## 'Ensure people's right to info'

UNB, Dhaka

President Zillur Rahman yesterday urged the Information Commission (IC) to take further steps to ensure people's rights to information.

"Access to information is the rights of people," he said when a delegation of Information Commission submitted the commission's annual report-2011 to him at Bangabhaban.

Chief Information Commissioner Ambassador (Retd) Mohammad Zamir led the delegation. Information Commissioners Mohammad Abu Taher and Prof Dr Sadeka Halim and IC director M Abdul Karim were present on this occasion.

Receiving the annual report, Zillur said now people can easily have the access to information following the formation of the Information Commission.

During the meeting, Chief Information Commissioner Zamir apprised the president about the commission's various activities.

He informed the president that the commission has taken an initiative to incorporate articles on "Rights to Information" with curricula for class VII, IX and X in the secondary level from the next year, aiming to make the young generation aware of their rights to information.

The Chief Information Commissioner said steps have already been taken to make people aware about the Rights to Information Act through the print and electronic media as well as holding opinion exchange meetings at the district and divisional levels.

## Unite govt, NGO efforts for best results

Says expert

The government and development organisations should work together on climate change adaptation programmes so that the country can be better equipped in taking on the impacts of global warming, said a climate expert yesterday.

The climate change specialist, M Asaduzzaman, said the many community-based adaptation programmes undertaken by different nongovernment organisations around the country are isolated.

"The government also took some projects but those are also isolated. There is no coordination among them. All of those seem to be isolated. They are not adding up," he said. Asaduzzaman was addressing a

workshop, "Pilot evaluation of social and economic responses to a few identified livelihood adaptation options", at Hotel Riggs Inn in the capital.

The workshop presented the outcomes of an action plan undertaken by Centre for Global Change (CGC) in association with Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) in three upazilas

under Khulna and Satkhira districts.

Asaduzzaman, also a former research director of Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies, said the many projects ongoing across the country will give people the muchneeded experience to deal with climate change impacts.

But Bangladesh is not yet prepared to take on impacts of climate change and people trying to work outside the government are in panic, he said.

"The country has got a small amount of money to deal with climate change. Many will scramble for money when more of it comes in. We do not know whether this money will be properly utilised. I think steps should be taken now," he said.

It is yet to be known whether projects under the Climate Change Trust Fund are related and relevant to climate change, he said.

Four persons were electrocuted at Eskaton Garden, Karwan Bazar, Sabujbagh and South Keraniganj of the capital yesterday.

Police said day labourer Hafizur Rahman, 28, came into contact with a live electric wire, which was laid below surface, while digging earth inside the under-construction Police Officers' Complex at Eskaton Garden.

An unidentified youth, aged about 22, might have been electrocuted when he came into contact with a snapped electric wire in Karwan Bazar area during a heavy rain yesterday morning, said police.

The police recovered the body from in front of Purnima cinema.

A portion of the victim's left hand was found burnt. The victim in Sabujbagh was identified as Mujibur Rahman, 32, a caretaker of a house at East Maniknagar of

Sabujbagh. He became victim while switching on an electric water pump at around 10:30am, said police. He was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared him dead.

The victim of electrocution at South Keraniganj was identified as Mohammad Ali, 22. He was brought dead to DMCH at around 1:45pm, said DMCH sources.

## Four electrocuted Bangladeshi cattle trader killed by BSF

A Bangladeshi cattle trader was allegedly killed by Indian Border Security Force (BSF) on Kaijuri-Baikari border early

yesterday. The victim was identified as Sirajul Islam, 32, son of Syed Ali Sardar of Kaliani Chhoygharia village in Satkhira.

According to Bangladesh Border Guard (BGB) sources, Sirajul with other cattle traders went to India to buy cattle on April 10.

BSF personnel of Kaijuri camp arrested the victim when the party was returning to Bangladesh, and chopped him to death at about 4:30am yesterday leaving his body in a paddy field, they added.

BGB members sent a letter to BSF authorities protesting the incident and making a request to hold flag meeting.

Later, two flag meetings were held between BGB and BSF authorities at zero point near Kaijuri border. However, BSF denied the allegation and said they were

not involved in the killing, said Major Shamim-un Nabi Chowdhury, second-in-command of 38 BGB battalion. BSF members said they only discovered the body in the paddy field.

Officials of both BGB and BSF agreed to resolve the dispute through discussions and by taking necessary measures.
