Mario wants to stay

Mario Balotelli wants to stay with Manchester City despite manager Roberto Mancini's belief that the controversial Italian striker could be sold in the summer.

Balotelli's four red cards in two seasons, as well as a chequered life off the field, have exhausted Mancini's patience, but the player's agent Mino Raiola said his client wants to stay at Eastlands.

"This is not the moment to return to Italy. Mario must progress and learn in England. We haven't asked for a transfer for Mario," Raiola told Sky Sport after being quizzed on whether or not Balotelli would return to Inter Milan or even sign for AC Milan.

"Mancini has denied having said that he no longer wants to have anything to do with Mario. He expected a heavy suspension and can't use him again this season."

"There has been a moment of tension, but now the situation is calm (with Mancini)," added Raiola.

Malaga missed the chance to go third in La Liga when they conceded two late goals to lose 2-1 at Villarreal on Thursday.

It seemed that a win was

on the cards for the Andalusian side when Santi

Cazorla put them ahead on 65 minutes.

But it all went wrong on 80 minutes when goalkeeper Carlos Kameni was sent-off for bringing down substitute Hernan Perez.

Marcos Senna converted the penalty and, in the fourth-minute of injury time, Perez shot home from the edge of the area to give a much-needed win to Villarreal who started the evening only four points above the relegation zone.

Malaga remain in fourth place and still in a Champions League place on 50 points, two

ahead of fifth-placed Levante.

The night got better for Villarreal when other results confirmed defeats for two of their nearest rivals at the bottom of the table.

Zaragoza went down 3-0 at Sevilla and bottom club Racing Santander lost 3-0 at home to Mallorca to leave both teams struggling in the relegation zone, seven and 10 points behind Villarreal and safety.

Emilio Nsue put Mallorca ahead on 20 seconds in Santander and Chori Castro scored within 60 seconds of the restart before Alejandro Alfaro fired home a third to put Mallorca safely into 12th position.

Spain striker Alvaro Negredo scored two first-half goals for Sevilla to make it 10 goals for the season after Fazio had opened the scoring.

The result leaves Sevilla in seventh position, just a point behind Osasuna in sixth place and entry into next season's Europa League.

World Cup winner, check. European Cup winner, check. Defending Champions League winner, check. World Club Cup winner, check; it is clear that the balance of power in the footballing world now lies with Spain and Spain alone.

Having flattered to deceive internationally throughout their history, the Spaniards have finally made football their

own, dominating almost every international and regional competition that they have taken part in over the last few years. Nowhere is this better evidenced than this season's European competition, where five out of eight semifinalists in the Europa League and the glitzy Champions League are Spanish teams.

It raises the very realistic possibility that we could be on the cusp of witnessing two all-Spanish finals in the two European competitions; an unprecedented event in its near half-century history.

Of course, a major catalyst in this domination has been Barcelona who have forged what

could easily challenge to be one of the greatest football sides of all time. But even minus Lionel Messi, the Catalan contingent also dominates a Spanish team that has ruled the international football scene since 2007.

The Spanish dominance, coupled with a drop in performance by both the Italian Serie A and the English Premier League will see a seismic change in the landscape of European football over the

next few years. UEFA's Co-efficient system already rates the German Bundesliga ahead of its Serie A counterparts and now Spain is all set to overtake England for the number one spot. Although, England's drop in position will not see them lose teams in the Champions League, like the Italians, what it does go to show is how fleeting dominance at the top level of football can be.


