Time's up for Iain O'Brien

Iain O'Brien, the former New Zealand seamer, has retired due to a chronic back injury. He hoped to resurrect his career in Wellington but decided his injury was too serious.

O'Brien, 35, made his international debut against Australia at Christchurch in March 2005 but after that series didn't play another Test for two seasons. He returned in November 2007 against South Africa at Johannesburg and went on to play 22 Tests in all, taking 73 wickets at 33.27.

Having been recommended to retire in 2003 after being told he had the back of a 60 year-old, O'Brien continued to play international cricket before retiring in 2009 after the World T20 in England. He wanted to settle in the UK and continue his career with Middlesex but employment problems prevented him from becoming a Britishqualified player.

O'Brien announced the news that his cricket "ride" was over in an emotional blog. "I've cried in changing rooms and hotels all around the world but how could I walk away," he said of his experiences in coping with the injury. "I've got more out of my body than I should have. Time's up."

He returned to Wellington and began rehabilitation with the hope of returning to international cricket. "I was doing everything I could to get back out for Wellington and if good enough, back into the New Zealand team," O'Brien said. "That was the dream. That was the motivation.

"I now know I'll never play for New Zealand again. The motivation to keep going has dwindled. So, on that note I know it's time to walk away."

Nadal happy despite defeat

Rafael Nadal said the Australian Open final was one of the best losses of his career after he went down fighting in a six-hour epic against Novak Djokovic.

In a dramatic finale to the year's first major, Djokovic outlasted Nadal 5-7, 6-4, 6-2, 6-7 (5/7), 7-5 in 5hr 53 min, the longest grand slam final in history.

The match started on Sunday evening and finished in the early hours of Monday morning as the world's two best players battled to a standstill in front of a disbelieving crowd.

"Physically it was the toughest match I ever played," Nadal said early on Monday.

"I think we played a great tennis match. It was I think a very good show in my opinion," he added. "I enjoyed being part of this event and

this match. That's the truth. "I wanted to win, but I am happy about how I did. I had my chances against the best

player in the world today." Nadal said he was pleased he had been able to match Djokovic physically and mentally, something he had not been able to do in 2011 when the Serb beat him six times in succession.

Novak's greatest win

Novak Djokovic Monday savoured the greatest win of his career,

despite being left with bleeding toes and "outrageous" pain in his record Australian Open final win over Rafael Nadal.

Djokovic's thrilling fiveset win over the Spaniard, the longest grand slam final at 5hr 53min, makes him just the fifth player in open history to win three straight grand slam titles.

"You're in pain, you're suffering, you know that you're trying to activate your legs, you're trying to push yourself another point, just one more point, one more game," he said afterwards.

"You're going through so much suffering your toes are bleeding. Everything is just outrageous, you know, but you're still enjoying that pain."

The 24-year-old said his Wimbledon triumph last year had been special, but the Melbourne win was even better.

"This one I think comes out on the top just because of the fact that we played almost six hours is incredible, incredible," he said. Djokovic added that now

felt ready for a shot at the French Open, the next major on the calendar, where his best result is reaching the semifinals. "So I want to do well and I want to get to my first final at

least in Paris. I have never been in the final there and I have a feeling that I'm ready this year to achieve that," he said. Djokovic's 2011 season

left commentators short of superlatives as the Serb won a total of 10 titles and went on a 41-match winning streak,

until Roger Federer beat him in the semifinals in Paris.

"I'm prioritising grand slams this year, as every year, and Olympic Games. I think that's one of my highest goals," he said.

"That doesn't mean of course that I'm not going to prepare well and perform my best in the other tournaments. It's just that, you know, the grand slams matter the most."

Djokovic said as he cast around for answers as to how he could beat Nadal, whom he has now beaten in the past three grand slam finals, he even offered up a prayer. "It paid off, I guess," he joked.

But the Serb, said he would now take time to savour his triumph before he returns to the tennis courts to prepare for the rest of the season.

"I'm not really concerned about the rest of the year how physically I'm going endure and all of that.

"It's just the start of the year. I'm going to have some weeks off now, and I'm going try to enjoy this victory as much as I can.

"Then back to office, you know, back to work, preparation. There is much that awaits for me, but I definitely should enjoy the present moment."

The win followed series victories over New Zealand, Zimbabwe and Sri Lanka after Misbah succeeded Salman Butt at national captain. Butt and his opening bowlers Mohammad Aamer and Mohammad Asif were jailed for arranging to bowl deliberate no-balls in the 2010 Lord's test against England.

"After the spot-fixing scandal the players discussed things and we unanimously agreed that we need to just do well," Misbah told the Geo News channel on Sunday.

"I am happy that we have been playing with lot of focus, dedication and discipline. The players have lots of faith in each other and their abilities to perform under pressure."
