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# Reform initiative runs out of steam

Officials say govt reluctant to go ahead with draft law for fear of losing partisan influence on bureaucracy

The government's move to modernise the civil service through reforms has been stalled as the ruling party feels that a reform will slash its political interference, said many civil service officials.

A section of the bureaucrats also feel that a reform will make their jobs harder. When the Awami League-led govern-

ment assumed power in 2009, it initiated a process of reforming the civil service. It prepared a draft Civil Service Act in May last year, and took an initiative to replace the annual confidential report (ACR) with a performance-based evaluation mechanism for promotions and postings of offi-

The steps were initiated to depoliticise the civil administration, make the bureaucrats accountable to the people, and reduce abuse of power.

But the initiatives never took concrete shapes and the government now says it will seek more opinions from different cadre services and other stakeholders to make the proposed act acceptable to all.

"This is just a trick to waste time as the government has taken lots of opinions

from the cadre services and other stakeholders in the last two years," said a midranking official on condition of anonym-

He said the draft Civil Service Act was finalised and sent to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in December last year, but she sent it back asking the public administration ministry to seek more opinions.

"The government couldn't finalise a draft law in three years, it is highly unlikely that it will be able to do so within the remaining less than two years of its tenure. So, the planned reform is still a distant reality for us," added the official.

A top government official said, "The partisan government has become uncertain whether, after promulgating the act, the bureaucrats can be controlled the way they are now being controlled by it. On the other hand, there are many bureaucrats who are not confident that they will get promotions and favourable postings under the new system as easily as they do now."

But HT Imam, public administration affairs adviser to the prime minister said, "We have made good progress in formulating the civil service law. It is being

Cancel Dhaka No respite from river grabbing

> Demarcation of Turag with pillars hardly makes an impact

A signboard fixed to a pole stands as the only visible proof of the government move to demarcate the Turag river area at Gabtoli.

It reads, "Installation of boundary pillars of the river implemented by the Dhaka district administration, the BIWTA and the Department of Public Works."

Small boundary pillars put up to demarcate the river area can hardly be noticed amid piles of bricks, coal and sand, and toll collection booths with tin roofs.

Many of the pillars installed by Dhaka district administration have already got damaged. They were installed on December 21 last year.

Apart from the newly installed signboards and small pillars, very little has changed on the banks of the Turag river at Amin Bazar and Gabtoli.

Although the High Court in 2009 ordered the government to evict the encroachers and protect the river, sand and brick traders still occupy large portions of the river banks at Gabtoli and Amin Bazar.

River grabbing still goes on although the Department of Environment conducted several drives last year to demolish illegal settlements on the Turag river.

The Dhaka district administration has been installing boundary pillars from December 21 last year after demarcation of the river area at Gabtoli and Amin Bazar

Pakistan faced a fresh crisis when Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan was assassinated on October 16, 1951 at a public meeting in Rawalpindi. Happening three years after the death of the country's founder Mohammad Ali Jinnah, the assassination created a sudden vacuum in the national leadership in the sense that after Jinnah and Liaquat, hardly any politician of similar stature was around. A curious development then took place. Khwaja Nazimuddin, who had been governor general since Jinnah's death, quickly took over as prime minister in succession to

Five months after India and Bangladesh failed to ink Teesta water-sharing deal, the two neighbours yesterday resumed efforts for revisiting the proposed treaty as officials of both sides exchanged data on water flow of the common river.
