Suarez-Evra faceoff

Luis Suarez is preparing to run the Old Trafford gauntlet when the Liverpool striker faces Manchester United for the first time since his ban for racially abusing Patrice Evra.

The Uruguayan returned from his eight-match suspension when he appeared as a substitute against Tottenham on Monday but is expected to start for the Reds in the latest instalment of the northwest giants' bitter rivalry.

The two clubs met in the FA Cup at Anfield only a fortnight ago, with Liverpool winning a largely trouble-free game 2-1.

However the tie was soured by the relentless barracking of Evra by Liverpool fans, and the subsequent arrest of one fan on suspicion of making racist taunts to the French international.

Mindful of the potential for Saturday's fixture to turn ugly, both United and Liverpool officials have attempted

to defuse tensions with calls for calm.

Liverpool manager Kenny Dalglish said Suarez had been instructed to shake Evra's hand in the pre-match ritual.

"I thought everyone involved in the FA Cup tie at Anfield played their part in making sure that the match was played in

under what happened and move forward.

"People are already speculating on the pre-match ceremony, but from Luis's point of view we have spoken to him and I know he will shake the hand of Patrice Evra and the other Manchester United players before the game."

While the animosity between Liverpool and United means Suarez is unlikely to be given an easy ride on Saturday, fullback Glen Johnson has backed his team-mate to cope with the bearish atmosphere.

"It is a tough place to go Old Trafford. Luis is a strong character and he will try to let his football do the talking," Johnson said.

"He has had a long break now and hopefully he will be fresh and ready to put in a performance."

A victory for United will see Ferguson's team inch one point clear of leaders Manchester City, who travel to Aston Villa on Sunday after beating Fulham 3-0 last weekend.

Barca not giving up

Despite Real Madrid's seven-point lead in La Liga, Barcelona defender Gerard Pique says that the title race is not over and they will fight to the end and make it as difficult as possible for their bitter rivals.

While the Catalan side have come out on top when they have faced Real so far this season -- beating them in the league and knocking them out of the Spanish Cup -- their stuttering away form has seen them fall behind in the league.

They cannot afford another slip-up this weekend in Pamplona against Osasuna while they will be hoping that fourth-placed Levante can do them a favour when they play the leaders at the Bernabeu.

Harry wary of dual role

Tottenham Hotspur manager Harry Redknapp said Friday he was "flattered" to be the odds-on favourite to replace Fabio Capello as England manager but was cautious about combining the job with his club role.

The Football Association (FA) have indicated they could opt for a 'caretaker' manager to steer the side at the European Championships in Poland and Ukraine in four months' time following Capello's shock resignation on Wednesday -- just hours after Redknapp was cleared of tax evasion charges.

A host of other Premier League managers have backed Redknapp for the England role, with the 64-year-old, whose Tottenham team are third in the top-flight, the outstanding English candidate to replace Capello.

"It is flattering, other managers have come out and said nice things and I appreciate everybody's support really," said Redknapp at Tottenham's training ground on Friday.


However, as for being in charge of both Spurs and England, a wary Redknapp said: "It is hard enough managing a league club let alone managing your country, it's two very difficult jobs."

"I think your focus has got to be on one job, you can't be going home thinking, 'Who's playing well in this situation?'

"I can't take my eye off the ball at Tottenham at the moment because we're looking to get Champions League football, we're still in the FA Cup and I owe it to them to continue to keep completely focused on the job I'm doing here."

"It wouldn't be fair to anybody here if I started to let my thoughts wander elsewhere," he added with Spurs bidding for their first English title since 1961.

Capello resigned on Wednesday after the FA stripped John Terry of the England captaincy without consulting the Italian manager as the Chelsea defender prepares to contest a charge of

racially abusing QPR defender Anton Ferdinand at a trial which will take place in July -- after Euro 2012.

Just hours earlier Redknapp had emerged from a London court having been found not guilty of tax evasion charges and the former West Ham and Portsmouth boss said the last few weeks had been a draining experience.

"It's knocked me for six. I haven't felt so good the last couple of days but I feel better today," Redknapp said.

"(My appetite for the Spurs job) has never waned, things were going well in the football but things were hanging over me which were always a problem for me, but thankfully it's gone now and we can move on."

Manchester United manager Sir Alex Ferguson said Redknapp was the best man for the England job but warned against combining two jobs, having been in charge of both Aberdeen and Scotland

at the 1986 World Cup following the death of Scotland boss Jock Stein.

"I tried it myself with Scotland (at the World Cup) in Mexico. I found it very difficult," Ferguson said.

In the short-term, former England defender Stuart Pearce, the current Under-21 coach, will take charge of England for their friendly against the Netherlands at Wembley on February 29.

After that, all scenarios are under consideration, suggesting it would be possible for Redknapp to lead England at Euro 2012 before making way for another manager if he chose to stay at Tottenham.

"That is a possibility," FA chairman David Bernstein said Thursday when asked if a caretaker coach could lead England in Poland and Ukraine.

"It might not be the case, but all options are open. I'm only talking common sense -- we're not prepared to restrict ourselves at this stage."

Giggs extends with MU

Manchester United star Ryan Giggs has signed a one-year contract extension, the English Premier League champions announced Friday.

The deal means 38-year-old former Wales midfielder Giggs, who has only ever played professionally for United, is set to take part in a 22nd season for the Old Trafford club, having made his debut as a teenager in 1991.

"Ryan is a marvellous player," said United manager Sir Alex Ferguson. "In many ways, he epitomises all my teams here at United; he has constantly re-invented himself, adapted to the changing nature of the game and retained that desire and hunger for success."

"In every training session and match, he is the example for others to follow."

"The young players in the dressing room have a great chance to learn from a player who will continue to break records that anyone in the game will find hard to beat."

been blamed on many reasons from a small squad and injuries through to a lack of desire but the fact is that they have won only four of 10 matches on their travels.

At the same time Real continue to roll over their opposition having won 18 of 21 games and scored 71 goals in the process, 10 more than Barca, the side widely admired over recent years for their attacking football.

"I would have signed for where we are at the moment at the start of the season. We are very much alive in the league, in the Champions League and we are in the final of the cup," said Pique, with Barca's midweek win over Valencia setting them up for a repeat of the 2009 King's Cup final against Athletic Bilbao.

"There is a lot of work ahead of us in the next two months but we are still alive and you can count on us being there at the end of the season."

"We will give everything in the league, it will be the others who will have to win it and it is going to be a long battle."

Milan to miss Ibra's service

Defending Italian champions AC Milan begin a crucial phase of their season when they travel to fourth-placed Udinese this weekend.

Star striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic starts a three-match ban on Saturday in a period when second-placed Milan must play two of the other two top four teams.

Following their trip to Udine, Milan will host Cesena and leaders Juve in successive league games at the San Siro.

It is a crucial period in which to be missing their best player and top scorer, especially with fellow forwards Pato and Antonio Cassano also on the sidelines.

It means extra pressure being piled on the shoulders of misfiring Brazilian Robinho, veteran Filippo Inzaghi, younger Stephan El Shaarawy and new signing Maxi Lopez.

The latter three have hardly played for Milan this season while Robinho, the most used forward after Ibrahimovic, has managed a paltry return of just three goals in 17 Serie A games.

In fact he has only five goals in 24 games in all competitions and has come under fire for some shocking misses, including two in front of an open goal from inside the six yard box in successive games back in November.

He also missed a one-on-one during last weekend's game with Napoli, firing wide of Morgan De Sanctis's post.

Milan captain Massimo Ambrosini acknowledges that the
