Order on petitions today

The International Crimes Tribunal is scheduled to pass order today on petitions filed by Jamaat-e-Islami leaders Delawar Hossain Sayedee and Abdul Quader Mollah seeking investigation reports on their alleged crimes against humanity during the 1971 Liberation War.

The duo, now in jail, submitted the two separate petitions to the tribunal last week.

The tribunal has already accepted the formal charges

against them. Deposition and cross-examination of prosecution wit-

nesses are going on against Sayedee while hearing on charge framing against Quader Mollah is scheduled for January 29. In the petitions, the duo said the investigation reports were not with the copies of the formal charges and other docu-

ments they received from the prosecution. Investigation reports are a part of the trial's documents. The prosecution must provide them with the reports as per provisions and the rules of procedure framed under the

International Crimes Tribunal Act, they said. Without the reports, they cannot properly defend them-

selves and will be deprived of justice, they added. After hearing the petitions, the tribunal, on January 15 and

19, fixed today's date to pass the order. During the hearing, the defence counsels argued that there is no precedent in any country of the defence not being provided with the investigation report by the prosecution.

The prosecution, opposing the prayers, said providing the reports might put the prosecution witnesses at risk.

Meet people's expectations to be elected again

Speakers urge govt at discussion

The government has to struggle to fulfill people's expectations in the next two years if it wants to be elected to power again, said speakers at a discussion yesterday.

The discussion, "The current situation and challenge to build a progressive democratic homeland", was organised by Sammilito Samajik Andolon at Liberation War Museum in the city's Segunbagicha and presided over by its President Ajay Roy.

"The current situation is tight for the government and has worsened with corruption," said noted econo-

mist MM Akash at the discussion.

All the ministers, including the prime minister, should disclose their current and pre-election wealth statements. If any discrepancy is found between the two, they should be removed from their positions, he added.

"The government has no time to be free from worries. It must improve the country's economy and complete the war crimes trial if it wants to remain in power for the next term," said Akash.

It seems that corrupt practices in the communications ministry was going unabated with the government's consent, said the organisation's Vice President Z Tariq Ali while presenting a paper.

The three hundred lawmakers think that the country is their personal asset, an attitude which gave birth to boundless corruption, nepotism and misuse of power, he added.

If the government was able to establish good governance and reduce the magnitude of looting, people would bring them to power, said Tariq.

Former deputy governor of Bangladesh Bank Khondkar Ibrahim Khaled said the government should introduce rationing of everyday essentials for citizens with fixedincome as this is the only group affected by the recent inflation.



BNP acting Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday alleged that the government does not believe in democracy and is doing everything to establish oneparty rule in the country.

The government is creating fabricated stories to establish the one-party rule, he said adding that, the country's sovereignty and freedom are getting destroyed during the incumbent government's tenure. He said this while addressing a party's

15 Jamaat men on seven-day remand

Fifteen leader and activists of Bangladesh Jamaat-e-Islami were taken on a seven-day remand after their arrest from the city's Uttarkhan yesterday.

The police had already sought permission from the home ministry to file a sedition case against them, said Nazmul Islam, officer-incharge of Uttarkhan Police Station. Acting on a tip-off, a team

of Uttarkhan police raided the residence of one Tofazzel Hossain at Borobag of Uttarkhan where the activists were holding a secret meeting at around 1:00am to foil the war crimes trial, the OC said.

The police also seized huge copies of 18 different books written against Awami League and war crimes trial.

Political change is a must to eradicate criminalisation from the country's socio-economic and political sector, said noted economist Prof Dr Abul Barakat yesterday.

He demanded a congenial atmosphere that will ensure people's participation in politics with patriotism and profound human behaviour to get rid of the nation of all sorts of criminalisation.

Prof Barakat, also chairman of Janata Bank, made these remarks at the 43rd Annual Seminar of Bangladesh Itihas Parishad.

The Parishad organised the programme with the slogan "Bangladesh in four decades" at Teachers Students Centre on the Dhaka University (DU) campus. This economist also said the gap between the rich and the

poor should be minimized or removed by attaching the poor to all sorts of development programmes. "A total of 14.90 crore impoverished people in the country

have been struggling to get their rights against the 10 crore powerful people," he said. All the governments, in the name of development of the mass people, only took initiatives for development of the rich

and the powerful sector of the society, he added. Prof Abu Ahmed of Department of Economics of DU said, despite 40 years of liberation, the nation is yet to achieve its expectation to fulfill the basic needs of the people, especially

in the field of food security, health care and education. He urged the bureaucracy to be more practical while mak-

ing policies in a bid to reduce economic crisis in the country. Historian and national Prof Dr AF Salahuddin Ahmed inaugurated the programme that was chaired by Bangladesh Itihas Parishad President Prof Habiba Khatun. people.

2 RU BCL men on remand
