Abahani off to winning start

Three-time champions Abahani got off to a winning start in the Bangladesh Premier League when they handed a 3-0 defeat to 10-man Rahmatganj MFS at the Bangabandhu National Stadium

yesterday. National team discard Zahid Hasan was inspirational for Abahani as he scored the first goal and turned provider for the third scored by Ghanaian Twum Frank. Substitute Touhidul Alam scored the second goal in the match completely dominated by the Sky Blues.

Abahani coach Ali Akbar Pourmoslemi started with a 5-3-2 formation fielding three defenders with two half-backs overlapping down the wing. And the wings posed most of the danger to the heavily-manned Rahmatganj defence as Nasirul Islam and Zahid delivered dangerous crosses down the right flank.

Rahmatganj, much maligned for their involvement in match-fixing last season, were intent on soaking up the pressure and they did reasonably in the first half before midfielder Shamsuzzaman Sohel got the marching orders for a second bookable offence in the 36th minute. Minutes later, Abahani's Ghanaian striker Twum Frank got an easy opportunity to break the deadlock but his feeble attempt was stopped by

Rahmatganj keeper Sujon Chowdhury.

The Abahani coach adopted a more attacking approach in the second half as he brought on striker Touhidul to replace defender Mamun Mia which spurred a string of attacks. Frank wasted another easy opportunity at the start of the second half before Zahid broke the deadlock with a clinical finish from inside the box in the 59th minute. Zahid got the ball after Waly Faisal's cross was headed onto his path by Mohammad Sujon, and the nippy winger drove a placing shot past the Rahmatganj keeper at the back of the net.

The second goal came four minutes later when Touhidul played a neat one-two with Awudu Ibrahim before placing the ball at the far end of the net with his left foot. Frank redeemed himself in the 72nd minute when he slapped in a Zahid cross from a difficult angle.

Despite the three-goal win, Abahani coach Ali Akbar was far from happy, as he felt the margin should have been much bigger. "We could have scored 10 to 12 goals with the number of chances we created. Unfortunately our players lost the appetite after scoring the three goals," said Akbar.

Zahid, arguably the best player of the match, was looking at the positives. "Thankfully we have made a good start and if our players can keep the momentum we will do well in the league. I am happy with my own performance as well," said Zahid.


Dean Jones, another former Australian batsman, will arrive in Dhaka today to join the same franchise as technical director.

Younis props up Pakistan

Experienced batsman Younis Khan proved his class with a superb hundred to put Pakistan in a good position on the second day of the third and final Test against England played here on Saturday.

The 34-year-old right-hander scored an unbeaten 115 to repair the Pakistan innings after early wobbles with youngster Azhar Ali (75 not out) through an unbroken thirdwicket stand of 194 to take their team to 222-2 at close.

Pakistan, who conceded a 42-run lead in the first innings after England made 141, now lead by 180 runs with eight wickets intact.

So in command was the duo that England's bowlers, who wrecked Pakistan

for 99 in the first innings, looked helpless and it seemed as if the match was not played on the same pitch on which 16 wickets fell on the first day.

Younis, who had only 66 runs in the last four innings, notched his 20th Test hundred -- the first from either side in the series -with a sweep shot off left-arm spinner Monty Panesar for two, reaching the milestone off 166-balls.

Younis has so far hit 11 boundaries and a six. Ali, who often praised Younis's support for youngsters, batted with caution during his 14th half-century. He has so far hit 11 boundaries and six.

Before the two came together, Pakistan had lost openers Taufeeq Umar (six) and Mohammad Hafeez (21) in another disastrous start, leaving them at 30-2 at lunch and in danger of another collapse.


