2 bodies found in city

Police recovered the decomposed bodies of two youths from Badda and Sabujbagh in the capital vesterday.

In Badda, on information, Badda police recovered the bullet-hit body of a youth from a ditch at Rampura project around 10:30am yesterday.

Dhaka Medical College (DMC) morgue sources said an autopsy was conducted on the body and a bullet was found in its chest.

In Sabujbagh, police recovered the floating body of an unidentified youth from a pond at Rajarbagh Kali Mandir at about 7:45am yesterday.

Police suspect that miscreants might have killed him a few days back and dumped the body there.

Man dies as his bike crashes into city road island

Court summons Birdem physician

A Dhaka court summoned a physician of Birdem Hospital to appear before it on April 15 in connection with a case filed against him for his negligence in treating a female patient that led to her death.

Metropolitan Magistrate Utpal Chowdhury on Wednesday passed the order after Dr Ali Zahir Al Amin, son of the deceased patient Hasna Hena Ali, filed a case against Dr Rony Sujan Clod Sarkar on September 29 last year for his alleged negligence.

Earlier on the day, the court rejected the probe report submitted by Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) authorities saying that the allegation of negligence in treating the female patient brought against the physician was not proved.

Cultural links can forge commonality: Speakers

Cultural connections could forge a commonality among the commonwealth nations, said speakers at a seminar yesterday marking Commonwealth Day, observed on March 12 this year.

Commonwealth Society Bangladesh (CSB) organised the seminar, "Connecting Cultures", at Dhaka Club. The CSB, founded in 1993, advocates for democracy and poverty alleviation in Bangladesh.

Commonwealth Day is observed on the second Monday of March.

An eminent writer, Hasnat Abdul Hye, while presenting a keynote, said culture encompasses an entire way of life of a people and it is as old as and has profoundly benefited evolution of the human civilisation.

Cultural dissemination takes place through people to people contact. Traveling throughout the ages was the earliest mode of cultural connectivity and different religions too played a vital role in connecting cultures, he added.

Farooq Sobhan, president of Bangladesh Enterprise Institute and a former foreign secretary, said the 54-member Commonwealth makes it a family of around two billion people, two-thirds of which are youths. The process of connecting cultures

should be inclusive and democratic, he said. British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Robert W Gibson said the Commonwealth constitutes one-third of the world population with 500 million Muslims and one-fourth of the governments.

A prime goal of spending the UK aid in Commonwealth member countries is to alleviate poverty, he said.

CSB Vice-President Taleya Rehman read out a message of Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom, head of the Commonwealth, on the occasion of 63rd anniversary of Commonwealth Day.

"Our circumstances and surroundings may vary enormously, for example in the food we eat and the clothes we wear, but we share one humanity and this draws us all together," read the message.

Information and Cultural Affairs Minister Abul Kalam Azad and a former high commissioner, Prof Selina Mohsin, spoke at the seminar, presided over by CSB President Enam A Chaudhury.

No headway in journalist couple murder

Says IGP, but happy with investigators work

The inspector general of police yesterday expressed satisfaction over sincerity of investigators probing the journalist couple's murder, although no headway has been reported since the incident occurred on February 11.

His comment apparently appears a step back from his earlier stance when he told a press briefing at the police headquarters on February 13 that there was "substantial progress" in the investigation.

"The investigators are carrying out their tasks and we like to assure you that we are working best within our capability. I have personally never felt any neglect by the investigators," IGP Hassan Mahmood Khandker said when reporters asked him about progress in the case.

Meherun Runi, a senior reporter of private television channel ATN Bangla, and Sagar Sarowar, a news editor of another private TV channel Maasranga, were killed in their West Rajabazar flat in the capital.

The IGP answered in the same tone about investigation into Saudi embassy official Khalaf Al Ali killing, claiming that police are working best within their capability. "The case has been transferred to the Detective Branch on

Wednesday considering its significance and they are work-

ing hard to unfold the mystery," he commented. The official of the Saudi embassy in Dhaka was gunned

down about 30 yards off his house in Gulshan on March 6. The IGP once again claimed the law and order is satisfac-

tory except some "stray incidents".

Earlier, the IGP addressed a seminar titled "Challenges of Implementation of Anti-Human Trafficking Law: Children's Perspective" arranged by Bangladesh Shishu Adhikar Forum (BSAF) at BIAM Foundation auditorium in the city.

Bangladeshi youth shot dead in S Africa

A Bangladeshi youth, shot by two miscreants, succumbed to his injuries at a hospital in the South Africa on Monday night. The deceased was identified as Wahiduzzaman Khosru,

28, of village Batoiail in Kanaighat upazila of the district.

Family sources said Khosru lived in South Africa for two and half years and was running a small business at Delaridyl town. Two black men attacked his shop in the midnight on March 9 and fired several shots at him. Injured Khosru was immediately admitted to a hospital, where he died on Monday night.

The body would reach Sylhet tomorrow, informed the deceased's maternal uncle Abul Khoyer.

Now more communicative messages

Says Met dept

The Met office, from now on, will present cyclone forecasts in graphs and maps instead of only plain texts so that common people can easily understand the severity of approaching cyclonic events and locate the areas that the catastrophes are likely to strike.

These easily communicable graphical precautionary messages will be disseminated through print and electronic media, officials said, and provide people with the latest developments of cyclones and tidal surges to help them take steps to save their lives and properties.

The new forecasting system will be helpful as it is difficult for common people to make out the traditional precautionary signals in plain texts and numbers, Md Rasheduzzaman, a meteorologist of Bangladesh Meteorological Department (BMD), said at the launch of "Cyclone Information Tools for Broadcasting" at the department office yesterday.

Taslima Iman, another BMD meteorologist, said, "Colours and pictures will accompany texts to make the messages more communicative. We are going to use the new tools from the next cyclone forecasting".

Experts from Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) and the BMD prepared the tools under a project on weather analysis and forecasting.
