# Dipu Moni hopes Dhaka-IOM to continue to work closely

Foreign Minister Dipu Moni expressed hope that Bangladesh and International Organization for Migration (IOM) would continue to work closely in areas of mutual interest.

She said this when the new IOM Country Chief Sarah Dash called on her to present his credentials. Sarah Dash mentioned that IOM would continue to provide policy support to Bangladesh for the welfare of migrant workers.

The foreign minister thanked IOM for its works in Bangladesh.

She underscored the need for an international framework to respond to emergency situations including reintegration of the workers in the countries of origin and return to the work in the destination country.

# Yunus as WB president

Says Gowher Rizvi

The prime minister's International Affairs Adviser Gowher Rizvi yesterday said Prime Minister Shiekh Hasina was serious about her proposal to nominate Nobel Laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus as the president of the World Bank.

"When the PM gives a proposal, she is serious. He (Prof Yunus) has competence; he has experience; he has standing; he has stature.

"He is a completely competent choice for the presidency of World Bank. There cannot be a more competent choice," said Gowher in an interview with the television channel ATN Bangla.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina conveyed the proposal to the European Union during a meeting with an EU delegation on February 22.

A few days later US Ambassador to Bangladesh Dan W Mozena endorsed the prime minister's proposal and expressed confidence that should Prof Yunus agree to his nomination for the position, it will be given the fullest consideration.

While the United Nations Development Programme chief used to be an American, the last few years have been different, added Gowher.

"It is not written anywhere or said in any constitution or any rules that it has to be an American. So the US will support him," he said.

The World Bank said it plans to appoint a new president by the time of the annual spring meetings in April as the current chief Robert Zoellick declared to step down at the end of June.

# PM serious about 2 bills passed to tax speakers, MPs

Parliament yesterday passed two bills scrapping "discriminatory" provisions from two laws that exempted the speaker, deputy speaker and MPs for around 38 years from paying taxes on their remunerations.

Another two bills are likely to be placed in the House today seeking to repeal the similar provision from two other laws that exempt the prime minister, ministers, state ministers and deputy ministers from paying taxes on their salaries, sources in the Parliament Secretariat say.

Amid absence of the BNP-led opposition, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed yesterday proposed for passage of the bills to bring changes in the Members of Parliament (Remuneration and Allowances) Order, 1973 and Speaker and Deputy Speaker (Remuneration and Privileges) Act, 1974.

The changes in the two laws concerned took effect from July 1, 2011.

The original law, Members of

Parliament (Remuneration and Allowances) Order, 1973 did not exempt MPs from taxes on their remuneration. But the then government in 1974 amended the law by introducing the "discriminatory" provision.

The speaker, deputy speaker, prime minister, ministers, state ministers and deputy ministers were also exempted from paying taxes on their salaries and remunerations with the introduction of a similar legal provision. Criticism has been raging against

the provision, with the demand that such provisions be repealed. But lawmakers did not pay heed to it and instead have been enjoying the "discriminatory" benefits. Finally, the ruling Awami League

in its manifesto amended in July 2009 stated that there would be no law "discriminatory" between MPs and citizens of Bangladesh. Eventually, the AL-led government

moved to scrap the provision, termed "discriminatory" by Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Shafique Ahmed, who placed the two

HM Ershad's rule to give MPs undue benefits. Meanwhile, Environment and Forest Minister Hasan Mahmud placed two bills in parliament seeking to amend the Forest Act, 1927 and

to enact new law for preserving trees. The proposed legislation on tree preservation says the government can declare trees standing in forest or public places to be preserved. It has also a special provision that says opinion of headman will be taken before declaring any trees standing

in the areas of ethnic minority people for preservation.

According to the provisions of the bill, no trees grown naturally in the forest land can be cut or removed without the government's permission. An individual might be punished

with a maximum jail term of three months or a fine of Tk 50,000 or both for violation of the proposed legislation. The other bill seeking to amend

the Forest Act, 1927 proposes to increase punishment for offences related to forestry. A provision of the bill also proposes to impose a ban on leasing of forest land to any private company or agency in any form or any purpose including construction of roads, infrastructure, brick fields and establishment of industries. A provision of the bill says special

measures will be taken to protect the traditional and customary rights of the ethnic minority group as recognised in the existing laws.

Both the bills were sent to the parliamentary standing committee on the environment and forest ministry for scrutiny.

The 29-day Amar Ekushey Boi Mela ended yesterday with a record turnover and appearance of new books this year.

The turnover was over Tk 26 crore in 28 days, said Shahida Khatun, director (establishment, planning and training division) of Bangla Academy, who read out the closing report yesterday. Last year's sales amounted to Tk25 crore.

Meanwhile, the number of new book arrivals was 3,669, 656 more than that of the previous year. Topping the list were poetry books numbering 817 followed by novels, totalling to 563. Yesterday's fair saw the arrival of 109 new books.

A total 425 publishing houses and socio-cultural, non-government and media organisations took part in the fair.

Expressing satisfaction over the sales, the publishers urged the authority to strictly implement the fair's policies to

stop allotting stalls to "so-called" socio cultural organisations. Osman Gani, owner of Agamee

Prakashani, said the huge turnouts since the fair's inauguration helped reach this year's record sales. However, some publishers claimed

that the monetary value did not portray the true picture of the number of book sold as book prices were comparatively high this year. In yesterday's closing ceremony, pre-

sided over by Bangla Academy Chairman Prof Anisuzzamn, its Director General Dr Shamsuzzaman Khan thanked everyone formaking the fair a success.
