After resumption, Abahani coach Ali Akbar sent on Rony in place of winger Zahid Hossain and it proved a masterstroke as Rony dived to head in a cross from Lucky Paul past Sheikh Russel goalkeeper Biplob Bhattacharjee to open the scoring.

Abahani could have gone further ahead but Paul again squandered an opportunity in the 83rd minute when he shot wide from close-range. However, Abaahni gave Sheikh Russel the lifeline two minutes later when Wali faisal pulled down Alamu Bukola inside the box.

Bukola himself stepped up to take the shot but Abahani keeper Al Hasan was up to the task as he dived to the left to stop the shot and earn three valuable points for his team.

Stand-in Australian captain Shane Watson vowed on Friday to lead from the front with his team battling fatigue after a gruelling summer, as they set off for a tour of the West Indies.

The one-day squad left Sydney for the Caribbean a little more than 12 hours after winning the tri-series title against Sri Lanka in Adelaide.

The players were woken before daybreak to catch flights to Sydney and then on to the West Indies with a five-match one-day series, beginning on March 16, crammed over 10 days.

Some of the team will then back up for two Twenty20 matches and three Tests.

Watson said his injury-hit season made him fresher than those involved in a heavy eight-month schedule which has included tours to Sri Lanka and South Africa and a full domestic programme against New Zealand,

India and Sri Lanka.

"From my perspective, I'm very fresh after missing the majority of the summer so I'm really excited about being able to go and continue to play a lot more cricket," he said at Sydney airport.

Watson led Australia to victory in the deciding third final against Sri Lanka on Thursday in the absence of the injured Michael Clarke.

Clarke's hamstring strain has already ruled him out of the opening phase of matches in the West Indies, although he is confident of being ready for the Tests.

"There's no doubt there's some guys that have played the whole summer who are

going to be a little bit tired," said Watson. "But in the end, that's part and parcel of

playing international cricket. "You are playing just about all year

round, and you've got to find ways to be able to freshen up whenever you possibly can and to be able to keep doing everything you can to stay as fresh as you can to be able to perform."

Spending 43 weeks atop the world rankings, Kuerten reached his heights on the red clay at Roland Garros, winning the French Open in 1997, 2000 and 2001.

"During my career in tennis I was fortunate to have many victories, but the Hall of Fame induction is a special one," Kuerten said.

Kuerten praised the influential players upon his career, including legends Bjorn Borg, Pete Sampras, John McEnroe and Andre Agassi.

"I was inspired by lots of great tennis players, like Maria Bueno and Thomas Koch, two of the biggest Brazilian tennis players, and I have also always greatly admired Hall of Famers including Borg, McEnroe,

Sampras, and Agassi.

Dravid calls time

"I had thought about it (retiring) even before the tour of Australia," he said. "I knew in my heart... I knew deep down that the time was right. For the past year, I had assessed my future after every series.

"My approach to cricket has been reasonably simple -- it was about giving everything to the team, it was about playing with dignity and it was about upholding the spirit of the

"I hope I have done some of that. I have failed at times, but I have never stopped trying. It's why I leave with sadness, but also with pride."

Former India captain Sourav Ganguly, a fellow debutant with Dravid in the 1996 Lord's Test, said it will not be easy to replace him.

"He was a perfectionist. His determination, technique and commitment towards the game was something special," said Ganguly. "It's really tough to become another Rahul Dravid. It will not happen overnight."

Dravid will continue playing in the lucrative Indian Premier League Twenty20 event where he will lead Rajasthan Royals this year after the retirement of Australian spin legend Shane Warne.

Troubled New Zealand batsman Jesse Ryder will take an indefinite break from cricket to deal with personal issues after being dropped following a drinking binge.

Ryder had been through a deeply stressful and emotional time" and needed to concentrate on his personal wellbeing, the player's manager Aaron Klee told Fairfax Media on Friday.

Ryder and paceman Doug Bracewell were suspended from the New Zealand one-day team for one match after going drinking after a loss to South Africa in Napier last week and becoming involved in a row in a hotel.

The 27-year-old Ryder was also left out of the Test squad for this week's first Test against the Proteas, although selectors insisted the omission was due to concerns about form and fitness.

He has a Test batting average of 40.93 and an ODI average of 34.37 but his career has been marred by incidents involving alcohol.

Klee said Ryder, who is contracted to the Wellington Firebirds, decided to stand down from all forms of cricket after discussions with his management, Cricket Wellington, a psychologist and the players association.

Ryder could be available for the Firebirds within weeks "but it would be imprudent of me to try and put an exact date on this", said Klee.

"We are not dealing with this from a professional perspective as a cricketer, this is all about Jesse as a person," Klee said. "That is my total focus as his manager and as his friend."

Dokic out of **Indian Wells**

Irina Falconi, Gisela Dulko and Johanna Larsson all advanced to the second round at the Indian Wells tournament early on Thursday as their opponents withdrew with injuries.

Australia's Jelena Dokic pulled out after just nine minutes in the first set with a right wrist injury, sending Dulko, of Argentina, into the second round, where she will face second seed Maria Sharapova.

Dulko has reached the quarterfinals in Indian Wells twice, in 2004 and 2006.

Sweden's Larsson was 4-1 ahead in the first set when qualifier Greta Arn of Hungary retired from their match with a neck injury.

Larsson will face former world number one Ana Ivanovic, who is seeded 15th, in the next round.

Arn reached the third round of the Australian Open and the semi-finals in Monterrey, Mexico, last month, where she lost to Romania's Alexandra Cadantu.

American wild card Falconi advanced after Alexandra Dulgheru withdrew from their match with a right knee injury. Dulgheru won the first set 6-4 and was trailing 5-2 in the second when she pulled the plug.

Sweden's Sofia Arvidsson swept past Eleni Daniilidou of Greece in her opening match 6-4, 7-6 (7/4).

The 28-year-old Arvidsson kept her unforced errors down to a minimum and won 65 percent of her second serve points in the one hour, 55 minute match.

The men's side of the draw began play Thursday as wild card Sam Querrey defeated fellow American Tim Smyczek 7-6 (7/1), 6-4, Poland's Lukasz Kubot beat Ivo Karlovic, of Croatia, 6-4, 6-2 and Italy's Andreas Seppi rallied to defeat Olivier Rochus, of Belgium 4-6, 6-3, 6-4

Ryder taking Centurion duo puts SA on top

Century-makers Graeme Smith and Jacques Kallis gave South Africa an imposing 233-run lead with seven wickets remaining on the third day of the first Test against New Zealand on Friday.

South Africa were in trouble at 47 for two, only 12 runs ahead, when the pair came together to forge a 200run stand on an even University Oval wicket. The tourists were 268-3 in their second innings at stumps.

Smith's captain's knock of 115 came to an end with the arrival of the second new ball late in the day while Kallis atoned for his first innings duck to reach 107 not out at stumps with Jacques Rudolph on 13.

New Zealand were bowled out early in the morning session for 273, a lead of 35 runs, and they had reason to feel confident when Doug Bracewell dismissed Alviro Petersen (25) and Hashim Amla (2) in a five-ball burst. But from there South

Africa's senior batsmen Smith and Kallis set about regaining the initiative in a carefully measured partner-

Smith took 234 balls for his 115 while Kallis has faced

236 deliveries. Smith has never lost a Test in which he has reached 100.

Kallis brought up his century with a five off Chris Martin when he played to cover-point for a quick single and the fielder's return went past the stumps and across the outfield to the boundary.

Martin, New Zealand's chief destroyer in South Africa's first innings, had no luck the second time around in the field with Bracewell the only bowler to taste success. Following his two early

wickets, Bracewell returned with the new ball to bowl Smith with a good length delivery that came back and caught the inside edge. He also had a successful

LBW appeal against Rudolph overturned on appeal, finishing the day with 3-53 from 18 overs. Rudolph appeared ready

to walk when given out by umpire Aleem Dar but Kallis insisted on going for the review, which showed the ball had pitched outside leg stump. On a day when New Zea-

land had little to celebrate, there was one moment to cherish after play resumed in the morning.

In the second over of the day Trent Boult belted 22 off Vernon Philander including three sixes.

Philander was the most successful of the South African bowlers with figures

'No obsession to beat Djokovic'

Rafael Nadal says he's not obsessed with beating Novak Djokovic despite some heavy soul searching after seven straight losses to the world No. 1, the last three in

Grand Slam finals. "I don't have the spirit of revenge. I don't have the spirit of obsession of another player," Nadal said Thursday at the ATP Tour's Indian Wells Masters series tournament.

"I want to improve to beat Novak and Roger (Federer). I try every day to improve my level of tennis.

"But whenever I go on the court for practice I don't think about Novak, I think about getting better."

Spaniard Nadal says he's ready to reclaim success. his throne as the top ranked player in the world, but that path clearly goes through Djokovic, who defeated Nadal in the final of this year's Australian Open 5-7, 6-4, 6-2, 6-7 (5/7), 7-5 to win his fifth Grand Slam title and

third in a row. The match lasted almost six hours, the longest Grand Slam final in history, and marked Djokovic's seventh-straight win over the claycourt specialist, beginning with

last year's final here in the California desert. "It was a great match, great quality and it was physically demanding and emotional.

He won, I lost and I was happy to be part of that," said Nadal, who is playing his first tournament since the Australian Open.

World number two Nadal holds a 16-14 career record over Djokovic but couldn't overcome the Serb in the most recent Aussie Open, US Open and Wimbledon.

"You have to have a reference on what you have to do to improve," said Nadal, who won the 2011 French Open. "I prefer to be in front."

Nadal, 25, said there is no magic formula

to beating Djokovic. It is going to come down to hard work.

"He brings tennis to another level. But nobody is forever. There was Federer then something happened and then Djokovic and in three to five years when I come back here there will be somebody better than him. I don't know if it will be me the one to have

"Victories for everybody have an end." Nadal, Indian Wells champion in 2007 and 2009 -- will play a South American in his

opening second round match of the men's draw which got underway on Thursday. If he gets past either Argentina's Leonardo Mayer or Colombian Alejandro Falla, who played on Friday, he would be on track

to possibly face world number six Jo-Wilfried Tsonga or tenth seeded Janko Tipsarevic in the quarterfinals.

"I feel I am hitting more winners than before," said Nadal, who is 31-5 at Indian Wells.
