


pher started his artistic journey in 2008. "Buddhism in the greater Chittagong region got a new lease of life almost 50 years back. Many Buddhist temples we erected during that time. Buddhist monks from different countries frequently assembled in the region to attend festivals and I started photographing them," said Poran. As part of "The Daily Star Odommo

Chattagram Festival", a weeklong photography competition and exhibition, titled "Chitromoy Chattala", was held at the gallery of Theatre Institute Chittagong (TIC). The 80 images on display truly captured multifaceted aspects of beauty, cultural diversity, and indomitable spirit of the port city.

Adrian Poran's "The Monk Meditated" bagged the first prize in the competition. He received Taka 50,000 as prize money. The image has a rare illusion of light a sense of visual beauty and with refer-

ence to enlightening. A meditating monk is searching for the spirit of Buddha (The Enlightened) under a mahabodhi tree

while rays of light are gleaming through

the hills creating a halo around him.

"At present I am photographing differ ent hilly flowers, especially those that bloom in monsoon. I am also trying to document lifestyles of 11 indigenous groups including Chakma, Marma, Tripura, Bom and Khiyang. I would like to highlight their economic activities that centre on jhum cultivation. The literature, music, dance and above all the festivities and rituals that are drawn from jhum cultivation equally attract me," mentioned Poran.

The photographer participated in an exhibition organised by United Nations Indigenous People of Permanent Forum. He also worked for a calendar of UNDP CHT Development Facilities in 2011. Poran completed his graduation in Journalism and Mass Communication from Daffodil University this year.

"I expect to work for noted magazines. Apart from this, my dream is to work for the affluent and time-honoured culture of Bangladesh alongside indigenous culture," said Poran.

Saju's Grand Group Art Exhibition opens

To celebrate 41 years of Bangladesh's independence and 38th anniversary of Saju Art Gallery, the gallery has organised its 31st Grand Group Art Exhibition

Vice Chancellor of Dhaka University, Professor Dr. AAMS Arefin Siddiqui, inaugurated the month-long exhibition on April 7. The US Ambassador to Bangladesh, Dan Mozena, was present as special guest at the inauguration. Ramiz Ahmed Chowdhury Saju, director general of Saju Art Gallery, delivered the welcome speech.

The exhibition highlights a number of avant-garde artists including Quamrul Hassan, SM Sultan, Safiuddin Ahmed, Mohammad Kibria, Aminul Islam, Abdur Razzague, Murtaja Baseer, Syed Jahangir, Shamsul Islam Nizami and Monirul Islam.

Artworks of Samarjit Roy Chowdhury, Abdus Shakoor Shah, Syed Abdullah Khalid, Shahid Kabir, Biren Shome, Shahabuddin Ahmed, Ranjit Das, Mohammad Eunus, Kanak Chanpa Chakma, Mohammad Fokhrul Islam, Samarjit Roy Chowdhury, Mohammad Iqbal and Anisuzzaman are also on display.

The Grand Group Art Exhibition at Saju Art Gallery started in 1977. Over the years it has become the biggest annual art show in the country.



I thought that "Mama" had done another exhibition, which the Alliance Française boys were excited about. My heart stopped. I almost reeled. He had passed away, some time before. A national daily carried some of the relevant details and his "mug shot". My friend in arms one of them, anyway had joined the list of departed ones. This after having fought with ill health. The artist Fakhrul Islam, seen ever so often at Alliance, whom the youth lovingly referred to as "Mama" had succumbed to heart condition, diabetes, gangrene and other complications. The news was carried in our newspaper vesterday. I recall Fakhrul as he sat quietly at the café veranda

or the Alliance Cinema and exhibit halls -- an integral part and parcel of the buzzing life at Alliance. He watched life go with a critical eye, sketching or drawing most of times, as artists do. He was often a silent, but observant, watchful critic. He said little but thought deeply. Drawing his lines, dots and curves, he kept the passing rally of the whirlwind of his friends -- the exhibits over the decades, and whatever you will. He saw with an uncanny eye, who was luring whom, what

Fakhrul noticed, with hawk eyes, the passing parade of all types of installations and painting plus photography displays. He knew which artists, musical or painting wise, was baiting whom, as is the game of meeting, talking, exchanging views and news, and of course, courtship -- or attempt at it. As he sat, sipping tea, soberly, at the Alliance Café or at Zainul Gallery sidewalk, he kept most of the observations to himself, and mulled over facts, confiding only to close friends. Fakhrul with his keen, observant eyes, and quicksilver tongue, could argue his way through any rank of friends and visitors. His outlook was always fair, impartial on world economy, sociology and the politi-

cal issues. It was, as it were, he was both "the mirror Fakhrul had been to many art galleries, museums from the East to the West. His gaze focused on the US, Europe to China and all of Far East. He saw and admired with passion and feeling the creation of artists, visual artists in particular. His mustard and jet-black print creations, their dots and lines, represented the enigmatic world around us. He thought of the world and its seasons and people as a miracle and a mystery.






