Govt mills cannot pay farmers' dues as sugar unsold

Around 8,873 tonnes of sugar worth about Tk 48.80 crore produced by government-run Thakurgaon and Panchagarh sugar mills has remained unsold as their selling price is higher than that of private sugar factories and refineries.

Consequently, hundreds of farmers who had supplied sugarcane to the mills during the recently ended crushing season are yet to get their dues.

Thakurgaon Sugar Mills Ltd owes Tk 1.5 core to 500 farmers while Panchagarh Sugar Mills Ltd owes about Tk 3 crore 50 lakh to 2,500 farmers.

The farmers are regularly approaching the mill authorities for their dues, but they have to return either empty-handed or with small amounts as partial payment.

The situation may discourage farmers to grow sugarcane in the coming season.

"I cultivated sugarcane on 10-bigha (a bigha = .3306 acres) of land and supplied 58 tonnes of sugarcane to Thakurgaon Sugar Mills. But I am yet to get my dues despite coming to the mill several times. My family plan had to be changed due to the situation,' said Md Habibur Rahman, 45, a sugarcane grower of Nargoon village in Thakurgoan Sadar upazila.

Yasin Ali, 40, of Maligaon village in Atwary upazila in Panchagarh district, said he cultivated sugarcane on 15-bigha of land and supplied 70 tonnes of sugarcane to Panchagarh Sugar Mills but still he has dues ofTk50,000.

"I cannot manage the expenditure of the ongoing boro cultivation due to the delay in payment," he said.

Thakurgaon Sugar Mills produced about 4,781 tonnes of sugar by crushing 79,480 tonnes of sugarcanes in 67 days of operation period starting on December 2 last year, said Managing Director (MD) Sibendranath Sarcar.

Panchagarh Sugar Mills produced 4,363 tonnes of sugar by crushing 77,387 tonnes of sugarcane in 86 days from December 2.

Considering the production cost and the lakh 79 thousand 881 tonnes of sugarcane.

value of produced sugar, Thakurgaon Sugar Mills Ltd incurred loss of Tk 15 crore and Panchagarh Sugar Mills Ltd Tk 16 crore in the last crushing season, said MDs of the two sugar mills.

Of the total production, only 71 tonnes of sugar of Thakurgaon Sugar Mills and 200 tonnes of Panchagarh Sugar Mills have been sold, mill sources said.

"We are yet to draw sugar from stateowned sugar mills as the private companies are selling a kg of sugar at Tk 53 while the rate of state owned mills is Tk 55," said Yakub Ali, a sugar dealer of Thakurgaon.

Blaming government policy for the situation, MD of Thakurgaon Sugar Mills Ltd Sibendranath Sarcar said the private companies who import raw sugar set their prices lower than the price fixed by state-own mills.

He demanded increasing the import duty on raw sugar to save the state-owned sugar mills as livelihood of thousands of families is related with it.

The authorities of the losing mills have urged the higher authorities to arrange sufficient funds to enable them to pay off the arrear dues of the sugarcane growers, he said.

Farmers are losing interest to cultivate sugarcane as they have to face hassles to get their dues for supplying sugarcanes to the mills every year, said Yunus Ali, president of Thakurgaon Sugarcane Growers' Association.

"Sugar mill workers and employees suffer much as the mill authorities fail to pay salary in time when sugar remains unsold. The government should control the market price of sugar so that the private mill owners cannot take undue advantage by fixing lower rates," said Jobidur Rahman, president of Thalurgaon Sugar Mills Workers and Employees Union.

Fifteen state-owned sugar mills in the country produced 69,307 tonnes of sugar by crushing 10 lakh 47 thousand 559 tonnes of sugarcane this year while last year they produced 93,577 tonnes of sugar by crushing 14

Imported fertiliser at mercy of C&F men

Around 50,000 tonnes of fertiliser imported by Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC) and Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) have been lying in open space as clearing and forwarding (C & F) agents have stopped its transportation due to unusual rise in carrying costs.

As carrying costs have risen due to price hike of fuel twice in last two months, the C & F agents are waiting for next June to renew their agreement quoting new rate for transporting the fertilisers to cope with the

increased carrying costs, sources said. Non-urea fertilisers imported by BADC were kept in open space at Roosevelt Jetty in Khalishpur of Khulna city while urea fertiliser imported by BCIC was kept at Skidghat in Khulna Sadar.

As in every year, five C & F agents were appointed in June last year for carrying imported fertilisers and terms and condition of the agreement obliges them to reach fertilisers to destinations within 15 days from the date of unloading from ships, said

BADC sources. The convenor of Mongla port Users' Coordination Committee Syed Zahid Hossain admitted that C & F agents are reluctant to

carry fertilisers by trucks as their profit will come down due to price hike of fuel. "If fertilisers lying in open space are damaged by rain the country will suffer huge

financial losses and farmers will be worst affected," he said.

Mobarak Hossain, a dealer of Jessore

Khulna city as C & F agents refused to trans-

BADC Joint Director (Fertiliser) Ali Asgar said, "Of course, we have to keep the fertiliser in open spaces due to lack of accommodation in our warehouses. Besides, sale of fertilisers has declined this year."

He, however, said fertilisers kept in open spaces are safe as they are covered.

"C&F agents never informed me about rise in carrying cost. So, they are bound to transport fertilisers to destinations under terms and conditions of agreement," he added.

Md Shajahan, store officer of Khulna office of BCIC, said fertilisers kept in open spaces would be shifted to warehouses shortly.

The eleven students are Arnaj Rifat Rupa, Mahmudur Rahman Russel, Maksumul Aziz Mostaji Nipun, Abdullahel Baki, Kazi Abdul Mueed, Kauser Ahmed Khan, Munadil Raihan bin Walid, Ashrafuzzaman Toha, Touhidul Enam Apu of Khulna University and Shamsul Arefin Shakil and Samiul Hasan Khan of Buet, Dhaka.

All the bodies were recovered from the sea.

The daylong programmes yesterday included wearing of black badges at 10:00am, mourning rally at 10:30am, laying of floral wreaths at Katka tragedy memorial at 11:00am, milad mehfil at the university mosque after Zohr prayers, mass feeding at 2:00pm, condolence meeting at 4:30pm and lighting of candles at 6:30pm.
