Deal to improve newborn health

UNB, Dhaka

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) yesterday signed an agreement to improve the health of newborn children in Bangladesh.

"Helping Babies Breathe", a newborn health care programme, will be funded by the US government through its development agency USAID and implemented in Bangladesh by Save the Children.

Through this initiative, BSMMU will work with birth attendants by training them to help newborns who have breathing difficulties after birth.

Through this program, USAID will provide \$1.4 million to BSMMU over next three years to train more than 20,000 skilled birth attendants throughout the

DU boy assaulted

A Dhaka University (DU) student was brutally beaten up at the capital's Shahbagh by a group of students of three private universities yesterday.

The victim, Shoyeb Nabil, a first-year student of Psychology department, was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital in a critical condition and later, shifted to LabAid Hospital, DU Proctor Prof MA Ali told The Daily Star.

"Nabil is being observed in Intensive Care Unit (ICU)", the proctor added. Sirajul Islam, officer-in-charge of Shahbagh Police Station,

said a group of six to seven students of three private universities swooped on Nabil at Sagabagh intersection at around 5:00pm as he protested an altercation between a bus conductor and the students of the private universities over bus fare.

A case was filed in this connection accusing unknown per-

Meanwhile, protesting the incident, a section of DU students, numbering around 300, took to the street at Sahabagh intersection at around 5:45pm.

They, however, called off their protest at the request of DU authorities.

Speakers at a function yesterday said the Police Reform Programme (PRP) is supporting the transition of Bangladesh Police from a colonial style force to a democratic one. PRP, in collaboration with Bangladesh Police, organised

the function at a hotel in the capital to present the Mid-term Review findings of PRP phase-2.

Additional Inspector General of Police Md Mokhlesur Rahman, also national project director of PRP, said majority of the people, who took part in a survey conducted by PRP last year, have said that the country's law and order situation has improved over the last two years.

The respondents in the survey also said to have witnessed a change in the behaviour of the police, he said.

"I believe that these are the signs that indicate that police performance is slowly improving and that the public are beginning to see that as well," he said.

"One of the factors that helped the police achieve this success has been the work conducted by the PRP," he added.

PRP is a long-term comprehensive capacity building initiative to create a secure environment for the people based on respect for law and human rights and equitable

access to justice. The programme puts specific focus on the poor and the disadvantaged, and women and children.

Home Ministry Senior Secretary CQK Mustak Ahmed, UKaid Senior Programme Manager for Governance Daniel Davis and UNDP Bangladesh Country Director Stefan Priesner, among others, addressed the function.
