Applications to be invited next month

The Rajuk will invite applications next month for allotment of flats at an apartment complex to be built in the third phase of Uttara Residential Model Town.

The town planner has already issued a work order to a consortium of two real estate developers this month for construction of 5,056 flats in Block-A of Sector-18.

"We are going to invite applications within February, as a guideline is expected to get ministerial approval soon," said Md Nurul Huda, chairman of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk).

The construction work will commence after arrival of some equipment from South Korea within a week. The flats would be ready in three years for handover.

The floor space of each of the three types of flats would be 850, 1050 and 1250 square feet.

Leprosy on the rise, silently

When rash first appeared on his belly, a 38year-old factory worker dismissed it as an allergic reaction to something he might have eaten recently. His wife also going with the instinct handed him an ointment.

But when the red bumps did not go away even after weeks, and instead began to spread in the legs, arms and on the face, the man began to worry. He saw a doctor, who had no explanation for the condition, and then another, who made the startling yet correct diagnosis of leprosy.

In Bangladesh, most people consider leprosy as a plague buried in the past, a disease relegated to biblical times or, perhaps, to the poorer section and the remotest parts of the country.

While the incidence of infection has

been declining in some parts of the country, it has actually been on the rise in many other parts, including the capital.

Leprosy or Hansen's disease (HD) is a chronic mild infectious disease caused by a germ similar to that which causes tuberculosis. It attacks the nerves of the hands, legs and face and, if left untreated, can take away the ability to move the fingers, toes and eyelids ultimately leading to loss of limbs and sight.

The longer the disease is left unaddressed, the more likely it is that the deformities, so often associated with leprosy, will occur.

Redefining leprosy as a curable disease is crucial for helping doctors identify undetected cases. But drawing attention SEE PAGE 19 COL 5




Speaking the day after over 100,000 people massed in Karachi to protest the strikes. Yousuf Raza


to protest the strikes, Yousuf Raza Gilani said they only served to bolster militants.

"Drones are counter-productive. We have very ably isolated militants from the local tribes. When there are drone attacks that create sympathy for them again," Gilani told reporters at the Davos forum.

"He is going to be partially paralysed," said a distressed Asad Uddin Mahmud, assistant registrar at Orthopaedics division of MAG Osmani Hospital.

The patient he was talking about is Badrul Alam, a third year student of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology and another victim of brutality committed by Islami Chhatra Shibir.

"There were some deep cuts on his body -- five on his right leg, one on the left leg, two on his right hand, and some on his
