Annan starts Syria mission

EU opposes military intervention

AFP, Damascus

Former UN chief Kofi Annan held crux talks in Damascus on Saturday with the hopes of the world pinned on his bid to prevent a nearly year-old uprising spiralling into all-out civil war.

State media reported the start of talks between President Bashar al-Assad and Annan, on his first visit since being named international envoy on the conflict.

President Bashar al-Assad told UN/Arab League envoy Kofi Annan that no political solution was possible in Syria while "terrorist" groups were destabilizing the country.

"Syria is ready to make a success of any honest effort to find a solution for the events it is witnessing," state news agency SANA quoted Assad as telling his guest. "No political dialogue or political


activity can succeed while there are armed terrorist groups operating and spreading chaos and instability," the Syrian leader said after about two hours of talks with the former UN secretary-general.

There was no immediate comment from Annan after the meeting, aimed at halting bloodshed that has cost thou-

sands of lives since a popular uprising erupted a year ago.

Sixteen rebel fighters, seven soldiers and four civilians were killed in the Idlib fighting, according to the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, which said 15 other people, including three soldiers, had been killed in violence

Human rights watchdogs say the conflict has cost more than 8,500 lives since last March.

Emissary of the United Nations and the Arab League, Annan has the support of Damascus allies Beijing and Moscow and his mission has been welcomed by the both the Syrian government and opposition.

But Russia said its Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov made clear to Annan at a meeting earlier in Cairo that Moscow was opposed to "crude interference" in Syria's affairs.

His call was echoed by EU foreign ministers.

They warned against the temptation of military intervention in Syria despite the growing human suffering, saying boots on the ground could ignite "a large-scale fire".

Germany's Guido Westerwelle, arriving for talks with his European Union counterparts, said any talk of military intervention was "counterproductive". However Qatari Foreign Minister

Sheikh Hamad bin Jassim al-Thani yesterday told a meeting of Arab foreign ministers in Cairo that it was time to send Arab and foreign troops to conflict-stricken Syria.

Annan's visit comes a day after UN humanitarian chief Valerie Amos left Damascus following a hard-won but troubled mission to secure relief access to protest centres such as Syria's thirdlargest city Homs.

Israeli air strikes kill 14 in Gaza

Israeli air strikes on Gaza killed 14 Palestinians, including a militant group chief, medics said yesterday, in the deadliest flareup in more than three years.

The Israeli military said earlier the air force carried out 13 attacks on a range of targets, including the militant leader, and that militants had by midday fired at least 70 rockets and mortar rounds into southern Israel.

Fourteen Palestinians were killed and at least 20 others wounded in the string of Israeli air strikes on the Gaza Strip on Friday and yesterday, Palestinian medics said.

The Palestinian barrage, which started on Friday morning, injured four people, one of them seriously, Israeli military sources said.

One of the retaliatory air strikes killed the head of the Popular Resistance Committees (PRC), Zohair al-Qaisi, and fellow member Mahmud Hanani, the ultrahardline militant group said.

Akhilesh Yadav to take UP helm

A fresh young star was chosen yesterday to take power in India's most populous and politically key state after dealing a stinging electoral humiliation to the Nehru-Gandhi dynasty scion Rahul Gandhi.

Charismatic politician Akhilesh Yadav, 38, is credited with crushing Gandhi's hopes of reviving the national ruling Congress party's

fortunes in impoverished Uttar Pradesh ahead of national elections due in 2014. In a generational change of leadership,

Akhilesh Yadav, son of Samajwadi Party supremo Mulayam Singh Yadav, was choosen to be the new and youngest chief minister of India's most populous state.

The decision to nominate 38-year-old Akhilesh, an engineer by training, was taken unanimously at a meeting of newly-elected legislators of Samajwadi Party.

The party secured majority on its own with 224 members in the 403-strong state legislature in recent assembly elections in politically the most crucial state, which elects the largest number of members to parliament.

Some senior leaders of the party had reservations about Akhilesh, who has no experience in administration, becoming the chief minister but in the last two days Mualayam persuaded them about anointing his son in the throne. Meanwhile, the Congress

and the Bharatiya Janata Party yesterday welcomed Akhilesh Yadav's elevation to the chief minister's post in Uttar Pradesh and hoped that he will fulfil his poll commitments.

"I congratulate Akhilesh Yadav as new chief minister of UP. He has got the mandate to be the chief minister and I hope whatever commitment he has made and his party has made will be implemented and he will learn a lesson from the past," Congress spokesperson Rashid Alvi said in Delhi.

The BJP also congratulated Yadav and hoped that he would fulfil his poll promises. Akhilesh, who made his extensive tour of

Uttar Pradesh to spearhead the party's campaign in the elections, was instrumental in the Samajwadi Party shedding its image of being opposed to use of computers and English with promise of free laptops for students.

TRIPLE-DISASTER ANNIVERSARY

Challenges ahead of Japan

A year ago, it was hard to know what to expect. The three disasters that blindsided Japan on March 11, 2011a 9.0 earthquake, a massive tsunami and a triple nuclear meltdowncreated an unprecedented crisis for which there was no rulebook. After the water receded that Friday afternoon, leaving

as many as 20,000 dead and tens of thousands of homes and businesses in ruins, a terrible stillness settled over Japan's northeast coast. A dusting of snow fell onto

empty highways, void of aid vehicles carrying food, fuel, water and blankets. Tsunami warnings were still in effect, keeping search-and-rescue teams away from obliterated seaside neighborhoods. As workers at the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant Relatives of the deceased pay tributes to their dear ones in scrambled to get the damaged reactors under control, loud-

speakers echoed onto empty streets, instructing people to stay indoors to avoid radiation exposure.

Soon enough, of course, Japan emerged from its state of shock: Self Defense Forces, aid workers and hundreds of thousands of volunteers poured into the region to help. But a year later, the region's physical recovery is not as far along as one might hope. Only 5% of the nearly 23 million tons of debris have disposed of, the looming piles at the edge of the sea a daily reminder of the huge task ahead. Town councils still argue over how and where to rebuild, and inside the closed-off evacuation zone around the crippled plant, policeman still search for victims whose remains were never recovered.

The Red Cross warned Friday that Communities in Japan destroyed by the tsunami are years away from being righted. Rebuilding all that was lost will take time, but

other things will take longer. In two towns in Miyagi prefecture, one of the worst-hit areas, 20% of residents report having chronic insomnia, and 5% report having a member of their household who is suicidal or having serious psychiatric

problems. The crushing loss of life, community and faith in the nation's public institutions all fuel a dark mood, and the dwindling spirit of volunteerism is reinforcing the feeling that Japan is fated to slip ever further from the perch of power and vitality it enjoyed in the late 20th century into a rudderless murk in which things are getting worse and may not get better.

Others are optimistic. Most of the counties in the world might not have the courage the destructive force Japan had faced. But the nation doesn't know the way to bow down. After the Second World War, it came surging with surprising force. And it's no wonder that many count on the unique strengths of the Japanese.
