"We have a commitment to the people to build the bridge. But the World Bank did not have such commitment," Quader on his return from Malaysia told reporters at his secretariat office.

Bangladesh and Malaysia Tuesday inked a memorandum of understanding (MoU) on cooperation in the construction of the bridge and some other infrastructures in Bangladesh.

Quader and Malaysia's Special Envoy to India and South Asia, Datuk Seri S Samy Vellu signed the agreement on behalf of their sides

in Kuala Lumpur. "Construction is scheduled to commence this year and we hope to complete it in 54 months," Samy Vellu said at the programme.

Amid uncertainty over the implementation of the project, several countries including Malaysia showed interest in funding the project. Malaysia in January formally proposed for financing the project.

The construction of the 6.15-kilometre bridge at Mawa-Jajira point on the Padma river is the largest and top-most priority project of the present government. It is also an electoral pledge of the Awami Leagueled ruling government.

According to the IMF statement, the ECF loan that carries a zero percent interest rate replaces the Poverty Reduction and Growth Facility (PRGF).

Bangladesh received PRGF loan in 2003. Before releasing instalments, the IMF reviewed whether the government met all its conditions.

The IMF said: "As part of the loan agreement, the Bangladeshi authorities agreed to create fiscal space by increasing tax revenues and containing subsidy costs, reinvigorate the financial sector through strengthened governance and oversight, and take other reforms aimed at catalysing additional resources."

The IMF warns that some risks are still there, and says that given heightened inflation and depleting reserves, policy buffers remain limited in the face of any adverse shocks.

"Prolonged delays in adjusting fuel, electricity, and fertilizer prices and unanticipated increase in import-related costs could also exert additional pressure on the fiscal and external positions," cautions the IMF, stressing the need for more effective safety nets.

Criticism from all around

Expressing concern, political leaders, civil society members, and citizens demanded independent and neutral investigation to unearth what had actually happened late Monday night and punishment of people responsible. They called for his resignation.

Iftekharuzzaman said the issue involves morality. Even though signs about the minister's involvement were not clear, he should resign on moral grounds to ensure fair and neutral investigation into the incident.

Vouching for an independent investigation, Iftekharuzzaman told The Daily Star that there could be

an internal investigation of the ministry but the incident needs to be investigated by the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) or a judicial probe committee as suggested by the parliamentary body on railway minis-

M Hafiz Uddin Khan, former adviser to a caretaker government, thinks it was a case of large-scale corruption. He said it seemed that the trio had collected the large amount of money before heading towards the minister's home.

"The incident raises suspicion and the way the minister handled it seemed that he is trying to hide something as no step to find out the source of the money or filing a general diary or a case is seen after the incident," he told The Daily Star.

Being a political appointee, how come his APS got that sort of money. The minister has to shoulder the responsibility, Hafiz Uddin said.

Sceptical about the ministry's probe committees, the former adviser emphasised the need for neutral investigation by a high-powered body which is bold and has integrity. Besides, there should be an enquiry done by the ACC to TIB Executive Director find out the source of the money, he added.

Eminent jurist Shahdeen Malik said the incident does not prove that he is guilty, but there is a public perception that he may be involved in foul play. "Such public perception

should be sufficient for him to resign," he told The Daily Star, adding that a minister should always be above such

suspicions.

Former president and Bikalpo Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) President Prof AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury in a press release urged Suranjit to step down to make the departmental probe committee credible.

He said by forming two one-member departmental probe bodies, Suranjit has firmly established the suspicion people has. Badruddoza said he trusts Suranjit's political etiquettes and hoped he would resign.

Bangladesher Workers Party General Secretary and Bangladesh National Awami Party in separate statements demanded Suranjit's resignation for the sake of investigation.
