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MP filling up pond

Rajshahi dev authority serves fresh notice on him

The Rajshahi Development Authority (RDA) yesterday served a notice against ruling party lawmaker Enamul Haque, directing him to re-excavate the huge pond he had illegally been filling up in Meherchandi area in the city here, ignoring warnings twice.

Azmeri Ashrafi, town planner of RDA, issued the notice against the lawmaker from Rajshahi-4 (Bagmara) constituency asking him to re-excavate the pond on some 30 bighas of land within 10 working days following receipt of the notice.

The fresh notice was issued as the lawmaker did not respond to two previous warnings, including a notice by the RDA in this regard.

Ashrafi told The Daily Star that the RDA had on January 26 on an information slip warned Enamul that filling up of the pond would be illegal. It then served him SEE PAGE 19 COL 2

Dhaka eyes soft loan

High-level team to visit Russia this month

A high-level government delegation will visit Moscow this month to seek a Russian soft loan for setting up a 1,000-megawatt nuclear power plant at Rooppur in Pabna.

The team led by State Minister for Science and Technology Yeafesh Osman is also expected to sign a crucial deal on nuclear radiation safety, officials at science and technology ministry said.

Under the pact, the nuclear state will extend full support to form a radiation control authority in Bangladesh that would control all kinds of probable hazards.

Russia will finance the country's firstever atomic power plant estimated at between Tk 1,200 crore and Tk 1,500 crore, Yeafesh told The Daily Star on Monday.

"At a meeting at the Prime Minister's Office on January 25, we have discussed the probable modalities for receiving the Russian fund," he added.

Senior officials of the finance ministry

and Economic Relations Division

attended the meeting, chaired by prime minister's Economic Affairs Adviser Mashiur Rahman. "We will propose several financing options including a soft loan equivalent to

85 per cent of the total project costs to Russia," mentioned the minister. The Bangladesh government will bear the rest of the cost.

The other alternatives include a publicprivate partnership (PPP) and build-ownoperate-transfer (BOOT) with Russia.

A new frog species named Pierre's cricket frog (Fejervary Perieras) has been located in the country, the research organisation CARINAM says. The researchers are yet to disclose its location as they wish to study it further. Missing from the wildlife checklist of Bangladesh, this nocturnal creature inhabits lowland forests, grasslands and open areas like paddy fields and small burrows across South and Southeast Asia and South China.

Digital tools 'to save languages'

Facebook, YouTube and even texting will be the salvation of many of the world's endangered languages, scientists believe.

Of the 7,000 or so languages spoken on Earth today, about half are expected to be extinct by the century's end.

Globalisation is usually blamed, but some elements of the "modern world", especially digital technology, are pushing back against the tide.

North American tribes use social media to re-engage their young, for example.

Tuvan, an indigenous tongue spoken by nomadic peoples in Siberia and Mongolia, even has an iPhone app to teach the pronunciation of words to new students.

"Small languages are using social media, YouTube, text messaging and various technologies to expand their voice and expand their presence," said K David Harrison, an associate professor of linguistics at Swarthmore College and a National Geographic Fellow.

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
