

Summer dates with power cuts

PDB lacks money to buy fuel for its electricity plants

The cash-strapped Power Development Board is keeping many fuel based power plants closed to save expenditure and allow load-shedding at a time when electricity demands reached new heights.

Unlike last year, the PDB now has enough power generation capacity to address the lion's share of the demand.

The power demand has reached a record 6,700 megawatts now with the

summer approaching.

The power demand has soared as farmers want 1,500MW extra power this season for irrigation to ensure boro paddy production. The dry weather demands subsoil water to be extracted using pumps.

The PDB has been maintaining a power generation between 5,000MW and 5,200MW since November last year and had kept load shedding away for four

Two children in Chittagong were ruthlessly caned by one of their school teachers yesterday despite a High Court ban on all forms of corporal punishment at educational institutions.

The father of Syed Md Ajrin Jihad, 11, a class-V student of Saleh Johur City Corporation Kindergarten, alleged that Shirin Akter, an English teacher of the school, hit the boy with a cane around noon.

The teacher also whipped Jihad's classmate Sumit Das, 11, he said.

Four females of a family were badly burnt as a devastating fire razed 16 shanties at Jhut Patti slum in the city's Mirpur-10 yesterday.

The injured -- Ambia Khatun, 60, her daughter HSC examinee Amena Akhter Shahana, 18, granddaughters Sheuli Akter, 9, and Nitu Akhter, 11 -- were undergoing treatment at the Burns Unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

About 35 to 50 per cent of their bodies have been burnt, said physicians.

Truck ploughs into house; kills mother, 2 daughters

A mother and her two daughters died as a truck ploughed into a house in Netrakona while another mother and her daughter were killed as a covered van hit a motorcycle in Tangail early Saturday.

Shirin Akhter, 32, and her daughters Nitu Akhter, 13, and Khadija Akhter, 7, were killed in a Netrakona road crash while Jyotsna Begum, 45, and her daughter Shampa Khatun, 20, in Tangail.

In Netrakona, a sand-laden truck ploughed through the roadside house of Shirin at Gozalikanda in Purbadhalia upazila around 4:00am as its driver lost control over the steering, said Azizur Rahman,
