Rafael Nadal breezed into the fourth round at Indian Wells on Tuesday where he was joined by Roger Federer who had to dig deep to fend off rising star Milos Raonic in three sets.

Where world number three Federer had to come from behind to beat Canada's Raonic 6-7 (4/7), 6-2, 6-4, his Spanish rival cruised by Marcel Granollers 6-1, 6-4, to extend his winning run against his compatriots to 10 matches.

Nadal will face Alexandr Dolgopolov in the fourth round of the hardcourt tournament in the California desert.

In the women's draw, defending champion Caroline Wozniacki saw her bid for back-to-back titles fail as she was dumped out 6-3, 6-2 in the night match by former world number one Ana Ivanovic.

But the 30-year-old Swiss, who won three straight Indian Wells titles from 2004-2006, came back to take the next two sets and continue a strong run of form that has seen him take consecutive wins in Rotterdam and Dubai.

Federer, who was facing the 21-yearold Raonic for the first time, said he had a difficult time adjusting early to what the hard-serving Canadian.

Federer hammered 10 aces and won 88 percent of his first-serve points in the two hour, seven minute match, and afterwards expressed pride in the comeback.

Federer broke Raonic in the seventh game of the third set to go up 4-3. With Raonic serving at 30-30 Federer dug low to snag a 219kmph (136mph) service return, which Raonic then failed to get back over the net.

The Swiss won the game on the next point with a backhand passing shot down the line.

Federer then took his first match point when Raonic pounded a forehand into the net in front of the 15,000-strong crowd at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden.

Raonic, who already has two titles this season, showed why he is considered one of the rising stars on the ATP Tour, earning the praise of his opponent.

Despite the loss, Raonic said he still enjoyed being on centre court against the 16-time Grand Slam winner.

Fifth-seeded Spaniard David Ferrer exited after losing his third-round match to Denis Istomin in straight sets 6-4, 6-3.

BHF calls training

The Bangladesh Hockey Federation yesterday cut down the AHF Cup squad to 23 players from 33 as the residential camp gets underway today at the Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium.

The BHF, which initially called up 57 players for the camp, will finally reduce the squad to 16 for the final squad as they will have to send the final squad to the Asian Hockey Federation by March 25.

Coach Mahbub Harun informed the players would have two practice sessions during the residential camp where they will work on technique and game plan.

"The fitness level of the players is now better and I will work on their technique at the residential camp," said Harun who however seems to be worried over the position of midfield as a couple of experienced playmakers like Shahidullah Titu and Ehsan Rana are not in the squad.

The backline and forward are well equipped but the midfield is comparatively weaker and the selectors are thinking of bringing back experienced midfielder Titu, added Harun.

Bangladesh, who emerged champions in the 2008 edition, have been placed along with Singapore, Chinese Taipei and Thailand in the 4th AHF Cup which begins on April 16 in Hong Kong.

FIGHT AGAINST CORRUPTION IN CRICKET

India's role vital: Mani

Ehsan Mani, the former International Cricket Council (ICC) president, has urged cricket boards to take responsibility to curb corruption in the sport by engaging with their governments and law enforcement agencies to punish the perpetrators they find.

Mani said while the role of the ICC was limited, India's role in this exercise could be "significant" if it found a way to monitor and regulate the illegal betting industry in the country.

"Every time it is the players who are under the radar. The ones who corrupt the cricketers are somehow never punished," Mani told ESPNcricinfo. "One was hoping that the conviction of three Pakistanis and one English cricketer would send out a strong message and frighten players, but this I think is not going to work. In the long run, it is the root-cause that has to be dealt with." An undercover operation by the Sunday

Times stated that two Indian bookmakers had claimed they remained undeterred by the recent prosecutions of professional cricketers, the game continued to offer plenty of opportunities for spot-fixing and that professional cricketers could be easily be lured in all forms of the game. In the report the bookies had said that they had recruited players from several countries to throw part or all of international matches,

including the World Cup semi-final between India and Pakistan. The ICC denied there had been evidence to "prompt an investigation into the match."

Mani defended the ICC's actions in the current environment, saying its role was limited as the influence of the illegal betting industry was hard to control. "They don't have the authority to set up the sting operations in any country so the responsibility [should be] laid on the individual boards to follow up. The problem is the illegal bookies in the subcontinent -- most of them are from India and some are in Pakistan. They work in a grey area where there is no control and monitoring."

The Sunday Times reported the bookmaker's laundry list of fixing 'rates' offered. "Tens of thousands of pounds are on offer to fix matches, typically 44,000 pounds (70,000 dollars) to batsmen for slow scoring; 50,000 pounds (80,000 dollars) for bowlers who concede runs; and as much as 750,000 pounds (1.2 million dollars) to players or officials who can guarantee the outcome of a match," the newspaper reported the bookmaker's claims.

The figures did not surprise Mani who said players could be easily tempted when they were offered large sums of money for little effort. "I'm afraid there will be some 600m dollars involved in the

upcoming one match between India and Pakistan on March 18. So for them [illegal bookmakers] investing 5 to 10m dollars on a player is nothing. These days fixing a whole team isn't possible but controlling individual player is viable and it could be common."

The ECB, Mani said, had been proactive in the Westfield case, asking players to come forward to reveal what they knew. They board responded robustly to concerns that the county circuit was as vulnerable to the influence of illegal bookies as the international game. The Indian board, however, Mani said, needed to take cognisance of the newspaper report. Even the BCCI had declined to respond, with the IPL governing council chairman Rajeev Shukla saying, "Newspapers can publish anything, unless we get something concrete from an agency or ICC, I don't think it would be appropriate to react to it."

Mani said India could play a significant role by making betting legal. "These problems will never finish until the Indian government finds a way to regulate illegal book-making. I have seen the ECB showing concern, asking players to come and tell them what they know after Westfield's sentencing. I think it's the member boards who have to step up to engage the law enforcement agencies to work with them to clean up cricket."

Clarke back for Tests

Injured Australia captain Michael Clarke will be fit to play the first Test against the West Indies, selectors said Wednesday as they named a squad that saw the return of spinner Michael Beer.

Clarke was ruled out of the one-day series in the Caribbean that starts Friday after injuring his hamstring in a tri-series clash against Sri Lanka earlier this month.

But after intense treatment, he was included in the 16-strong Test squad.

"It is anticipated Michael Clarke will be fully recovered and take his place as captain for the first Test match in Barbados beginning on Saturday April 7," said national selector John Inverarity.

The skipper later tweeted: "Rehab going

really well, should be over in the West Indies in the coming weeks. Can't wait to see the boys."

Shane Watson and James Pattinson were both given recalls after their injury-marred Australian summers, but batsman Shaun Marsh remains out of favour after a run of poor form.
