Messi hits 50

AFP, Madrid



Lionel Messi notched up his 50th club goal of the season with a double on Sunday as Barcelona beat Racing Santander 2-0, but the Catalan club still remain 10 points off La Liga leaders Real Madrid.

After scoring a remarkable five in the Champions League in midweek against a reeling Bayer Leverkusen, Messi found the net in both halves, the second a strike from

the penalty spot. The Argentine has 10 more goals overall than Cristiano

Ronaldo, although the Portuguese star leads the way in La Liga with 32.

Ronaldo hit a brace on Saturday as Real Madrid beat Real Betis 3-2 to maintain their surge towards a first title since 2008.

Barca, without the injured Eric Abidal and suspended Gerard Pique, started with a three-man defence which included Carles Puyol who was passed fit.

They quickly began to dominate a struggling Racing side who have not won in eight matches and appointed Alvaro Cervera as the new coach last week.

Messi had a free-kick tipped over by the keeper while Andres Iniesta hit the top of the crossbar with an excellent chip as Barca began to find a cutting edge. Racing were battling hard, and on occasions went over-

Barca's movement and passing. Cesc Fabregas had a shot well saved by the keeper before he set up Messi for the opening goal, with the Argentine

Racing were unable to respond and Barca could have extended the lead with Juan Cuenca hitting a post and Messi for once having his shot saved when one-on-one with the keeper.

Giants under threat

The Champions League could have one of the most diverse and understated quarterfinal lineups in its 20-year history if four of Europe's major powers fail to up their game in this week's last-16 sec-

ond legs. Unheralded APOEL, the first Cypriot team to reach the knockout stage of the competition, and Benfica, whose best days in Europe

came in the 1960s, reached the last eight last week along with Barcelona and AC Milan. Real Madrid, Bayern Munich, Inter Milan and Chelsea--England's sole remaining

team--are bidding to join the qualified quartet, yet all are far from sure of progress in one of the Champions League's more unpredictable campaigns. Madrid goes into Wednesday's home

game against CSKA Moscow in its best form in years, having just set a club-record 10 straight away wins in the Spanish league, but the ninetime European champions were held 1-1 by the Russian team three weeks ago.

Bayern is down 1-0 to FC Basel after the first leg in Switzerland, 2010 winner Inter lost 1-0 at Marseille and Chelsea slumped to a 3-1 loss at Napoli.

The English Premier League--Europe's richest division--will be without a representative in the Champions League quarters for the first time in 16 years if Chelsea fails to recover against Napoli on Wednesday.

Chelsea winger Juan Mata is taking inspiration from Arsenal nearly turning around a 4-0 loss against AC Milan last week, as well as his side's perfect European record at Stamford Bridge this season.

Since the defeat in Italy, Chelsea has dismissed manager Andre Villas-Boas and put

his assistant, former Italy midfielder Roberto Di Matteo, in temporary charge. Di Matteo has won his first two matches at the helm.

Napoli thrashed Cagliari 6-3 Friday for its sixth consecutive win in all competitions despite resting top striker Edinson Cavani for much of the match.

After seeing Barcelona light up the Champions League with its sparkling, Lionel Messi-inspired 7-1 demolition of Bayer Leverkusen last week, it is Madrid's turn to try to show why many people believe the team is ready to end its 10-year wait for an unprecedented 10th title.

Cristiano Ronaldo's double in a 3-2 victory at Real Betis on Saturday gave the Portugal forward 40 goals in all competitions this season and maintained his team's 10-point lead over Barcelona.

"The game against CSKA will be very difficult," said Madrid defender Marcelo. "There are no easy games (at this stage)."

After a long and dark stretch, Inter's form is finally starting to return ahead of the second leg against Marseille at the San Siro on Tuesday.

Inter beat Chievo Verona 2-0 Friday with late goals from Walter Samuel and Diego Milito to end an eight-match winless streak and bring tears to the eyes of coach Claudio Ranieri.

"This win comes just at the right time. It should give us the enthusiasm necessary to turn the result around," Ranieri said.

Three-time competition winner Bayern has doubts over striker Mario Gomez (shin and hip), winger Arjen Robben and defender Jerome Boateng (both minor knocks) after a 7-1 victory over Hoffenheim in the Bundesliga on Saturday, a result that provided the Bavarians with a timely boost ahead of Basel's visit.

"We have to keep playing this way. It can't be that we play differently again on Tuesday," Robben said.

'Title race will go to the wire'

Roberto Mancini insists Manchester City will take the Premier League title race down to the wire after his side surrendered top spot to Manchester United in a shock 1-0 defeat against Swansea.

With United cruising to a 2-0 win over West Bromwich Albion, City were pushed off pole position by their bitter rivals for the first time since October.

Despite a frustrating afternoon in south Wales, at the end of a week which also featured a 1-0 Europa League loss to Sporting Lisbon, Mancini remains confident City are still in the right frame of mind to take the title fight to the final weeks.

"We shall fight against them until the end. We have another 10 games to finish this Championship," he said.

"The season is long and the situation changes every week. It is important that we stay together. But this result changes nothing.

"It is better to stay at the top, of course, but we are now a point behind. It does not change our target. I don't see it as a critical game. I think this championship will be decided with two games to go."

things in order to be well: train, eat and rest." Neymar's club Santos wasn't happy with Menezes' comments and responded by saying that the coach should praise the player for wanting to stay in Brazil despite many offers from top European clubs.

"A comment like that, coming from the coach of the Brazilian national team, is regrettable," Santos vice president Odilio Rodrigues Filho told local media. "It's the same thing to say that someone needs to coach an European club before coaching the national team, which is not true."

Menezes never coached outside Brazil before being picked to lead the national

team. He was the second choice at the time, after Muricy Ramalho turned down an offer from the Brazilian federation because of club commitments.

Last year, Neymar agreed to a contract that ties him to Santos until the South American country hosts the 2014 World Cup. At the time there were widespread rumours of a possible move to Real Madrid or Barcelona. He said he believed he would be the happiest by being closer to friends and relatives in Brazil.

Santos was highly praised by fans and local media for rejecting the multimillion dollar offers from European clubs.

The 20-year-old Neymar, who already is a father, is one of Brazil's most promising stars and is widely expected to lead the Brazilian national team when it hosts the World Cup in two years.

more than he would if he were in Europe, Menezes also said a good performance by Brazil at the Olympics in London will be important to give the team confidence ahead of the World Cup and next year's Confederations Cup.

"These players really need a good performance to come out invigorated," Menezes said. "The coach is included in that context. You have an idea, and if it doesn't bring victories, you feel it."

In the interview, the coach also defended two-time FIFA player of the year Ronaldinho, who has been summoned to the Brazilian squad despite poor performances with Flamengo. On Sunday, Ronaldinho scored a goal but was sent off in the first half of the team's 2-0 win over rival Fluminense in the Rio Cup, the first stage of the Rio de Janeiro state championship.

Menezes said it's important that Ronaldinho "keeps trying to improve."
