3 killed in road, train accidents

Three people, including a teenage boy, were killed in road and train accidents in the capital yesterday. In one of the incidents, a furniture trader, Nazrul Islam,

34, died after he was hit by a private car around 3:00pm at Uttara.

The car was at high speed and it hit Nazrul when he was crossing the road in front of BNS Centre Market at Uttara sector-7, where he ran a furniture showroom, said Officerin-Charge of Uttara Police Station Khandokar Rejaul Hasan.

The victim died on the way to a local hospital. Relatives took the body to his village in Kishoreganj without an autopsy.

The OC said the car had managed to flee the scene.

Following the accident, traders of nearby markets blocked the Dhaka-Mymensingh road for an hour and vandalised a few cars. Later, Uttara police rushed to the spot, dispersed the crowd and took the situation under control.

Meanwhile, a teenage boy, Shaheen, from Tazumuddin of Bhola, was knocked down by a vehicle near TV Bhaban at Rampura around 1:00am. He used to work at a nearby restaurant. Sub-Inspector of Rampura Police Station Motiur Rahman

sent the body to Dhaka Medical College morgue for autopsy. In the train accident, the victim was hit on the railway track near Uttara, sector-4, said Shafiuddin, who found the wounded victim, aged around 40, and brought him to

DMCH around 7:45am. Doctors declared the victim dead,

who could not be identified immediately. Sub-Inspector Rafiqul Islam of Government Railway Police said they visited the spot but could not get any further details as the accident happened early in the morning around 6:00am.

Pry teachers' recruitment exam begins today

The recruitment examination for the post of assistant teachers in the government primary schools begins today with over 10 lakh candidates of 61 districts against 10,650 vacant posts.

The result of the test will be published next month and viva voce will be held later on.

Country's first digital topographic map 45pc complete

The country's first complete digital topographic map, presenting a detailed and accurate graphic representation of cultural and natural features on the ground, is 45 percent complete. The Survey of Bangladesh is scheduled to

finish the mapping by 2016 under a Tk 181 crore project initiated in 2007.

The map will make baseline surveys for alignment, layouts and design sketches of projects like Padma bridge, nuclear power plants, pipelines and drainage systems easier, quicker and precise, said Survey of Bangladesh Director Colonel Mahmudun Nabi recently.

It will prove to be immensely useful for agencies like Roads and Highways Department,

Bangladesh Water Development Board, Bangladesh Forest Department, Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority, Department of Environment and Department of Land Record and Surveys.

"A precise map helps us in precise planning and execution of complicated development projects," said Mahmudun, adding that the map will save Tk 374 crore of the Annual Development Plan 2010-11. The map will be scaled 1:5,000 for the five divi-

sional cities of Barisal, Chittagong, Khulna, Rajshahi and Sylhet and 1:25,000 for the rest of the country. "We will compose 954 sheets of the national

map, all to be available online," he added. As part of the project, a Digital Mapping Centre will be set up in the city's Mirpur this year.

Uniform nationwide topographic information

is essential for the country's development, aiding people from all walks of life, especially over land demarcation disputes, said Mahmudun. "Once we have the system, the digital map can

be precisely updated," he said. He, however, expressed concern over budget constraints on the upgrading process. The Survey of Bangladesh drew a detailed map of Dhaka city

in 2004 but it was never updated for fund con-

straints, he added. The Survey of Bangladesh, the sole national topographic mapping authority, started the project with technical and financial support from Japan International Cooperation Agency.

"We did not have any previous experience to carry out the huge task. Our staff were trained in Japan and Thailand," said Mahmudun.

Call to ensure training, job for lepers

Due to superstitions and lack of government initiatives, most lepers remain segregated from job opportunity, said lepers' leaders, urging the government to provide them with loan and technical training for their rehabilitation.

They put forward the demand at a press briefing organised by The Leprosy Mission International (TLMI), an organisation working for lepers, at YWCA Auditorium in the city's Mohammadpur yesterday. A misleading concept regarding leprosy

still prevails in the society, so lepers cannot have spontaneous association in the society, making them alienated and consequently jobless, they said. Their others demands included arranging treatment of leprosy at all public and private

incorporating lessons on leprosy in textbooks. Though some government and non-

institutions towards the children of lepers and

hospitals, ensuring equal rights for lepers in jobs, removing discriminations in academic

government hospitals give them treatment and medicine free-of-cost, but no government organisation came forward with monitory assistance or training to bring back the lepers to normal life, they added.

Contacted over phone, Dr Safir Uddin Ahmed, deputy program manager of National Leprosy Elimination Program, said, "The government and eight other NGOs are providing medicare to lepers. As we work under Health Ministry, we have no arrangement for rehabilitating them."

He added that, at current, more than 20,000

lepers became disabled due to the disease. Dr Safir said, in 1991, in every 10,000 people, 13.6 were affected with leprosy where as, in 2011, the total number of fresh cases of leprosy was only 3,800 out of the total population. This shows that leprosy has declined over the time in Bangladesh.

Project Manager Jewel Baidya of TLMI, Manger Mallica R Halder of DCBRP and Dr Aprue Mong of LEPRA, among others, attended the briefing.

MISAPPROPRIATING TK1.39CR

Woman gets 10 yrs' RI

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced the wife of a former official of Islami Bank Bangladesh Limited to ten years' rigorous imprisonment for misappropriating Tk 1.39 crore of the bank.

Judge Mohammad Abdul Majid of the Special Court for Dhaka Division handed down the verdict in the presence of Shahanur Begum, wife of former vice-president of Islami Bank Bangladesh Limited Sirajul Islam.

The court also fined her Tk 60 lakh, in default of which she will have to suffer five years more in jail and ordered the authorities concerned to confiscate in favour of the state Tk 59 lakh which she deposited in different banks in her

Following the judgement, Shahanur broke down in tears. The court cancelled her bail and ordered sending her to jail with a

conviction warrant. The court acquitted Sirajul Islam of the charges as he died on November 23, 2004.

Earlier, prosecution and defence completed their arguments and the court recorded the statements of 17 prosecution witnesses. According to the prosecution, Sirajul Islam, while he was a

vice-president of the bank sometime between 1988 and 1998, opened a fake savings account at his own bank and transferred Tk 1,39,31,000 to the fake account from the bank on different dates. Later, his wife Shahanur Begum withdrew 1,39,31,000

money into her account. After an investigation into the matter, a manager of the Islami Bank filed a case against Sirajul and his wife Shahanur with Motijheel Police Station on April 2, 1998.
