Barca on the verge of last 8

Bayer Leverkusen face what looks to be the near-impossible task of putting three goals past Barcelona at the Nou Camp on Wednesday and to do so they will need to dethrone the undisputed passing kings of Europe.

Holders Barca, who won last month's Champions League last-16 first leg in Leverkusen 3-1, have conceded just five goals in 13 home La Liga games this season and let in only two at the Nou Camp in their three group matches in Europe's elite competition.

A big reason opponents find it so difficult to score against Pep Guardiola's side is that they rarely go a game without having the ball for at least 70 per cent of the time, their mesmerising passing game grinding teams into submission.

In Europe's top five leagues, Barca playmaker Xavi has completed by far the most passes in the opponents' half this season with 1,553, Barca's website (www.fcbarcelona.com) said.

Their World Player of the Year Lionel Messi, Champions League top scorer this term with seven goals, is second with 1,351 passes while fullback Daniel Alves is fourth on 1,215 sandwiched between Real Madrid's Xabi Alonso with 1,271 and Arsenal's Mikel Arteta on 1,207.

"The fact that it is a tough prospect is clear to all of us but it's not over until it's over, as the saying goes, and we'll wait and see what happens," Leverkusen forward Stefan Kiessling said in an interview on the club's website (www.bayer04.de).

"We want to go there and do ourselves justice and look for our chances."



Harry not interested

Tottenham manager Harry Redknapp on Tuesday ruled himself out of the running to succeed sacked Chelsea boss Andre Villas-Boas.

Villas-Boas was sacked on Sunday, a day after his side suffered a 1-0 defeat to West Bromwich Albion. The loss was the latest in a string of league defeats that has left Chelsea off the pace in the race for a Champions League spot next season.

Pep Guardiola, Jose Mourinho and Rafael Benitez are among the favourites to succeed the 34-year-old Portuguese, though Redknapp has also been linked with the job.

But Redknapp, who is tipped to become the next England manager, admits that while the post at Stamford Bridge is an attractive one, he is not interested in a move to Tottenham's cross city rivals.

"It would be difficult. I wouldn't be able to come back to north London," he said. "So no, I will pass on that one."

Despite Roman Abramovich firing six managers since taking over in 2003, Redknapp believes the Chelsea job is one of

the most appealing in world football. "It's a club you can win a championship difficult.

at because the owner has spared no expense," Redknapp said.

"He has built the most incredible training

ground, and they buy top-level players. "They have top players so it's a dream job for someone to go there and make a success

of it, whoever they take. "So many people would love that job and the chance to work at a great club with the

backing that the manager gets there." Redknapp said he was sad to see Villas-Boas lose his job after just eight months, but conceded that Abramovich has every right to

make a change. "He owns it, he pays massive wages to the managers and if he doesn't get the success he wants then he is in a position where he is not going to sit back and do nothing," Redknapp added.

"Those are the rules you have to work under.

"When you go there you have to be successful. If not you are not, you're not going to last. That's how it works."

Redknapp thinks Mourinho, who won five trophies during a three-year spell at Chelsea, could return to Stamford Bridge, although luring the 49-year-old from his current employers Real Madrid may be REUTERS, Madrid



Levante continued to defy their humble status as Valencia's second club when they beat Real Betis 3-1 to reclaim fourth place in La Liga on Monday.

Athletic Bilbao and Malaga had leap-frogged Levante with victories at the weekend that lifted both clubs to 37 points from 25 matches, with

Bilbao climbing into Spain's fourth Champions League qualification berth on goal difference and Qatar-owned Malaga in fifth.

Victory over Betis at their Ciutat de Valencia stadium put Levante back in fourth on 38 points, five behind city rivals Valencia, who won 1-0 at Granada on Sunday.

Midfielder Jose Barkero set Levante on their way with a 34th-minute free kick and a Xavi Torres header made it 2-0 in the 42nd minute.

Betis pulled a goal back two minutes later when Jorge Molina made the most of a defensive error to fire past Gustavo Munua before Arouna Kone sped clear to score six minutes after the break and make it 3-1.

Levante, the season's surprise packages, have one of the oldest squads in the Spanish top flight and an annual budget of only 20 million euros (\$26.5 million), compared with Real Madrid's of almost 500 million.

They beat Real 1-0 in September and briefly topped the standings before falling out of form and slipping down the table.

Valcke says sorry

FIFA general secretary Jerome Valcke apologised on Monday for remarking that Brazil needed a "kick up the backside" to be ready for the 2014 World Cup as the government formally

declared him unwelcome to visit for talks on the tournament next week.

Valcke's comment on Friday angered the South American soccer power, and prompted Sports Minister Aldo Rebelo to write to FIFA president Sepp Blatter to say they no longer wanted to deal with the Frenchman, who was due to visit on March 12.

After publicising its decision to write to Blatter, the government revealed a note from Valcke apologising for his remarks.

In the note, a copy of which has been seen by Reuters, Valcke said his remark had became much harsher in translation from French to Portuguese and only meant "speed things up".

He did, however, add there was "certainly an air of worry at FIFA" about the slow progress of tournament preparations.

"The form and content of (Valcke's) remarks go beyond acceptable standards of harmonious coexistence between a sovereign state like Brazil and a centenary international organisation like FIFA.

"Faced with this fact, the Brazilian government can no longer accept Mr Jerome Valcke as an interlocutor in its dealings with FIFA during preparations for this World Cup."

Rebelo had already described Valcke's remarks as "offensive" and "unacceptable" at a news conference on Saturday.

FIFA has criticised Brazil for slow progress preparing stadiums and infrastructure and a delay in passing laws on the sale of alcoholic drinks at venues and for cheap tickets for low-income sectors of society.

On his last visit to Brazil in January, Valcke had praised progress at venues he visited.

Although apologising to Rebelo, Valcke described himself as the person ultimately responsible for the World Cup and that he was under pressure to ensure Brazil delivered the finals in good time.

He went on to tell Rebelo that he was "confident there is no problem that cannot be overcome with the efforts of FIFA, the local organising committee and the Brazilian authorities."

FIFA to scrap FIFA to scrap APOEL dream big

World governing body FIFA said it had made progress on streamlining the international match calendar on Monday, saying it would recommend a UEFA-backed plan that would abolish unpopular international friendlies in August.

A working group from international confederations, players, clubs and professional leagues met at FIFA's headquarters in Zurich to discuss the post-2014 calendar.

The proposals include a maximum of 18 international matches per nation in a twoyear cycle, split into nine double dates in March, September, October and November and every other June.

February friendlies, which are also unpopular because of the crowded domestic schedules at that time, would also have no place in the proposed new calendar.


