#### Raise voice against move to protect war criminals

## Transit to spin \$44m a year

Transport expert Rahmatullah says earnings to shoot up once total infrastructure in place

Bangladesh could earn about \$44 million a year by providing transit to India and its neighbours over the first five years while developing infrastructure for the facility, a transport expert said yesterday.

If the infrastructure was ready in five years, Bangladesh would annually earn half a billion US dollars from the sixth and \$1 billion from

### President pardons a criminal twice

The president has granted mercy Barrage to take stock of its to convicted killer AHM Biplob for the second time in seven months. This time, Biplob's life sentence in each of two murder cases has been reduced to a 10-year imprisonment.

Biplob is the son of Abu Taher, an Awami League leader and mayor of Laxmipur municipality.

Earlier in July last year, Biplob was pardoned by President Zillur Rahman in the advocate Nurul Islam murder case, in which he was given death sentence.

A home ministry source yesterday said Biplob was given life term in each of BNP activist Kamal murder case of 2001 and Shibir activist

Mohsin murder case of 2000.

The ministry on February 8 issued a letter, stating that the president being kind has reduced the life term convictions of AHM Biplob (inmate no-2009/A) to 10 years rigorous imprisonment, effective from the date of the jail warrant.

The president has also pardoned Biplob's associate Babor, who had also been awarded life sentence in the Kamal murder case. His sentence has been reduced by seven years, added the source, requesting anonymity.

The two are now serving their jail terms in Laxmipur jail.

#### 20,000 websites for people by 2015

Govt moves to take e-services to rural areas

The government will launch 20,000 websites by 2015 to take e-service to the masses in efforts to materialise its vision of Digital Bangladesh.

The websites will be developed under the National Portal Framework (NPF) in districts, upazilas, divisions, ministries and directorates with a free web-hosting by the government, Anir Chowdhury, policy adviser for Access to Information (A2I) at the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), said at a seminar yesterday.

The websites will have information on union and upazila parishads, social safety nets, and disaster warning through the mobile network, he said.

They will also include documents on land management, and forums for farmers and fisheries workers, said Chowdhury.

## Dhaka keen on hydro plant

Sits with Delhi today to review electricity venture

Bangladesh is expected to propose setting up of a joint-venture hydropower plant in north-eastern region of India in a Joint Steering Committee (JSC) meeting on power sector cooperation in New Delhi tomorrow.

If India agrees in principle to Bangladesh's proposal, then other steps

will be taken in this regard including choosing a site for the plant, from which Bangladesh could import electricity to meet its growing demand, a senior official of the Bangladesh foreign ministry told The Daily Star yesterday.

Dhaka is also likely to come up with a proposal to import power from Nepal and Bhutan through Indian territories.
