Maldives seeks UN help

The Maldives yesterday asked the UN and the Commonwealth to send a team of international legal experts to mediate in a judicial crisis that has sparked street demonstrations in recent days.

Anti-government activists have been protesting against President Mohamed Nasheed, who initiated the arrest last Monday of the head of the country's criminal court on charges of misconduct and favouring opposition figures.

Criminal Court Chief Justice Abdulla Mohamed's arrest triggered clashes and mass arrests. Opposition parties said police detained dozens on Friday while protesting, raising to 82 the number of arrests in the past few days.


The island's Supreme Court and prosecutor general have

called for Mohamed's release.

Foreign Minister Ahmed Naseem wrote to the UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) and the Commonwealth asking them to "urgently dispatch" a team of jurists, President Mohamed Nasheed's office said yesterday.

Naseem said the judicial impasse represented "a systemic failure" and deeper structural reforms were needed to restore judicial independence.

The government last week raised fears that Islamic extremism were taking hold in the Indian Ocean island nation, best known for its upmarket tourism and as a destination for honeymooners.

Maoist camp destroyed in India

A Maoist camp was destroyed and several weapons and explosive devices were seized during a joint combing operation by security forces in a jungle in Odisha's Malkangiri district yesterday.

Acting on a tip-off, the elite anti-naxal Special Operations Group (SOG) force of Odisha and police launched combing operation and spotted the camp in Tekguda forest under Kalimela area, about 50 km from here, Inspector-in-Charge of Kalimela police station, Anirudh Routray said.

Though the red rebels fled from the scene on getting information about combing operation, police seized three electronic detonators, more than 200 metres of wire used for landmine, two country-made rifles and many live cartridges from the spot, he said.

US 'pleased' with Myanmar reforms

A key US senator yesterday said the United States was "pleased with the progress" of Myanmar's reforms but urged the nominally-civilian regime to ensure upcoming byelections are "free and fair".

Following an hour-long meeting with opposition leader Aung San Suu Kyi at her Yangon home, John McCain said there remains "a great deal to be done".

McCain told reporters that he had urged President Their Sein to continue in the right direction at a meeting in the capital Naypyidaw yesterday morning, but had added the US does not "expect miracles". "We made it very clear that we are pleased with the prog-

ress that has been made but we said there are a number of issues that need to be addressed including the rule of law, including ethnic conflicts and of course progress towards free and fair elections," he said. The senator said he had pressed Thein Sein to allow inter-

national observers to monitor by-elections on April 1, but had received no commitment from the president.

Suu Kyi is running for a parliamentary seat in the vote, one of several dramatic developments in recent months. Reforms have also included the release of hundreds of

political prisoners, leading US President Barack Obama to call for the resumption of full diplomatic ties.

Speaking in Bangkok on Saturday, McCain said the US would likely begin to lift sanctions if the by-polls were free and fair, but he also expressed caution, saying Washington should not "rush into judgments that we may regret later on".

Disgusted by police plot

Says Rushdie

British author Salman Rushdie yesterday accused Indian police of making up an underworld plot to assassinate him that forced him to pull out of a literary festival this weekend.

Rushdie withdrew from the event in Jaipur, the state capital of Rajasthan, after being warned by Indian officials that paid gunmen were heading to the city to kill him for his writing that is alleged to insult Muslims.

But Rushdie said that he now believed the supposed plot -- apparently undertaken by Mumbai criminal gangs -had been invented to keep him away from the festival and to avoid controversy.

"I've investigated, & believe that I was indeed lied to. I am outraged and very angry," Rushdie said on Twitter after newspaper reports that Rajasthan police had concocted the death threat.

Rushdie's 1988 novel "The Satanic Verses", which remains banned in India, is seen by many Muslims worldwide as a blasphemous work that insults their religion. The author, who was born

in Mumbai, spent a decade in hiding after Iranian spiritual leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini issued a fatwa in 1989 calling for his death over the novel. Fellow authors at the

Jaipur festival, which draws tens of thousands of Indian and foreign visitors, expressed their opposition to the campaign to stop Rushdie appearing, and said free speech needed to be protected in India.

Writers Hari Kunzru and Amitava Kumar read out passages of "The Satanic Verses" from the stage in protest on Friday, angering some local Muslim groups who had welcomed Rushdie's withdrawal from the programme.

Rushdie appeared at the festival without incident in 2007 but this year Muslim activists lobbied for him to be banned, raising fears of angry protests and security problems at the scenic venue in the gardens of an old palace.

26 babies die in India hospital

At least 26 infants have died in the past five days in a state-run hospital in India's West Bengal state, authorities said yesterday.

The hospital in Malda, about 340 kilometres north of Kolkata, has come under attack for negligence while state health officials claim the babies were underweight and several of them were "terminally ill".

"Two more babies died on Sunday taking the death toll to 26. Most of them were underweight and had been suffering from birth asphyxia," West Bengal health services director Biswa Ranjan Satpathi told AFP by telephone.

Satpathi said the hospital has 60 beds for infants -- barely enough to cope with the surge in patients.

"More than 14,000 babies were admitted to the hospital over the past three months. The hospital does not have the infrastructure to offer treatment to so many infants," he said.

17 killed as Iran boat sinks

Seventeen people died when an Iranian passenger boat capsized in heavy winds after running out of fuel in the Strait of Hormuz, the official IRNA news agency reported yesterday.

The boat set sail Saturday evening from Hormuz Island, the most northern piece of land at the entran. The vessel ran out of fuel during the 10-kilometre (six-mile) journey and was caught in a heavy storm, which also hampered rescue efforts, state television reported.

It then capsized and its 22 passengers, captain and crew members were trapped underneath, IRNA said. Rescue teams saved five people.

Pakistan nabs 31 Indian fishermen

Pakistani authorities have arrested 31 Indian fishermen and seized 14 boats for allegedly violating the country's maritime boundary, an official said.

The fishermen were detained by the Maritime Security Agency (MSA) during routine patrolling yesterday, a spokesman for the agency said.

The Indian fishermen allegedly continued to intrude into Pakistan's marine-rich Indus delta region "at the cost of livelihood of local fishermen",

Senior Special Judge's Court will decide on the day whether the charges brought against the accused will be taken into cognisance.

On January 16, the Anti-Corruption Commission pressed charges against Khaleda and three others, accusing them of abusing power to set up a charitable organisation named after late president Ziaur Rahman.

The other accused are Abul Harris Chowdhury, political secretary to the former prime minister, Khaleda Zia; his assistant personal secretary (APS) Ziaul Islam Munna; and Monirul Islam Khan, APS to former Dhaka City Corporation mayor Sadeque

Hossain Khoka. According to the charge sheet submitted by ACC

Assistant Director Harunur Rashid, investigation officer of the case, the four accused, in collaboration with each other, realised over Tk 2.17 crore from unknown sources in the name of establishing Shaheed Zia Charitable Trust.

The charge sheet also points out irregularities in spending over Tk 1.24 crore in the process of purchasing a piece of land for the trust. Khaleda, Munna and

Monirul obtained bail from the High Court on different dates while Harris Chowdhury has been absconding since the ACC filed the case on August 8 last year with Tejgaon Police Station.

Harris was shown as a fugitive in the charge sheet and while submitting it the IO prayed to the court for an arrest warrant against him.
