University organised the event in Circlap audito-

rium of the capital yesterday. The minister said many are interested in

BCCTF, but they must know the process of its management, which engages at least ten ministers, a few secretaries and civil society members. Everyone is accountable here, he noted.

"Actually, a big problem here is everybody wants to work on climate change...some having knowledge on it, some with partial and some without knowing anything at all," said Dr Hasan Mahmud.

Academics, a member of the parliament, government and NGO officials, journalists and students participated in the seminar. Many of them said health and nutrition are not given adequate importance in the whole climate change dealings.

Dr Liakat Ali, climate change adaptation specialist at the Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme, Concern Worldwide's project officer Palash Kanti Halder, Eminence senior adviser Prof Dr Shah Monir Hossain, Dr Iqbal Kabir, coordinator of the climate change cell at the health ministry, Economist Dr Quzi Kholiquzzaman Ahmed, journalist Saiful Islam, Dr Murad Hasan, MP, and health secretary Humayun Kabir also spoke.

ship due to the lack of water as Bangladesh's part of Teesta river has turned into a desert, he added. "After the barrage's construction in 1990, a number of governments came

to power in the last 22 years. But all of them failed to sign the Teesta deal as they did not pay much heed to the prime problem of the northern region. "The Teesta deal will surely be

signed if Jatiya Party is voted to power," he said. Both the AL and BNP are adamant in coming to power to establish a regime of terrorism, extortion, politicisation and corruption everywhere instead of

'Shut down rental power plants'

Speakers at a rally yesterday demanded shutting down of rental and quick rental power plants and reopening of the closed national power plants to meet the country's power demands.

Launching of quick rental and rental power plants are adding some 3,000 megawatt (MW) power to the national grid at the expense of some Tk 20,000 crore, Prof Anu Mohammad noted.

If the national power plants were repaired and renewed and the gas wells reactivated, people would get some 2,100 MW power at Tk 1,000 crore expenditure, he added.

"We are ready to deal with load-shedding due to the shortage but not agreed to give huge amount of money to capitalists" said Engr Sheikh Mohammad Shahidullah, convener of National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power, and Ports.

The committee organised the protest rally pressing the government seven-point demand in front of Jatiya Press Club in the city.

3,400 Phensidyl bottles seized, 9 arrested

Dyeing factory shut for polluting Shitalakkhya

The Department of Environment (DoE) yesterday closed down a dyeing factory in Narayanganj for good and also fined it Tk 14 lakh for running illegally and polluting the Shitalakkhya river.

The DoE also directed the Narayanganj City Corporation (NCC) to stop all construction activities on Baburail Canal, which is connected to the River Shitalakhya, said a press release. The factory, 'Madina Dyeing and Printing' has been operating illegally for the last eight years. Its authorities failed to pro-

duce any legal documents including environment certificate,

registration of investment board and trade license. DoE Director (enforcement) Mohammad Munir Chowdhury in a drive yesterday found that the factory has dumped around 44,000 cubic meters of toxic wastes into the

Owner of the factory, Faruk Chowdhury said that he had no idea about the environment act or effluent treatment plant (ETP). DoE also ordered the authorities concerned to sever the factory's power and gas connections.

Meanwhile, the DoE director sent a notice to the secretary of

NCC to immediately halt all construction activities on Baburail Canal. A joint team of DoE and Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) went to the spot and found around 14 acres

of the canal filled up for NCC's commercial purpose. The construction led to a loss of aqua-life and obstructed the water flow. DoE asked the authority concerned of NCC to appear at its director (enforcement) at 12:00pm today and explain its actions.

'5,000 born with clubfoot deformity a yr'

Australian High Commissioner to Bangladesh Dr Justin Lee yesterday visited Walk For Life clinic at National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (NITOR) to see operation of Walk For Life's clubfoot clinics in government hospitals in the country, says a press release.

Every year an estimated 5,000 children are born with a clubfoot deformity (a condition where the feet are turned inside at birth) in Bangladesh. Left untreated, the condition turns to lifelong disability, said the release.
