"It is very rare for an opportunity as exciting as this to come along within sport, to have a clean page to develop what I believe will become a major sport in the

"Cricket is already the second biggest sport in the world and the USA is the biggest commercial market for sport. My role is to marry those two factors together and there is plenty of potential and opportunity to do that."

"Cricket is already played extensively across the United States with close to 50,000 regular players and it is the world's second biggest consumer of internet cricket behind India."

AB ton propels SA

South Africa captain AB de Villiers compiled a superb century to lead his side to an easy six-wicket win over New Zealand in the opening oneday international at Westpac Stadium on Saturday.

De Villiers, in deft touch, was not out on 106 with Faf du Plessis on 66 as South Africa overhauled New Zealand's 253 for nine with 28 balls to spare.

On a ground with a history of favouring the side batting second, New Zealand captain Brendon McCullum won the toss, elected to bat first and never seriously threatened from there as his batsmen failed to gain momentum.

Although the target was not immense, South Africa wavered at the start of their innings with Hashim Amla (8), Graeme Smith (9) and Jacques Kallis (13) falling in quick succession to be 35 for three by the 10th over.

But from there de Villiers steadied the run chase and they slowly and surely reeled in the New Zealand total although the South African captain played down the comprehensive nature of the win.

McCullum said he had 'no regrets" about batting first but "they kept picking up wickets at regular times against us and we couldn't get that partnership we needed. The way AB came out certainly took the game away from us."

De Villiers combined with JP Duminy (46) in a 90-run stand for the fourth wicket which was broken when Rob Nicol tossed up a full deliv-

South Africa were then 125 for four in the 31st over when Faf de Plessis joined his skipper and they dismantled the New Zealand bowling attack with apparent ease, compiling 129 runs over the next 14 overs.

They poked and prodded for singles when the field was spread and then effortlessly found the boundary when the fielders were brought in.

De Villiers came to the wicket in the fifth over with South Africa at 17 for two and faced 151 balls for his 106 which included three fours and four sixes.

He reached his century with a single off Doug Bracewell at the start of the 44th over and du Plessis marked the occasion with a six and two fours off the next three balls. Du Plessis' 66 in 72 balls included nine fours and a six.

The New Zealand innings was built around a 79-run stand by McCullum and Kane Williamson for the third wicket after the hosts had started slowly, creeping to 75 for two in the first 20 overs.

The next 75 runs took less than 13 overs but the loss of McCullum, and the quick departure of big-hitting Jesse Ryder (6) soon after put the brakes on the New Zealand charge.

McCullum had a charmed life and was saved three times by television replays on his way to 56 off 67 balls.

Usain Bolt has pulled out of Saturday's Gibson Relays, another delay to the start of a 2012 campaign pointed toward his defence of his Olympic sprint titles in London.

"Due to Usain's unscheduled trip [to Europe] which resulted in his training disruption the coach, Glen Mills, has decided that Usain will not take part in the Gibson Relays," Bolt's camp said in a one-line release.

It's the second local meeting Bolt will miss this month after he had left the island days prior to his traditional opener, the Camperdown Classic, two weeks ago.

Bolt, the reigning 100m and 200m Olympic champion, was slated to race a 400m at the low-key Camperdown meeting, but was seen in Germany where he reportedly went to see renowned sport medicine doctor Hans-Wilhelm Müller-Wohlfahrt.

Bolt, however, has downplayed rumours of an injury and reported up to last Sunday that he was fine.

Meet organisers in Europe said this month that Bolt will open his pre-Olympic season in Europe competing in the Golden Spike event in the eastern Czech city of Ostrava on May 25.

He will then compete in Rome on May 31, and in the Oslo Diamond League meeting on June 7.

'Selectors fear Sachin'

Former Australia batsman Dean Jones has said that Sachin Tendulkar looks tired of oneday cricket but no selector has the courage to tell him to retire from the 50-over format.

"Father time waits for no one, including cricketing greats Ricky Ponting and Sachin Tendulkar. Both players are looking tired of the 50-over format of the game and this week enough was enough for the Australian selectors, who dropped Ponting from the one-day squad," Jones said.

"India, on the other hand, has no selector with the courage to tell Tendulkar his oneday career is over, no matter how badly he might be playing. People are worried their homes could be damaged if they are seen to have removed Tendulkar against his will. He will keep playing for as long as he likes and thus lies the problem for India," Jones wrote in his column for Sydney Morning Herald.

Describing Tendulkar as the greatest ODI player of all time, Jones added that another reason for not telling the iconic batsman to retire was the fear that sponsors might pull out of the game.

'brands' in their own right. If you kill off their careers too early, potential sponsors will pull out of cricket on a national basis, particu-

larly in India. Tendulkar has also been great in ODI cricket -- in fact he may be the greatest one-day batsman of all time. He has averaged winning one man-of-the-match award in every seven ODIs, proving his dominance over a 458-game ODI career," he said.

"Indian vultures are starting to appear above Tendulkar's head, but who will have the courage to end his career? He is looking in average form and is consistently putting his team under the pump with some poor dismissals of late at the top of the order.

"Mind you, it was only a year ago that he made an unbeaten 200 in ODI cricket. How time flies, with the great man looking vulnerable facing the two new white balls on bouncing Australian pitches," Jones wrote.

The Australian added that with so much money in cricket today, many players would want to play as long as possible.

"Let's be honest just for a minute. Players of today realise there is a huge amount of money to be earned in cricket and they will play for as long as possible to reap every cent. These guys will play until they are 50 if they are allowed to.

"The penny has finally dropped as cricket boards around the world are realising this. They are also concerned at when is the best "Ponting and Tendulkar are massive and right time to retire star players. The responses from fans and sponsors are unpredictable when they retire a player 'too early'," the former batsman said.
