



'Wrong day' to travel

Harrowing tale of a launch passenger

When Jalal Khan began his return journey to the capital from his hometown Barisal on Saturday night, he had no idea of the long ordeal that lay ahead of him.

The routine return to Dhaka where Jalal works as an office assistant in a private firm turned out to a neverending detour of inconvenience.

It was all because he probably chose a "wrong day" to

Jalal was scheduled to reach Dhaka after an overnight journey on Parabat-2 from Barisal. The launch duly reached Sadarghat Launch Terminal at 5:00am yesterday but was not allowed to anchor.

"I saw a group of hooligans throwing brick chips from the terminal platform at our boat," Jalal said.

It was not only Parabat-2 but three other large passenger launches, Parabat-7, Surovi-8 and Kamal Khan, which reached Sadarghat from Barisal around the same time. They were not allowed to dock.

"While the gang threw brick chips at the launches, the law enforcers were driving away the ground staff of these launches, who were requesting them to let the boats anchor at the terminal," Jalal said.

Tigers fall at the death again

It was another case of 'so near yet so far' for the Tigers as they failed to put an end to their long drought against Pakistan, going down by 21 runs after putting up a brave fight in the Asia Cup opener at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

It could so nearly have been be a story of 'Mirpur after Northampton' following superb batting from Tamim Iqbal, Shakib

Al Hasan and Nasir Hossain. But the Pakistani bowlers showed their character to survive from the jolt as Bangladesh crumbled to 241 in 48.1 overs in reply to Pakistan's 262 for eight in front of a seven thousand strong crowd under lights.

After their famous 62 runs victory in the 1999 World Cup in Northampton, Bangladesh has hardly provided any fight against Pakistan in one-day competition but they tested the nerve of the former

Businesses lament political intolerance

Businesses yesterday termed the current confrontational situation in the political arena unfortunate for the nation and said creating panic among the people by muscle flexing will not do any good.

They also slammed the government's lack of tolerance ahead of the Cholo Cholo Dhaka Cholo (March to Dhaka) programme of the BNP, which has been demanding a restoration of the caretaker government system before the next spate of parliamentary elections.

The opposition has announced a grand rally to be held in the city's Nayapaltan today as part of the programme with the participation of leaders and activists from

across the country.

The business community also urged the main opposition BNP and its allies to join parliament and enter into a dialogue with the ruling party to resolve the ongoing political crisis, instead of engaging in programmes to demonstrate political strength. Such attitudes create panic and affect public life.

"No good comes of a flexing of muscles," said AK Azad, president of the Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, while referring to the faceoff between the government and the opposition.

The reaction came even as panic gripped the entire capital, with thousands SEE PAGE 6 COL 1

Two judges of the High Court yesterday passed dissenting orders on a writ petition that challenged the reported mass arrests in the capital by law enforcers ahead of BNP's Dhaka rally today.

Senior judge of an HC bench Justice Mirza Hussain Haider asked the government to explain in six weeks as to why it should not be directed to ensure free movement of people, their right to hold assembly and other fundamental rights enshrined in the constitution.

Junior judge of the bench Justice M Khurshid Alam Sarkar, however, rejected the petition, saying that he would not accept a petition relating to a political programme.

The HC bench will now send the petition to Chief Justice Md Muzammel Hossain who will then form another bench of the HC to dispose of the matter, petitioner's lawyer Khandker Mahbub Hossain told The Daily Star.
