buses left Sayedabad terminal in the capital at 6:30 in the morning, when this correspondent boarded a Comilla-bound bus, travelled for two and a half hours and finally disembarked at Shashangachha terminal.

The bus operators said the administration concerned instructed them unofficially to stay off-road ahead of the rally. They also raised the allegation of intimidation from the ruling party men.

At 9:00 am, a conductor of Asia Line bus service said that all bus operators had decided not to run their buses in between Comilla and Dhaka for yesterday and today. The bus owners do not

want to take the risk of facing vandalism as a bus is worth around Tk 70 lakh.

Hamidur Rahman, who was travelling by an autorickshaw from Shashangachha to Comilla Cantonment stoppage, told the correspondent, "It seems that the government itself has called a general strike today."

Jahangir Alam, an engineer at an LGED office in Narayanganj, finally had to give up effort of reaching his office by a Dhaka-bound bus after a one-hour wait at the cantonment bus stoppage.

"My life is more valuable than attending the office,' he said.

At Gouripur, two Rab personnel in plainclothes intercepted a bus in which this correspondent was travelling. After a short search, they allowed the bus and its passengers to leave.

In absence of regular bus services, some local buses and auto-rickshaws were seen charging commuters much higher fares to make brisk money and cashing in on public sufferings.

As morning grew towards noon, the highway became emptier of traffic. At about a quarter to three in the afternoon, five elderly women of a nearby village were seen

waiting helplessly at Daudkandi bus stoppage. A mobile court at a police

check-post near Daudkandi toll plaza intercepted a passenger bus and fined its driver Tk 2,000 for not having required documents, though police earlier requisitioned the bus and seized the documents.

Shafiq Kamal, a magis-

trate on duty, said a bus cannot carry passengers after being requisitioned. It was learnt that an inspector had instructed on duty police officials at the

spot not to let eight passenger buses of S Alam and Soudia Paribahans bound for Dhaka pass the area. Md Delwar, driver of a

bus, however, said police never fined them earlier on such a ground. Rows of city buses were

seen kept off-road all the way through Kanchpur to Sayedabad and Jatrabari.

and Kuliarchar said they had stopped services to avoid police harassment and attacks on the road by ruling party activists.

Meanwhile, police checkposts installed on the highway, where all buses were stopped for detailed search, created a huge tailback of vehicles, triggering woes for passengers.

This correspondent, who was on Shwopno Bilash, a Bhairab-bound bus from Kuliarchar, had to stick for around one and a half hours (from 1:30pm to 3:00pm) at Bhulta, Rupganj in Narayanganj due to a checkpost.

A supervisor of the service said the company had stopped services from yes-

terday fearing police requisition. Only one bus ran that day to Dhaka, charging double and even triple the usual fare from passengers.

Many of the Dhakabound buses stopped before entering Dhaka due to the harassment panic. Buses of Chalan Beel, a Bhairab-Mohakhali service, were carrying passengers but dropping them off before entering Dhaka.

Meanwhile, opposition leaders and activists of Bhairab and Kuliarchar upazilas, fearing harassment by law enforcers, were seen going to Dhaka by train and other modes of transport.

They said they had to stay away from their homes to avoid arrest since the law enforcers had been raiding their houses for the last few days.

Md Rafiqul Islam, conve-

nor of Bhairab upazila BNP, said party leaders and activists had been under detectives' watch for the last one week and four had been

arrested so far. He said they had initially planned to bring around 2,500 activists to the Dhaka programme by 40 buses but now the number might come down to only 500 due to harassment by law

enforcing agencies. "On personal initiatives we are going to Dhaka separately and staying at the houses of relatives," he said.

Nurul Millat, general secretary of Kuliarchar upazila BNP, said after their plan to join the rally by hiring buses was foiled, their activists had been using trains and buses and going to Dhaka separately over the last few days.

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


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
