Biman's new Boeing suffers glitch again

Flight delayed by 31hrs

Four months into joining the fleet, Biman Bangladesh Airlines' newly purchased Boeing 777-300ER aircraft Palki had to go through another major repair, which delayed its flight on Manchester-London-Dhaka route by 31 hours.

The aircraft, which caused huge embarrassment to Biman authorities after many of its armrests of the economy class had broke days into its commercial operation, has now suffered a leakage in one of the hydraulic pipes, said the airlines sources. Due to the leak, Palki had to remain at London airport

causing sufferings to 404 passengers. The flight that was originally scheduled to take off from Manchester at 11:00am on Thursday finally flew for Dhaka on Friday around 6:00pm after necessary replacement of equip-

Biman sources said since the equipment could not be found in London, it had to be bought from Dubai which made the delay longer.
